Introduction

Government College, Lahore was established during the British period and started its academic journey in January, 1864. In 2002, Government College, Lahore became Government College University, Lahore. Ever since its inception, it has produced both students and academics as change-makers and influencers, who etched commendable achievements in stone and soil. This book is an attempt to recreate the images of some of those exceptional individuals who have marked their identity in the history of Pakistan as well as in the world. This book comprises sketched portraits and brief introductions of illustrious *Luminaries* who have either studied or taught at Government College University, Lahore and have played their part in shaping a unique cultural milieu that continues to inspire the generations of Ravians.

This book is a tribute to the contribution of these celebrated Ravians to the world in terms of creativity, knowledge and inspiration. I used the pencil to draw these portraits and I have thoroughly enjoyed the exploration of their personality traits as reflected in their appearance and features. Throughout the process, I have particularly tried to meld the lines in order to create a blend of tones which finally highlighted the contours of a certain personality. I have used techniques such as elasticity, stretchiness and thickness of lines in accordance with the anatomy and features of the face which help in transforming the whole drawing into a pure form and volume. Likewise, adding up extra lines into a portrait brings more interest and energy into it. According to the art critics and analysts, one of the most substantial features of portrait drawing is the likeness and resemblance of the portrait to the personality drawn and this has always been my focus and point of interest. Every sketch has been constructed in almost the same style and the rendering medium of these portrait sketches is pencil.

Following the key artistic strategies and techniques of my previous work on portraits of *100 Painters of Pakistan and 100 Poets and Authors of Pakistan*, my original intention for this book was to compile a hundred portraits of notable Ravians. However, during the process of materializing this artistic intention, it became increasingly difficult to restrict the portraits to just a hundred because of the wide range of personalities rooted in different professions; from politicians to government officials, armed forces to nuclear scientists, Nobel Laureates to scholars, actors to musicians, poets to writers, philanthropists to scientists and journalists and so on. Therefore, I felt it necessary to increase the number of portraits to 150.

Hence, the next step was to compile a list of those 150 Ravians. It is indeed very unfortunate that there is no comprehensive list of prominent Ravians in the available records, but one of the best sources is a book written by Garret and Hamid Khan titled *History of Government College Lahore 1864-1964*. This book certainly mentions a list of 250 prominent Ravians, but does not provide a detailed account of the lives of those Ravians. This list was produced in response to an important event held at Government College University, Lahore. The book contains several names of the old Ravians who have contributed to the development of Government College, Lahore in its early years.

Therefore, by collecting all the available portraits of Ravians through the internet and other sources, I have eventually made this book possible. The sequence of portraits is based on date of birth of each luminary which might help the reader find the time period of that particular person.

The compilation of this book has been a very significant journey for a person who has already spent two decades in this great institution of learning. I joined Government College, Lahore during its golden period. Originally coming from a private organization, Naubahar Bottling Co. Ltd that manufactured PEPSI cola, the very thought of becoming an academic as per my mother's wishes had always persisted in my mind. I eventually joined Government College, Lahore in 2000. It was a tradition that newly appointed faculty members were invited to introduce themselves on the eve of the Annual Dinner. I could recall an unforgettable moment when I was standing on stage at the Bukhari Auditorium facing my colleagues and at the same time noticing the portraits of luminaries and eminent principals of Government College, Lahore exhibited on the walls, I made up my mind there and then to reproduce these portraits in oil paintings but I remained busy in my work in the following years. Establishing the Department of Fine Arts and later, the Minhas Art Gallery in 2006, became key concerns during this period of time. In 2016, 28 portraits of the principals sketched by me were presented in the exhibition on the 154th Founder's Day of Government College University, Lahore. My second solo show comprising 35 portraits of luminaries was also exhibited in 2017 on the Founder's Day at Minhas Art Gallery. Later on, upon initiation by the Vice Chancellor, the *Government College University, Lahore Yearly Diary* was published, showcasing these portraits for the years 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020. This publication brought back in me the aspiration to draw the sketches of all the celebrated Ravians and I got back to the task.

There is an endless list of those prominent Ravians who have attained tremendous success in their respective fields, but it was not possible for me to include all of them in this book. The importance of some of those luminaries may have been overlooked but it is not deliberate on my part. I did not include any political figures in this book because there is not enough recorded data to give their concise introduction. The Ravians' spirit that has been amplified in me by Dr Khalid Aftab, and my time at Government College University, Lahore remains the source of inspiration for this book. Thus, the book in your hands is an outcome of years of inspiration, love, devotion and hard work.

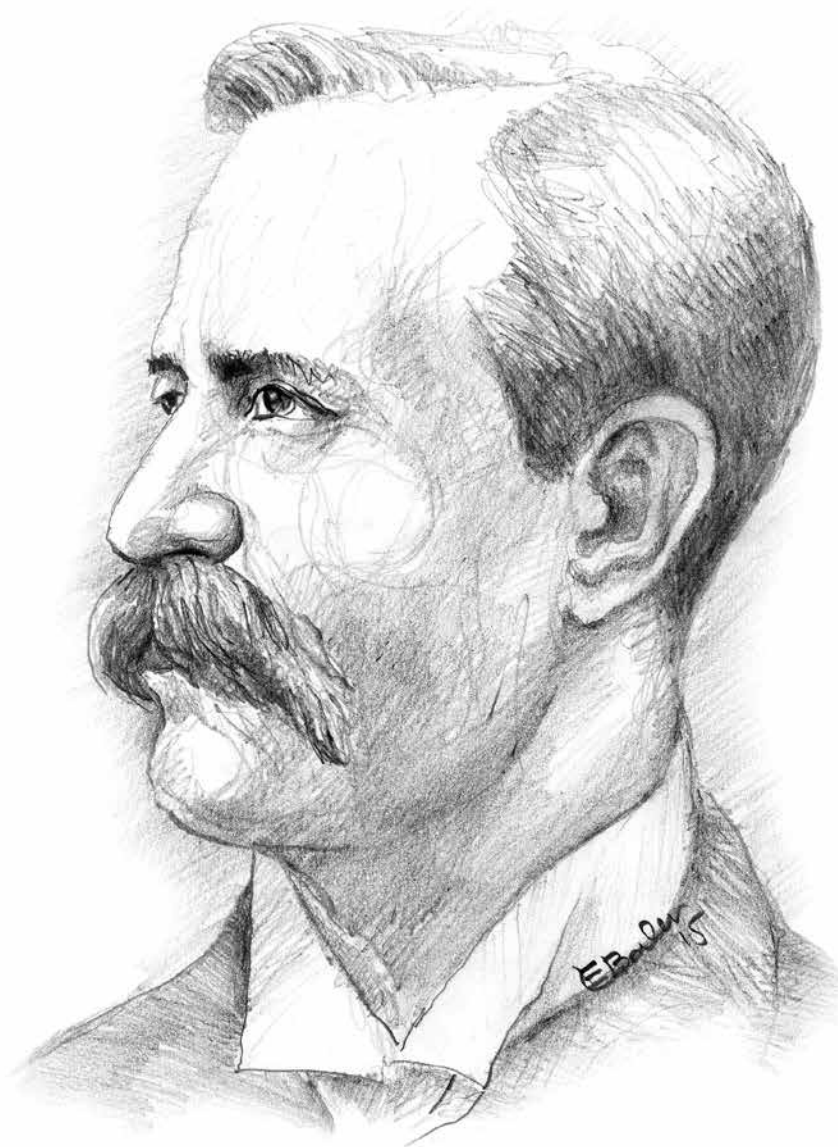

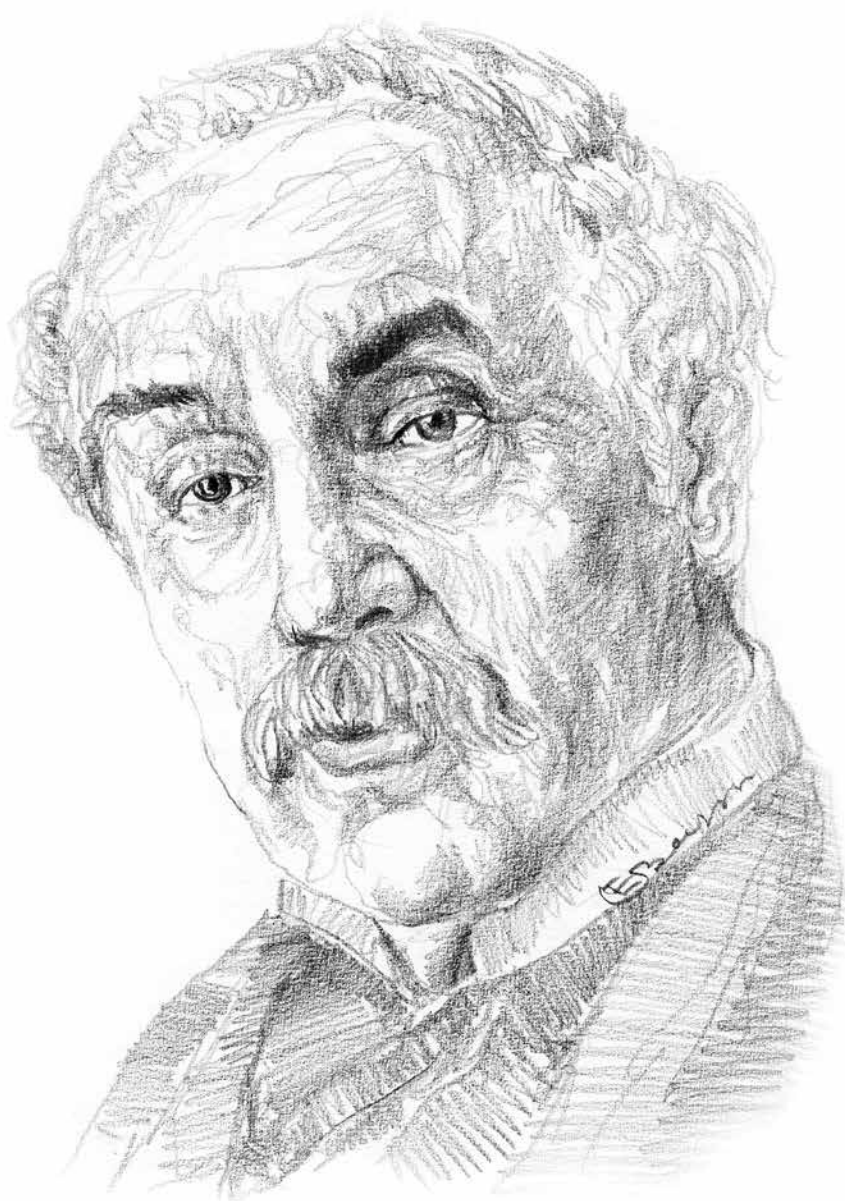
Muhammad Husain Azad
(1830–1910)

He was an Urdu writer who wrote both prose and poetry. But he is mostly remembered for his prose and is considered one of the best Urdu prose writers. His best-known work is 'Aab-e-Hayat'.



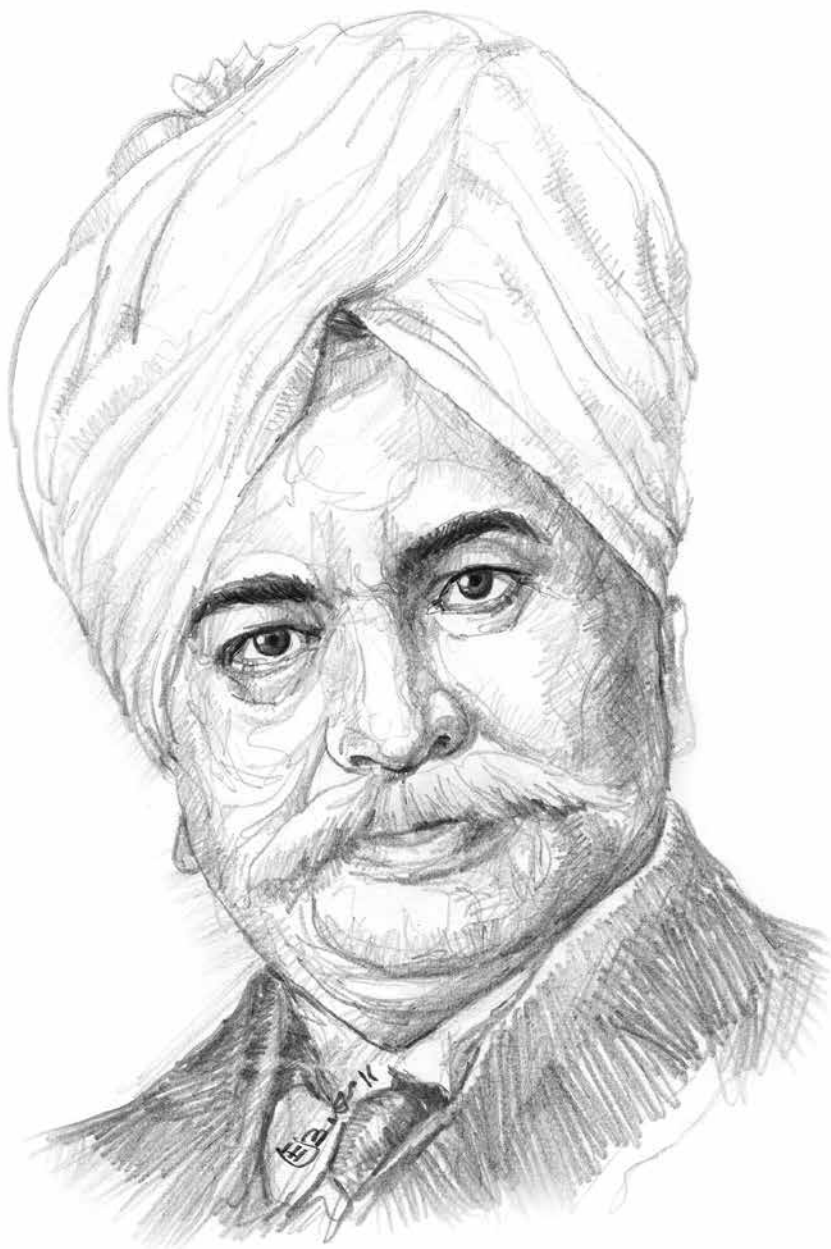
William Henry Dallinger
(1839 -1909)

He was a British minister in the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He was an accomplished scientist, being the first to study the complete life cycle of unicellular organisms under the microscope and studying the adaptation of such organisms to temperature. He taught at Government College Lahore Pakistan for some time. He also served as principal of Government College Lahore.



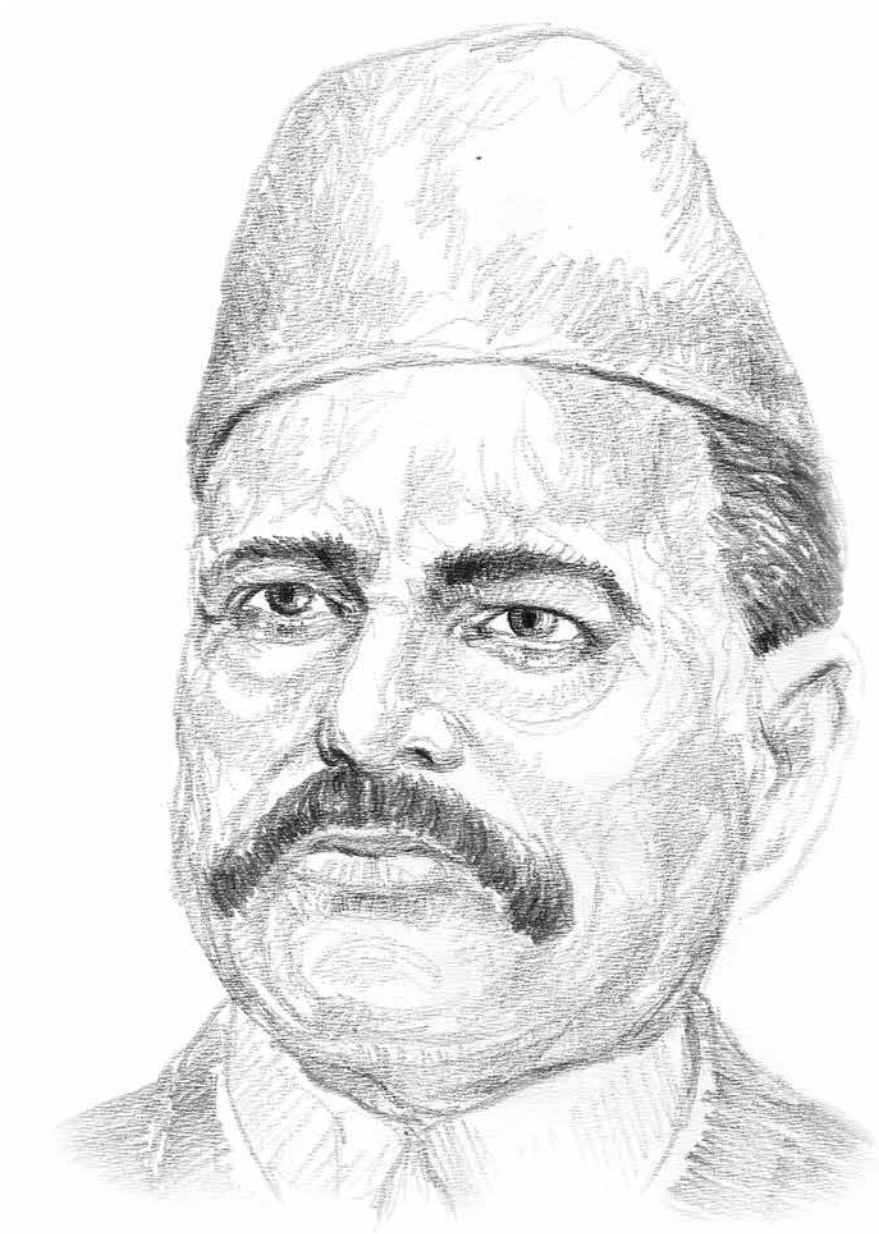
Sir Caspar Purdon Clarke
(1846-1911)

He was an English architect and museum director who created architectural design of Government College of Lahore. He studied architecture at the National Art Training Schools at South Kensington. Clarke accepted various foreign assignments as supervising architect. he also acted as architect of the Indian section and commercial agent to the Indian government at the Paris Exhibition.



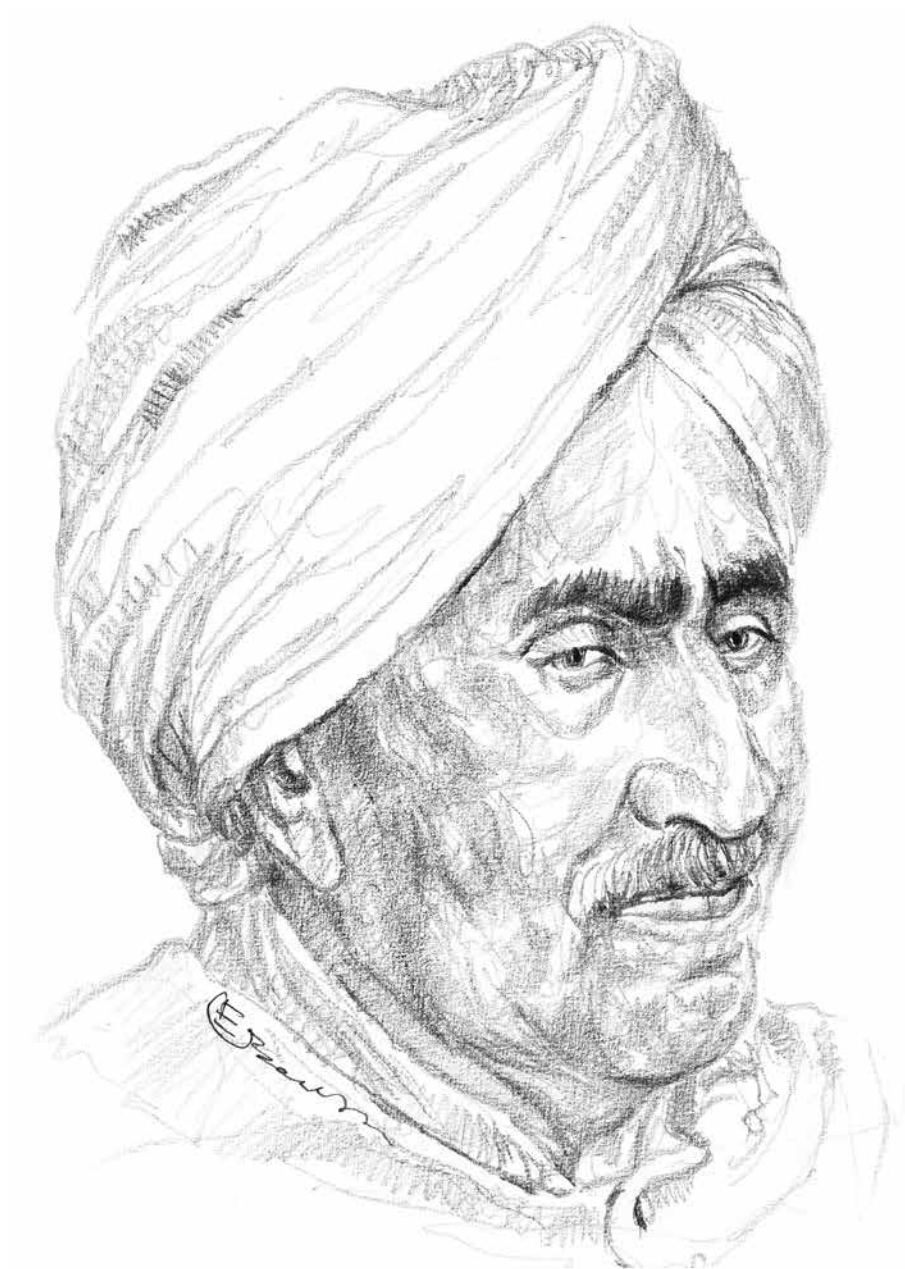
Sir Ganga Ram Agrawal
(1851-1927)

He was a civil engineer, architect and philanthropist. He joined the Government College, Lahore in 1869. In 1871, he obtained a scholarship to the Thomason Civil Engineering College at Roorkee. He passed the final lower subordinate examination with the gold medal in 1873. He designed and constructed the buildings of Lahore such as, the General Post Office, Lahore Museum, Aitchison College and Hailey College of Banking & Finance.



Balak Ram

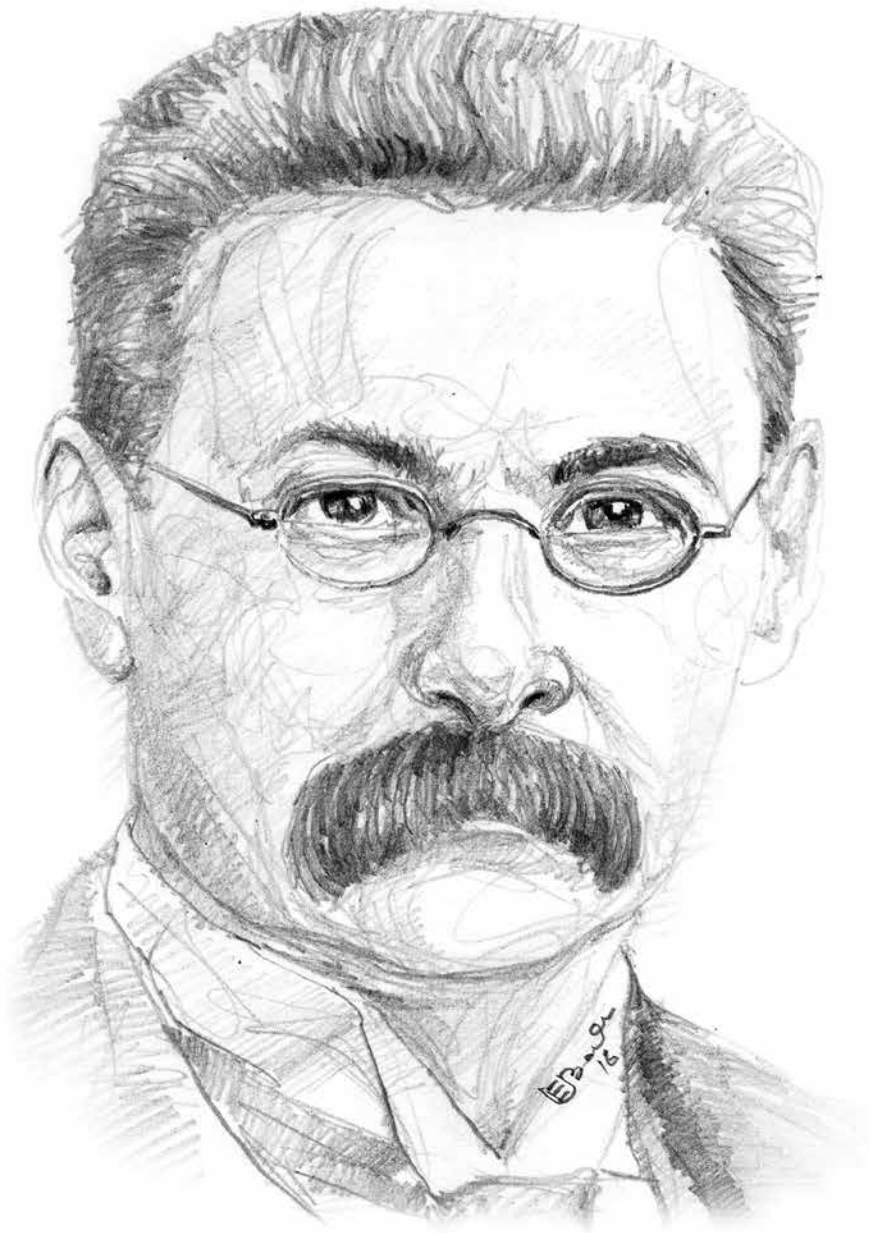
In 1944 the family of Sir Ganga Ram started a medical college by the name Balak Ram Medical College named after a son of Sir Ganga Ram. The college was closed soon after independence in 1947 and its premises abandoned and later on Fatima Jinnah Medical College, Lahore was established in 1948 in the same premises.



Ruchi Ram Sahni

(1863-1948)

He was a Punjabi freedom fighter who had a wide influence as an educationist and creator of scientific temper in the pre-partition Punjab. He was a scientist, innovator, enthusiastic educationist, fierce patriot, devoted social worker and the catalyst behind popularizing science education in Punjab.



Sir Thomas Walker Arnold

(1864-1930)

He was the British orientalist and historian of Islamic art who taught at Muhammadan Anglo-Oriental College, Aligarh Muslim University, and Government College, Lahore. He was a friend of Sir Syed Ahmed Khan. He also taught poet-philosopher Muhammad Iqbal and Syed Sulaiman Nadvi, and was a very close friend of Maulana Shibli Nomani.



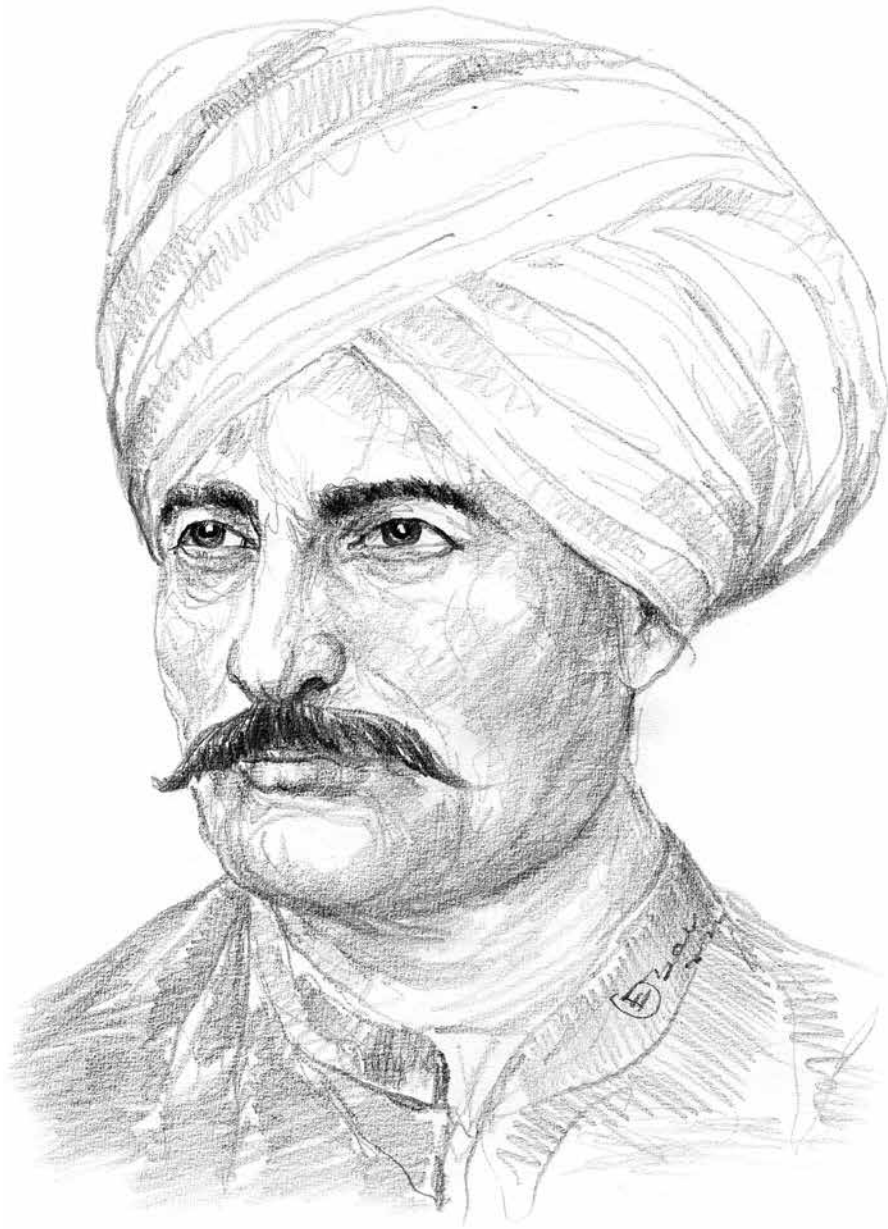
Lala Lajpat Rai
(1865-1928)

He was an Indian freedom fighter. He played a pivotal role in the Indian Independence movement. He was popularly known as Punjab Kesari. In 1880, Lajpat Rai joined Government College at Lahore to study Law, where he came in contact with patriots and future freedom fighters, such as Lala Hans Raj and Pandit Guru Dutt.



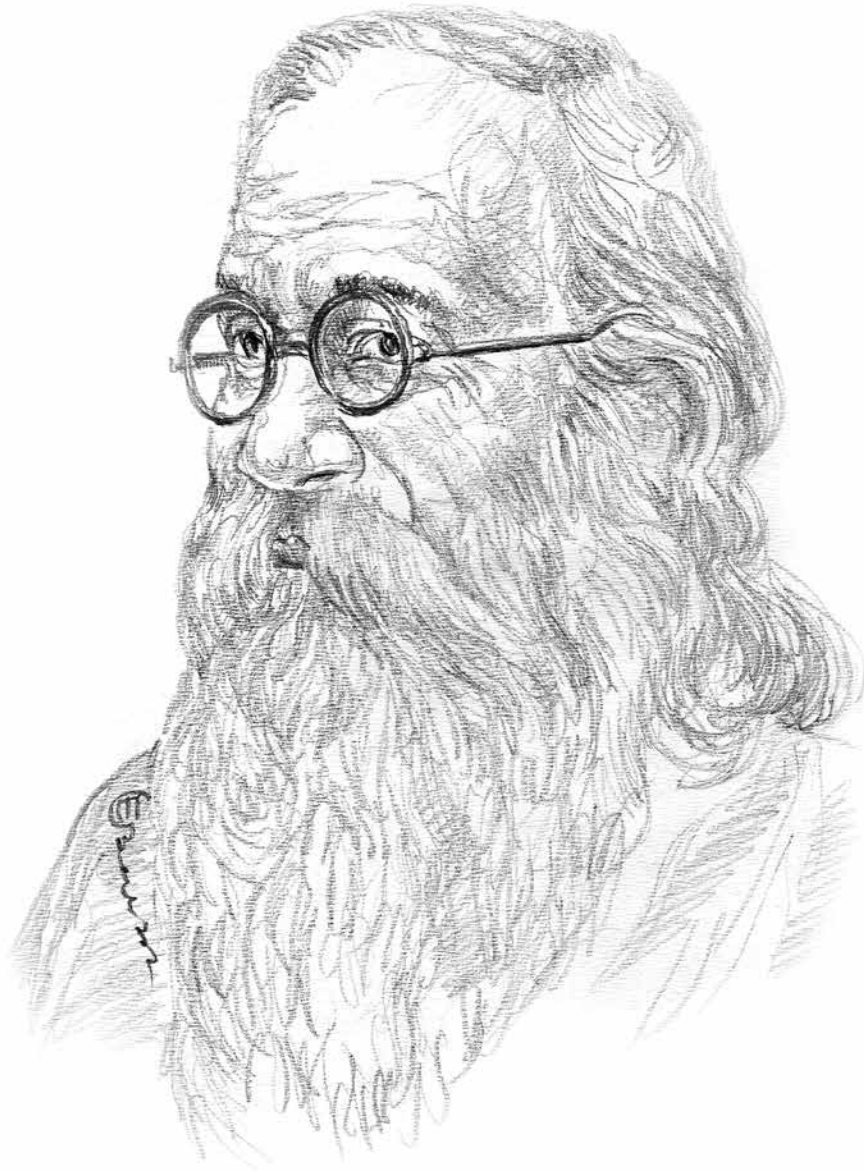
Prof Jiya Ram

He joined Government College as a professor of Philosophy in 1898. He was tender-hearted and tremendous in his teaching a very famous among students.

(1886-1908 at GC)

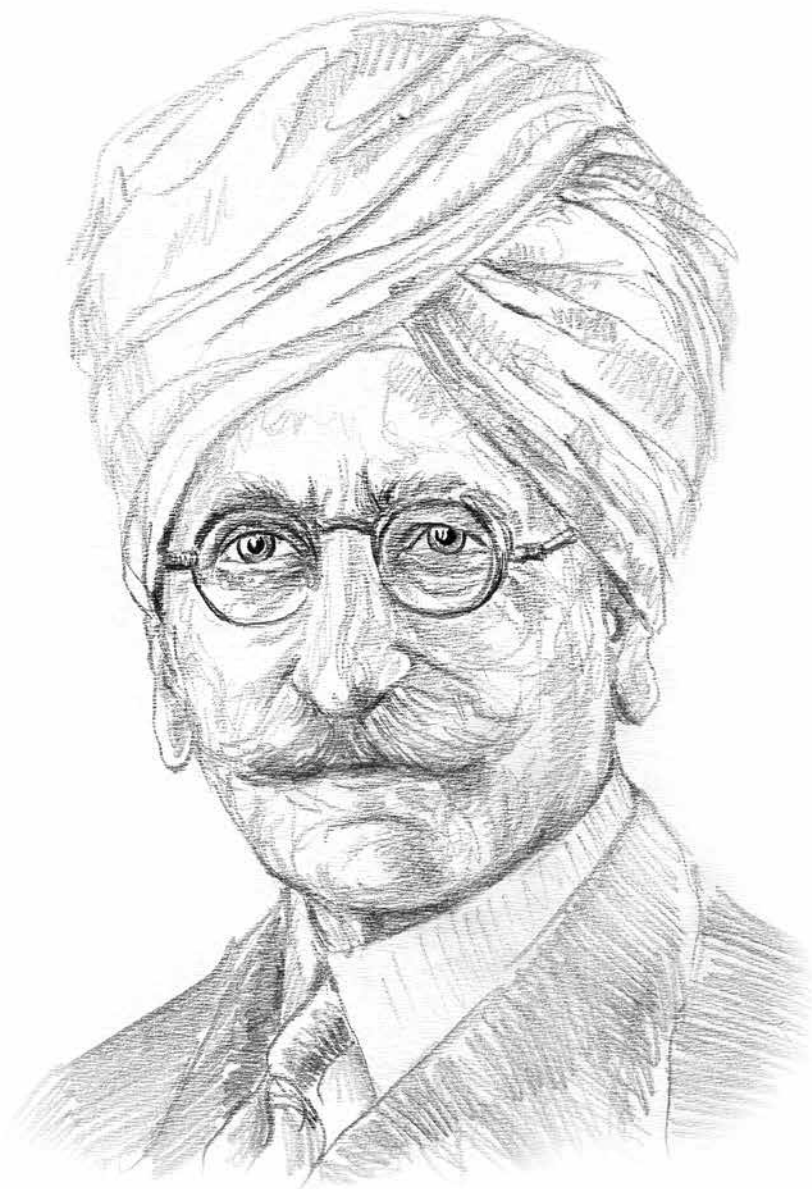
He joined Government College Lahore in 1898 as an Assistant Professor in Mathematics. He had established GC Union Club, this club was also organized several events related to Debating and Dramatics.



Bhagwan Das
(1869 -1958)

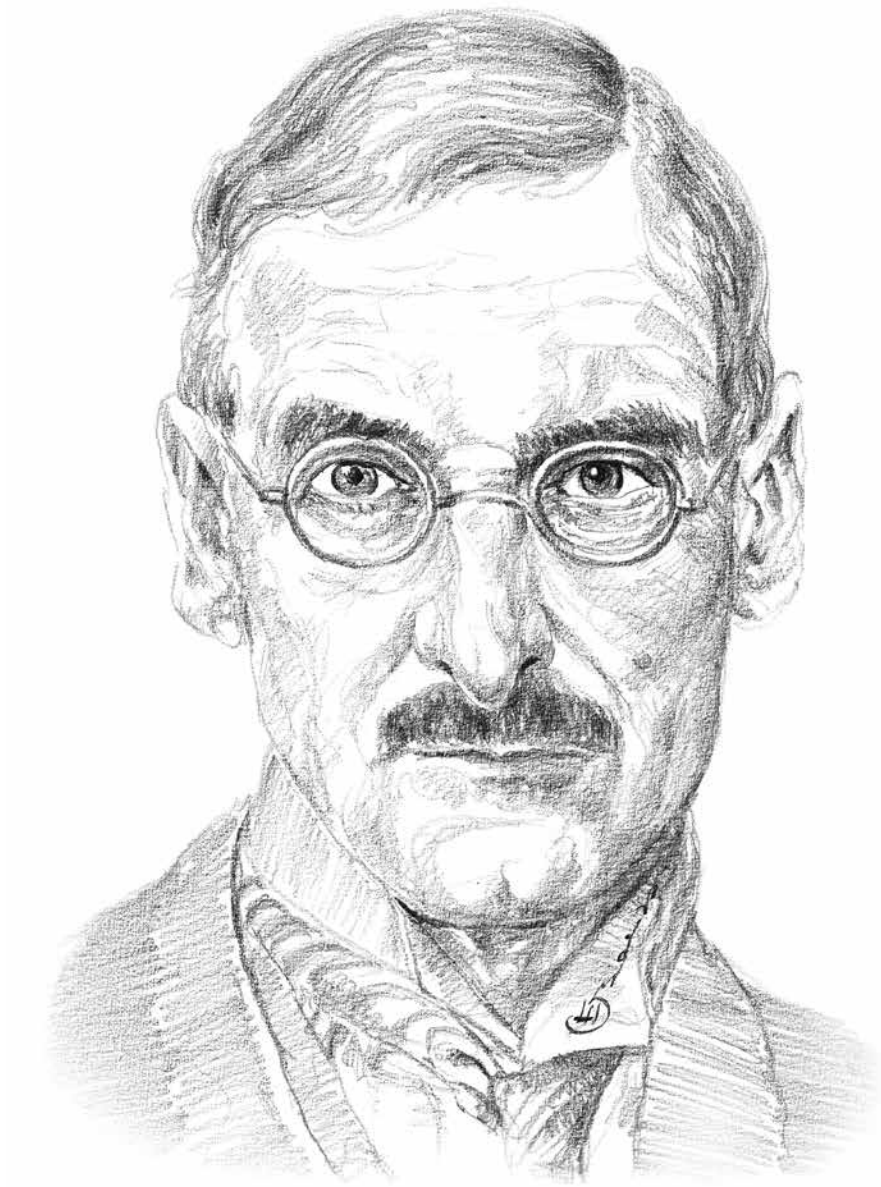
He was an illustrious Theosophist and public figure. For a time he served in the Central Legislative Assembly of British India. He became allied with the Hindustani Culture Society and was active in opposing rioting as a form of protest. As an advocate for national freedom from the British rule Das was a scholar of Sanskrit, from which he added to the body of Hindi language.

He wrote approximately 30 books, many of these in Sanskrit and Hindi.



Hari Kishen Kaul
(1869-1942)

He contributed to Government College in establishing sports activities; he was the first captain of GC Cricket Team. He organized large scale sports events during 1870s.



Percy Stafford Allen
(1869 -1933)

He was a British classical scholar, best known for his writings on Desiderius Erasmus. He received his early education in Rottingdean. From 1882, he studied Latin and Greek at Clifton College and after 1888 at Corpus Christi College, Oxford. One of his Oxford tutors was the historian and biographer James Anthony Froude. In 1892 he received his BA, and his MA in 1896. From 1897 to 1901 he taught history at Government College in Lahore. He returned to Oxford in 1908 as a Fellow of Merton College, Oxford. Allen is best known as the editor of the complete letters of Erasmus of Rotterdam, a twelve volume work. Among other writings.



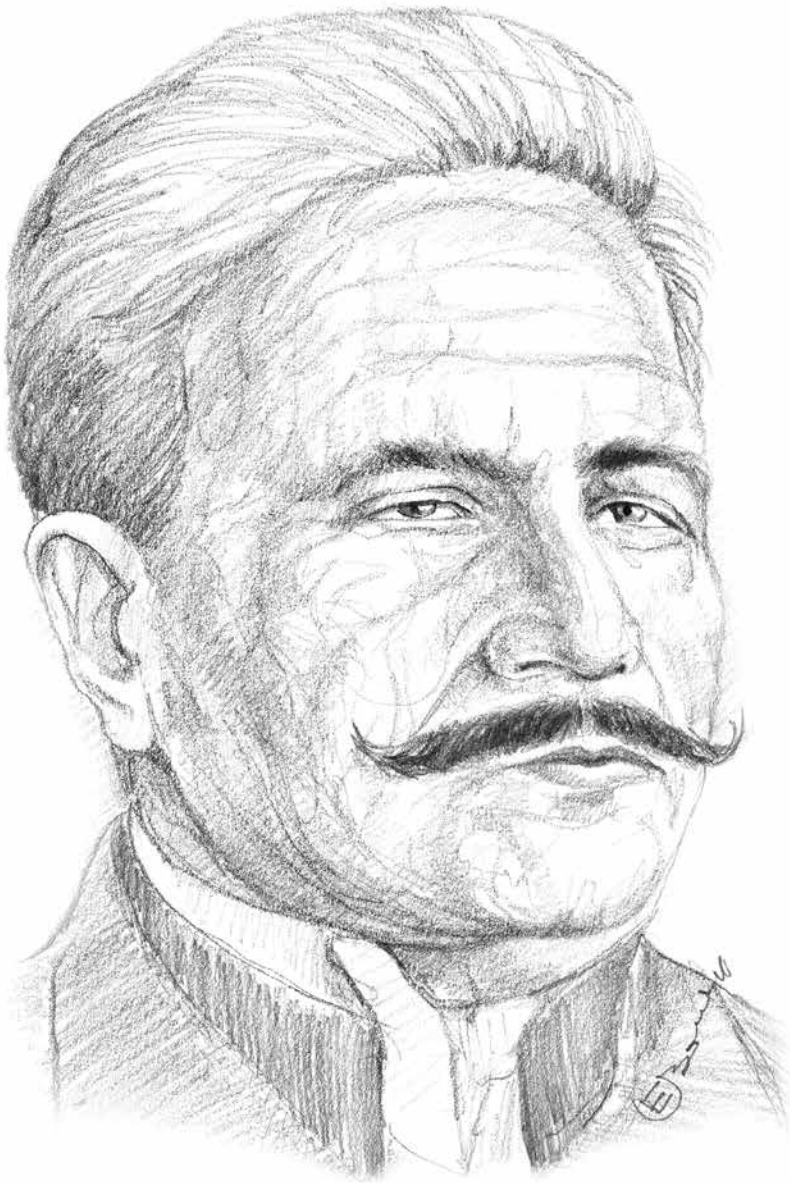
Sir Shadi Lal
(1874-1945)

He was an eminent jurist who served as the Chief Justice of Lahore High Court between 1920 and 1934, the first Indian head of an Indian high court.



Prof JC Oman
(1877-1897 at GC)

He joined Government College in 1877 as Professor of Natural Sciences. He encouraged and established science subjects in the College. He initiated a scheme of study for science subjects.



Dr. Muhammad Iqbal
(1877-1938)

He was poet, philosopher, and politician, as well as an academic, barrister and scholar in the British India. He is widely regarded as having inspired the Pakistan Movement. He is considered one of the most influential figures in Urdu literature, with 10 books of poetry in Urdu and Persian and three prose books in English. In 1895, he enrolled at the Government College Lahore where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts in philosophy, English literature and Arabic in 1897. In 1899, he obtained MA in Philosophy with an academic distinction. Along with his Urdu and Persian poetry, his Urdu and English lectures and letters have been very influential in cultural, social, religious and political disputes.



Sir Fazl-i-Hussain

(1877-1936)

He was an influential Punjabi politician during the British Raj and a founding member of the Unionist Party of the Punjab. At the age of sixteen he entered Government College, Lahore and graduated with a BA in 1897. He was admitted to Christ's College, Cambridge in 1899 and graduated with a BA in 1901.



Bernard Mouat Jones

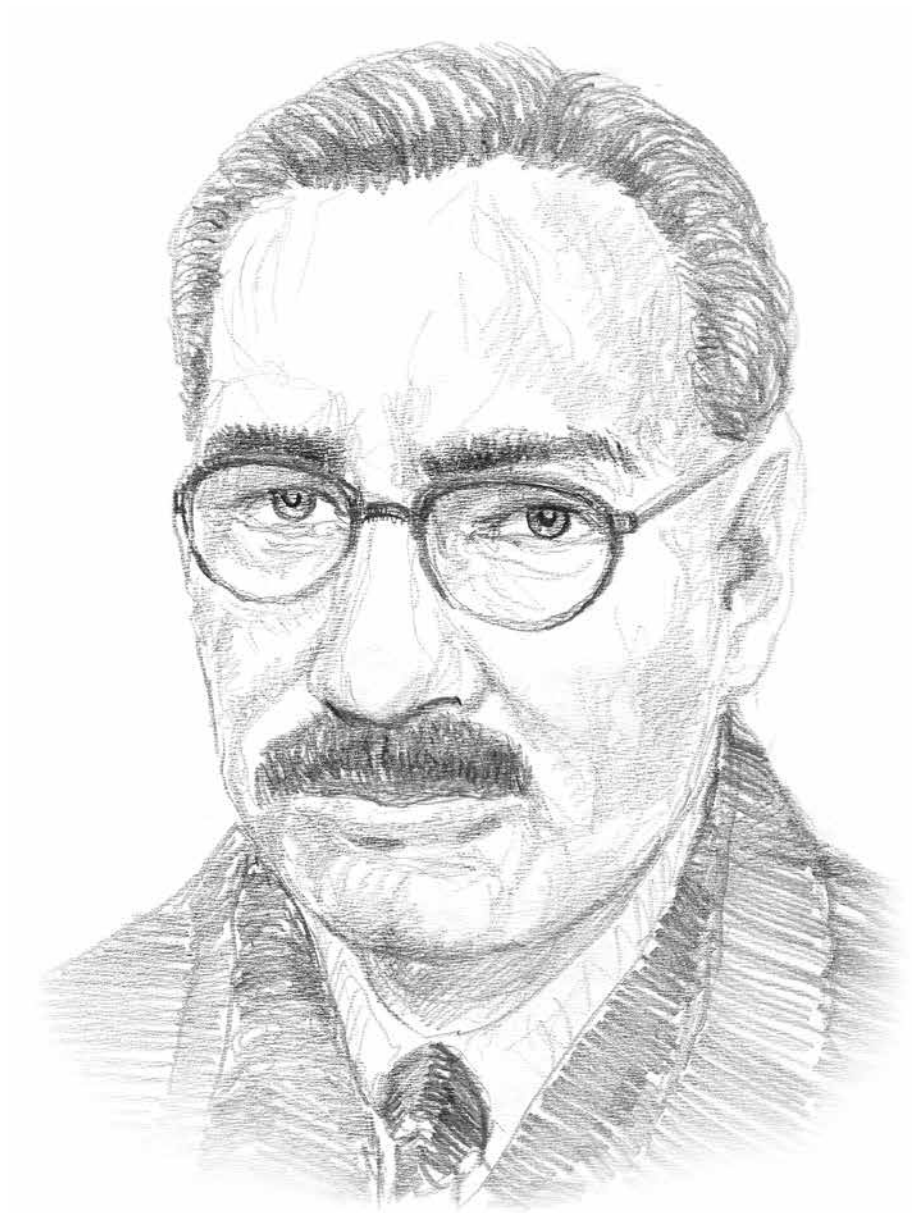
(1882-1953)

He was a chemist, notable for identifying the chemical in mustard gas and the first scientist to be Vice-Chancellor of the University of Leeds. From 1906 he taught chemistry at Government College, Lahore, returning to Britain in 1913 to take up the post of assistant professor at Imperial College of Science and Technology.



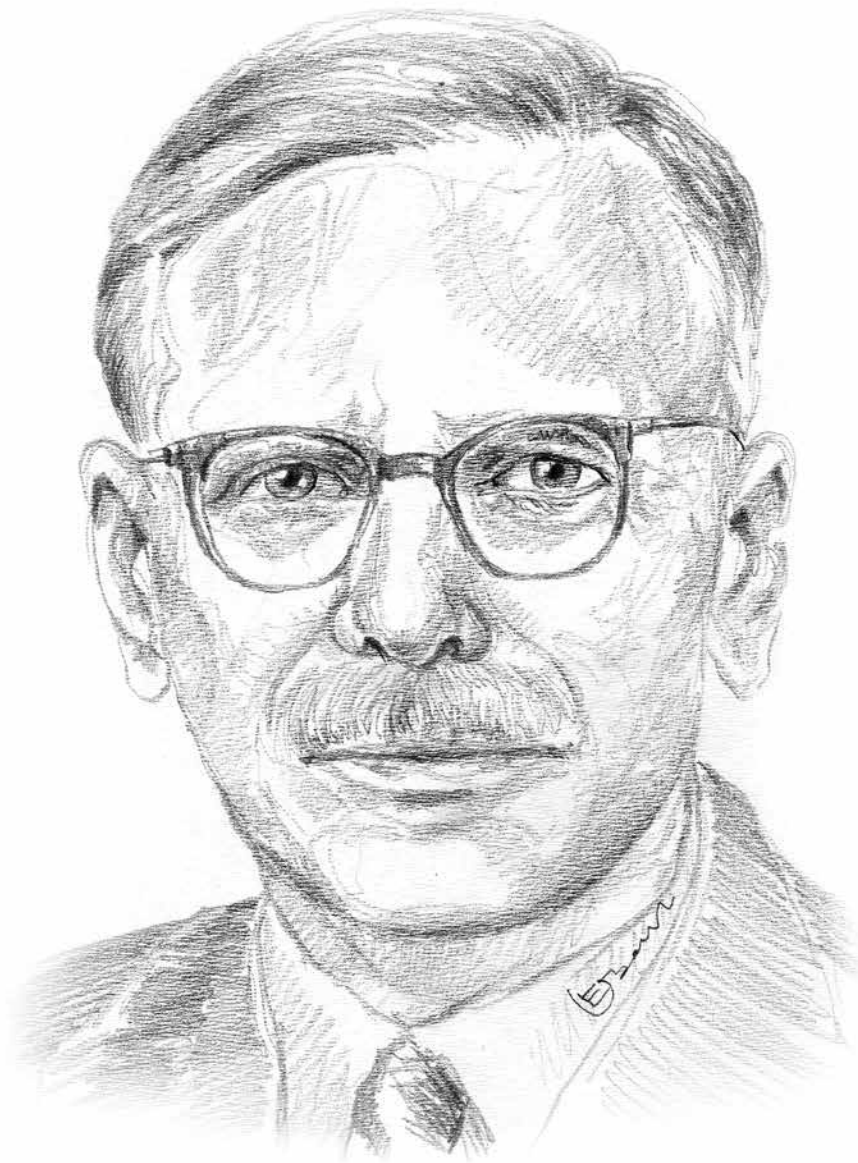
Shiv Ram Kashyap
(1882-1934)

He was a botanist in British India. He was a specialist on the bryophytes especially from the Himalayan region. He has been called the father of Indian bryology.



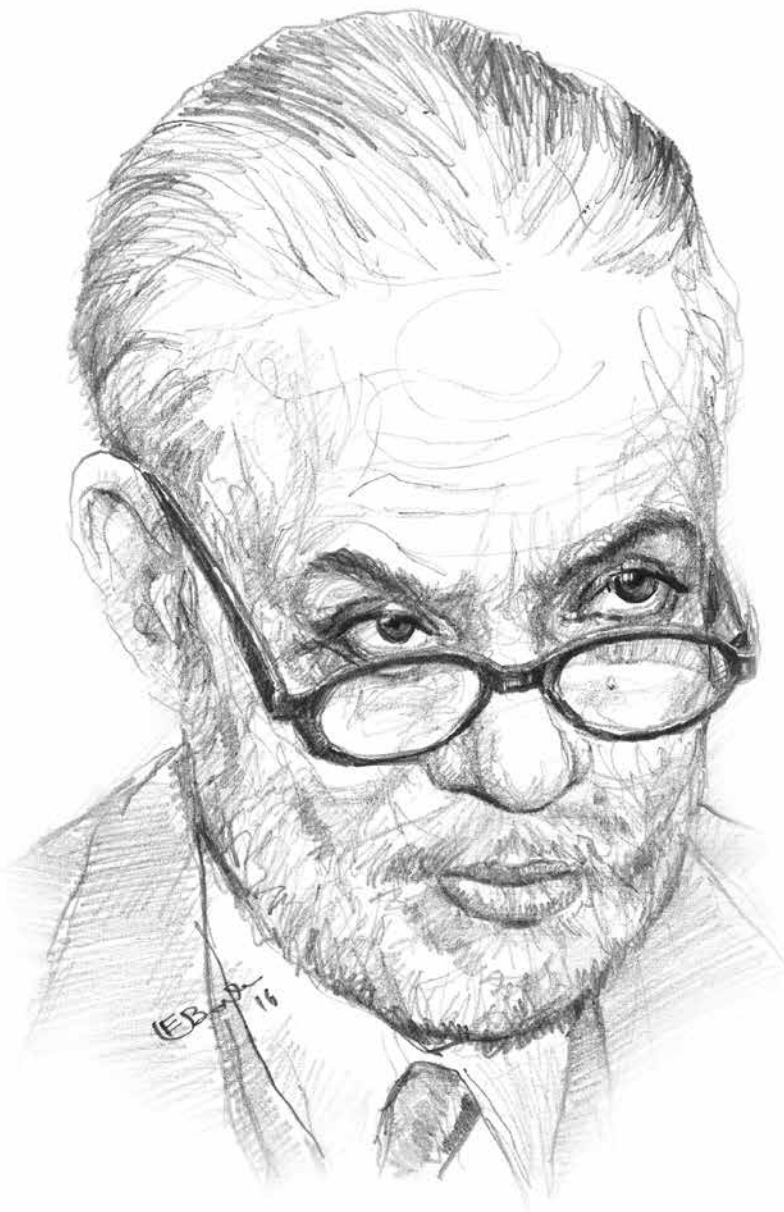
Bihari Lal Bhatia

(1890-1960)

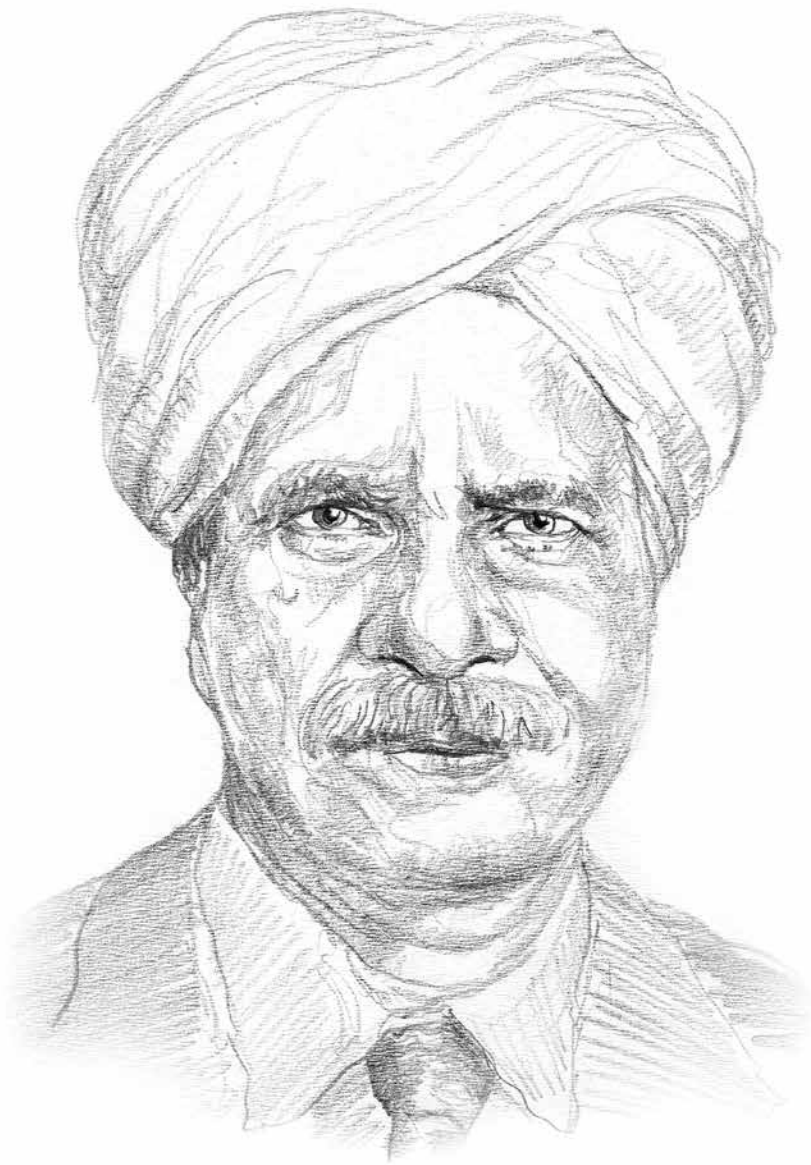
He was an English linguist and a leading figure in British linguistics during the 1950s.



Sir Muhammad Zafarullah Khan

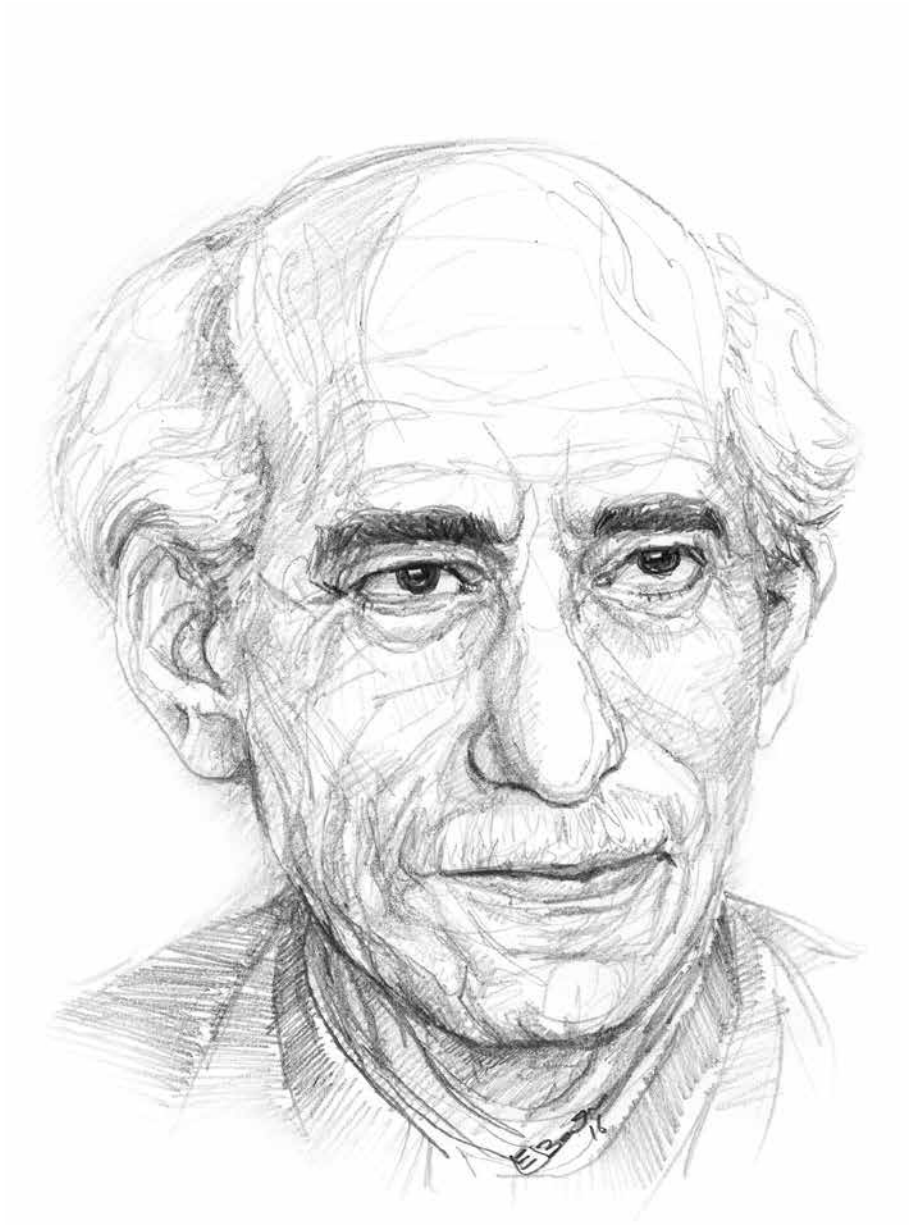

(1896-1967)

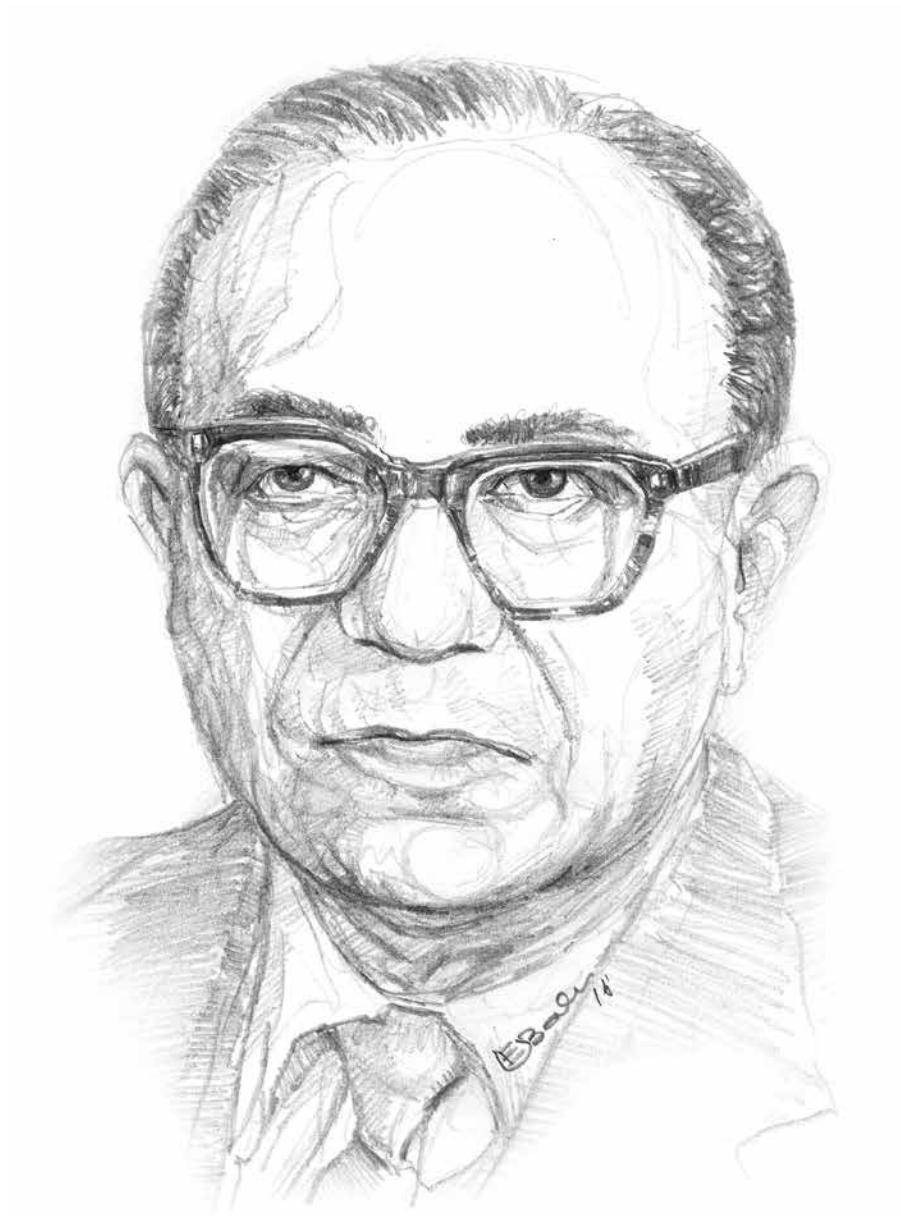
He was a Judge in the small court Lahore and also a student of this time. He had contributed for the development of College.



Ghulam Mustafa Tabassum

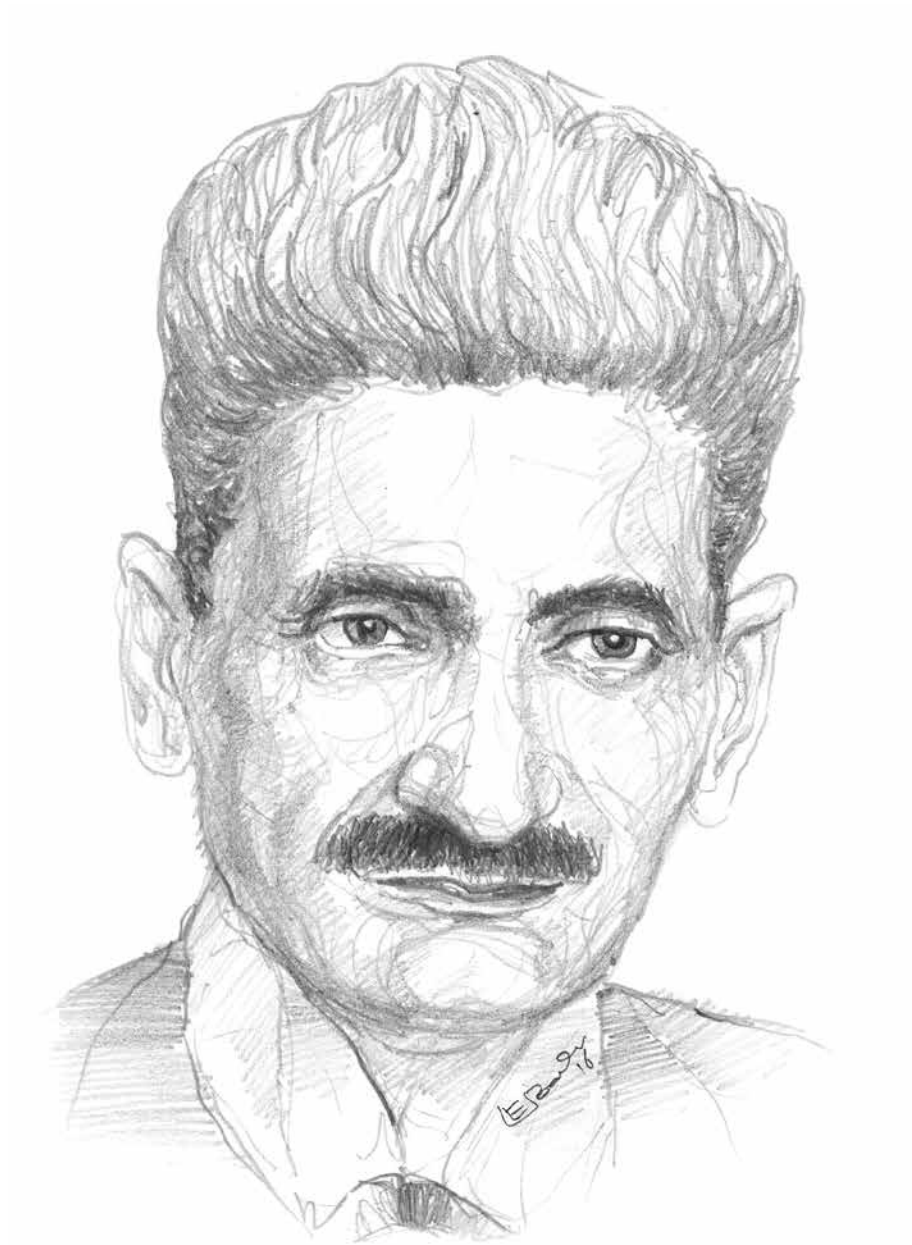
(1899-1978)

He is best known for his many poems written for children, as the creator of the Tot Batot character, and as the translator of many poetical works from Urdu and Persian into Punjabi. He penned down national songs eulogizing the sacrifices of our armed forces during the 1965 and 71 wars. During his life-long association with Government College Lahore as an academic, he groomed many generations of students the most prominent among whom was Faiz Ahmad Faiz.



Syed Imtiaz Ali Taj
(1900-1970)

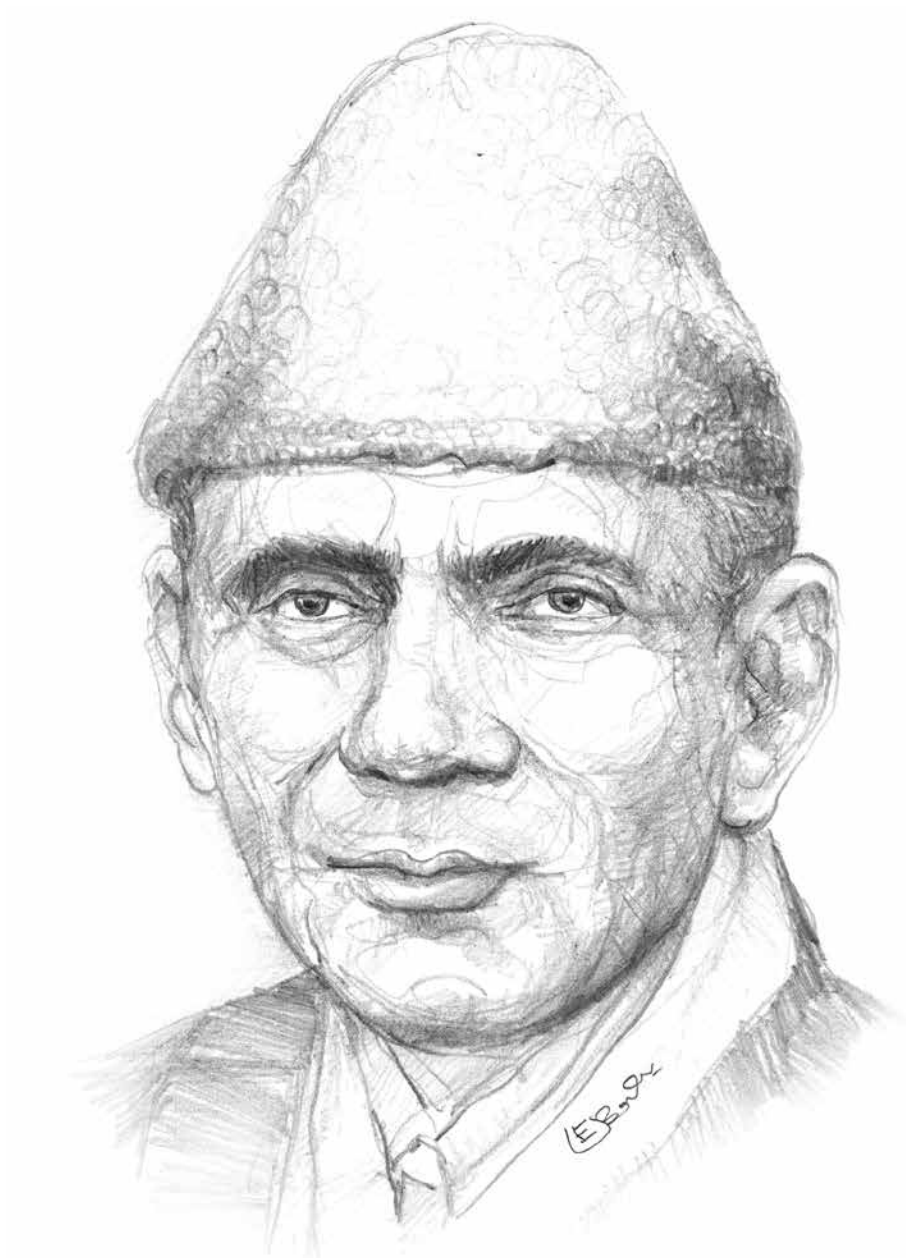
He was an Urdu dramatist. He is remembered above all for his 1922 play *Anarkali*, based on the life of Anarkali. It was staged hundreds of times and was adapted for feature films in India and Pakistan, including the Indian film *Mughal-e-Azam*.



Muhammad Rustam Kayani

(1902-1962)

He was a distinguished Pakistani jurist who served as Chief Justice of West Pakistan from 1958 to 1962. He is noted for his opposition to the dictatorship of General Ayub Khan. His Urdu and English speeches later printed in book form earned him lasting acclaim as a satirist. He did his Master's degree in English from Government College Lahore.



Dr. Rafi Muhammad Chaudhry

(1903-1988)

He was a Nuclear physicist and a Professor of Particle Physics at the Government College Lahore. He is widely regarded as having been the pioneer of experimental Nuclear Physics research in Pakistan. Chaudhry joined the Cavendish Laboratory of the University of Cambridge.

At Cambridge, Chaudhry studied Calculus of mathematical Integrals, and learned Tensor calculus, quantum physics, and general relativity under Nobel laureate in Chemistry Ernest Rutherford. In 1952, Chaudhry established the "High Tension Laboratory" (now "Centre for Advanced Studies in Physics") as an offshoot of the Physics Department at Government College Lahore.



K. L. Saigal
(1904-1947)

He was an Indian singer and actor who is considered the first superstar of the Hindi film industry. Saigal's unique voice quality which was a mixture of baritone and soft tenor was the benchmark for most of the singers who followed him. In fact it remains the gold standard even today shining through very early and practically primitive recording technology.



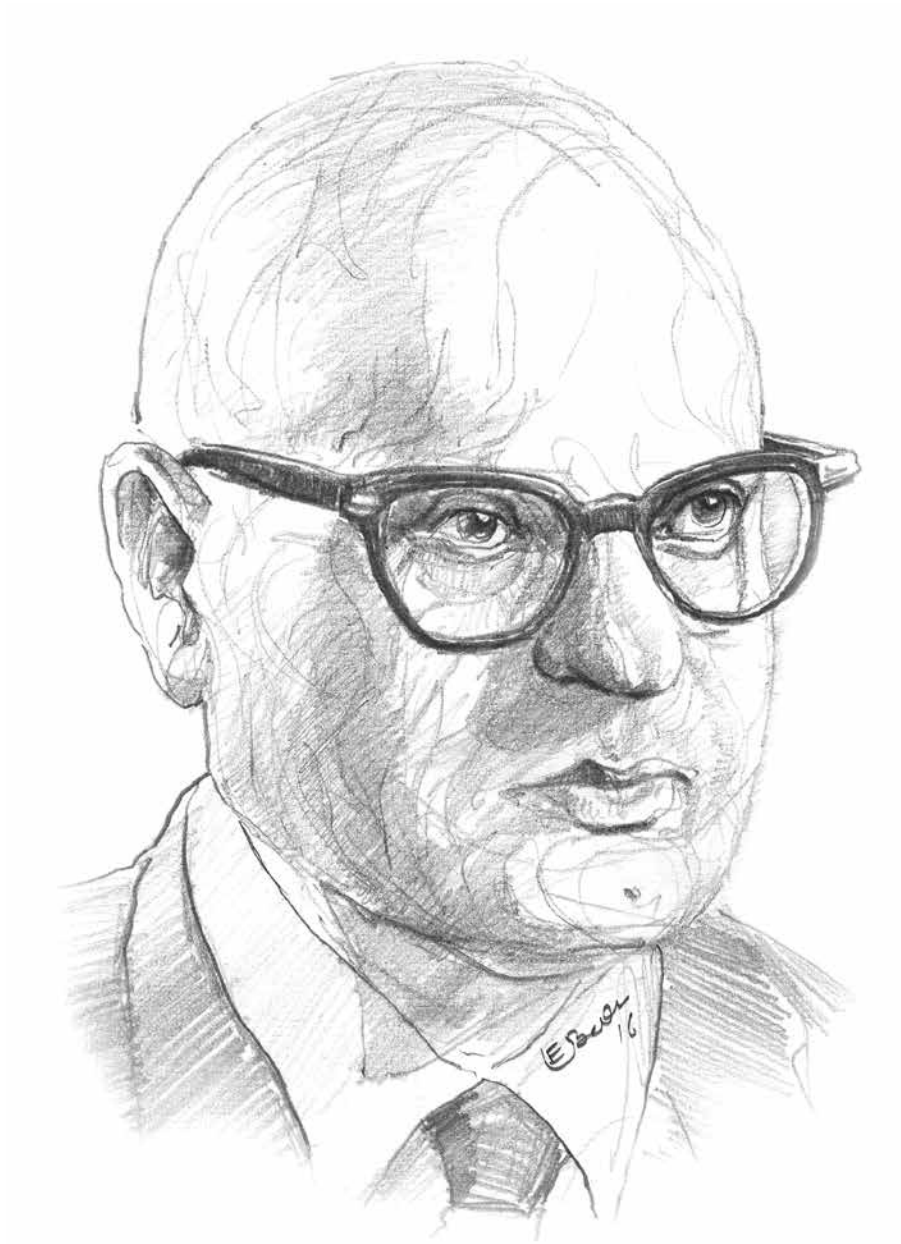
Malik Ram
(1906-1993)

Malik Ram, a renowned Urdu, Persian and Arabic scholar from India, born on 22 December 1906 in Phalia. After his schooling in Wazirabad, he was educated at Government College, Lahore. An internationally acclaimed authority on Mirza Ghalib, the Urdu and Persian poet, Malik Ram was also one of the leading Urdu writers and critics of his time. He published about eighty works in his lifetime, including those he had edited. His works are in Urdu, Persian, Arabic and English, but predominantly in Urdu, and cover literary, religious and historical subjects. In addition, he wrote well over 200 erudite articles and essays in Urdu for literary journals in India and Pakistan.



Sarvadaman D. S. Chowla
(1907-1995)

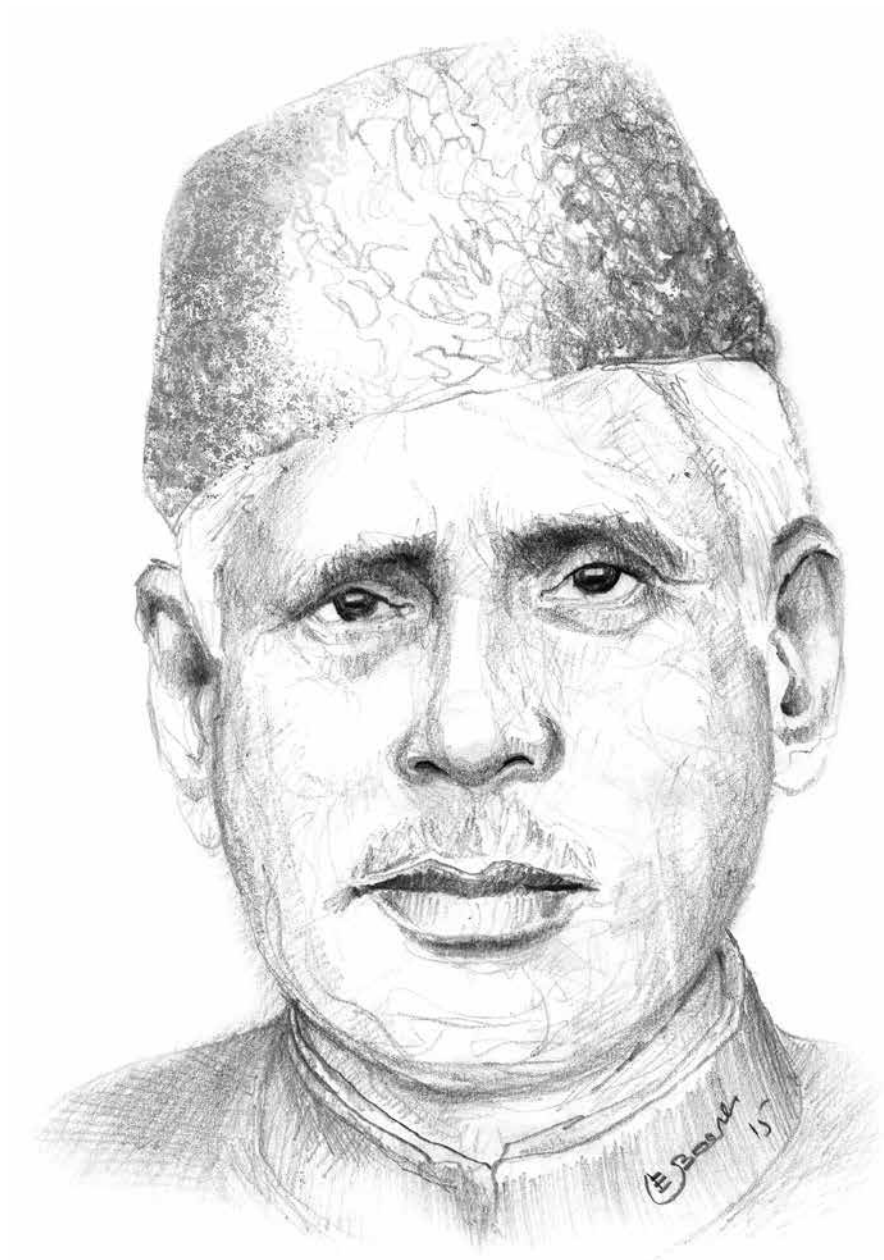
He was a distinguished mathematician, specializing in number theory. He received his master's degree in 1928 from the Government College in Lahore. In 1931 he received his doctorate from the University of Cambridge. Among his contributions are a number of results which bear his name. These include the Bruck-Ryser-Chowla theorem, the Ankeny-Artin-Chowla congruence, the Chowla-Mordell theorem, and the Chowla-Selberg formula, and the Mian-Chowla sequence.



Nazar Muhammad Rashed

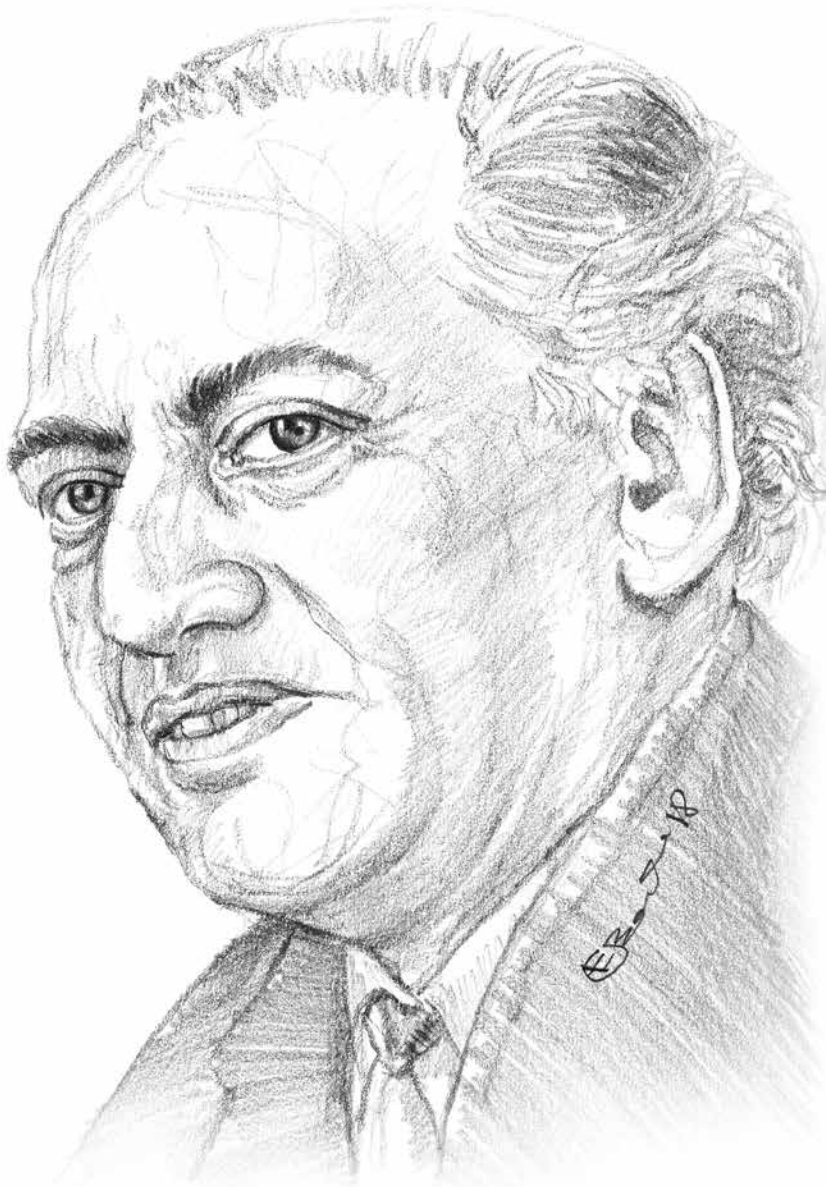
(1910-1975)

He was an influential Pakistani poet of modern Urdu poetry. He rebelled against the traditional form of 'ghazal' and became the first major exponent of 'free verse' in Urdu literature. In an age when Pakistani literature and culture acknowledge their Middle Eastern roots, Rashed highlighted the Persian element in the making of his nation's history and psyche. He earned a master's degree in Economics from the Government College Lahore. He worked with All India Radio, Radio Pakistan and the Voice of America. He also worked for the United Nations and worked in many countries.



Dr. Sultan Ahmad
(1910-1983)

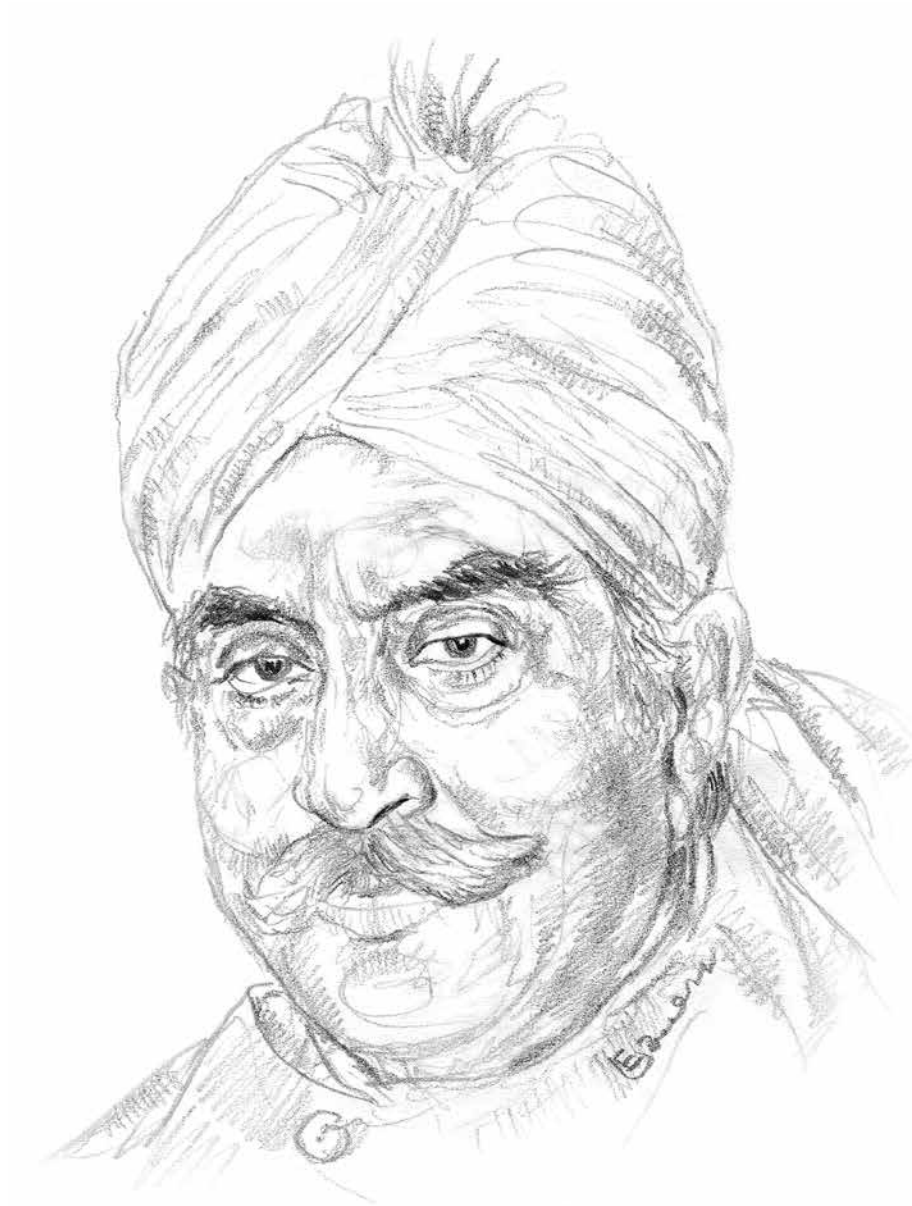
A legendary Mycologist and Taxonomist of international repute, Dr Sultan Ahmed, in 1953, founded the Biological Society of Pakistan and served as Editor of *Biologia*. In recognition of his significant contributions to scientific research, the government of Pakistan awarded him the Tamgha-I-Quaid-e-Azam and the Pakistan Academy of Sciences elected him as Fellow of the Academy in 1974.



Faiz Ahmad Faiz

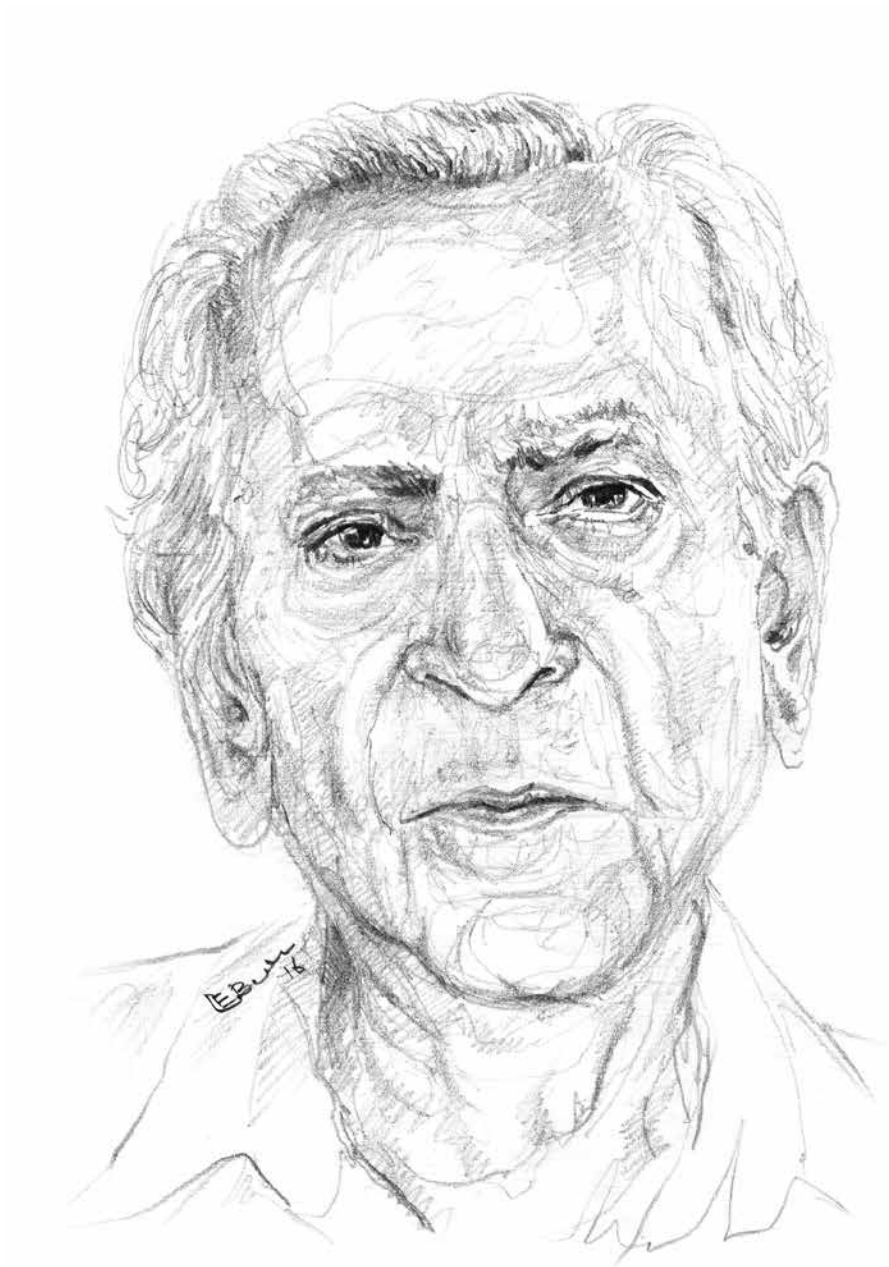
(1911-1984)

He was an intellectual, revolutionary poet, editor and one of the most celebrated writers of the Urdu language, having been nominated four times for the Nobel Prize for literature. He received the Lenin Peace Prize by the Soviet Union in 1962. His work remains influential in Pakistan literature and arts. Pakistan Government conferred upon him the nation's highest civil award, Nishan-e-Imtiaz, in 1990.



Syed Wajid Ali
(1911-2008)

He was a leading industrialist of Pakistan who is also known for his services to the Olympic Movement. He became the President of Pakistan Olympic Association in 1978 and stayed on the post for 26 years. He is also known for promoting arts and culture as well as Red Crescent (Red Cross) in Pakistan.



Prakash Tandon

(1911-2004)

He attained fame for his classic account of Punjabi life in his autobiographical book "Punjabi Century," the first part of a trilogy of which the next two parts were "Beyond Punjab" and "Return to Punjab". He was the first Indian Chairman of Hindustan Lever Ltd. He acquired the degree of chartered accountancy from London and was one of the pioneers of professional management in India.



Khwaja Khurshid Anwar
(1912-1984)

He was a filmmaker, writer, director and music composer. He is widely credited as being one of the most original and inventive music directors of his generation. He earned an academic distinction in MA Philosophy at Government College, Lahore. He preserved the legacy of Muslim classical singers under the title Aahang-e-Khusravi in two parts in 1978. Each Raag has a short introduction in the voice of Khurshid Anwar explaining the characteristics of the Raag followed by its audio performance by renowned classical singers of Pakistan. He was awarded the coveted Sitara-e-Imtiaz award by the Government of Pakistan in 1980. In 1976, he paid tribute to Amir Khusro on the occasion of his 700th Birth Anniversary Celebrations in Pakistan through the EMI recordings of Khusro's music and a book on the history of music.



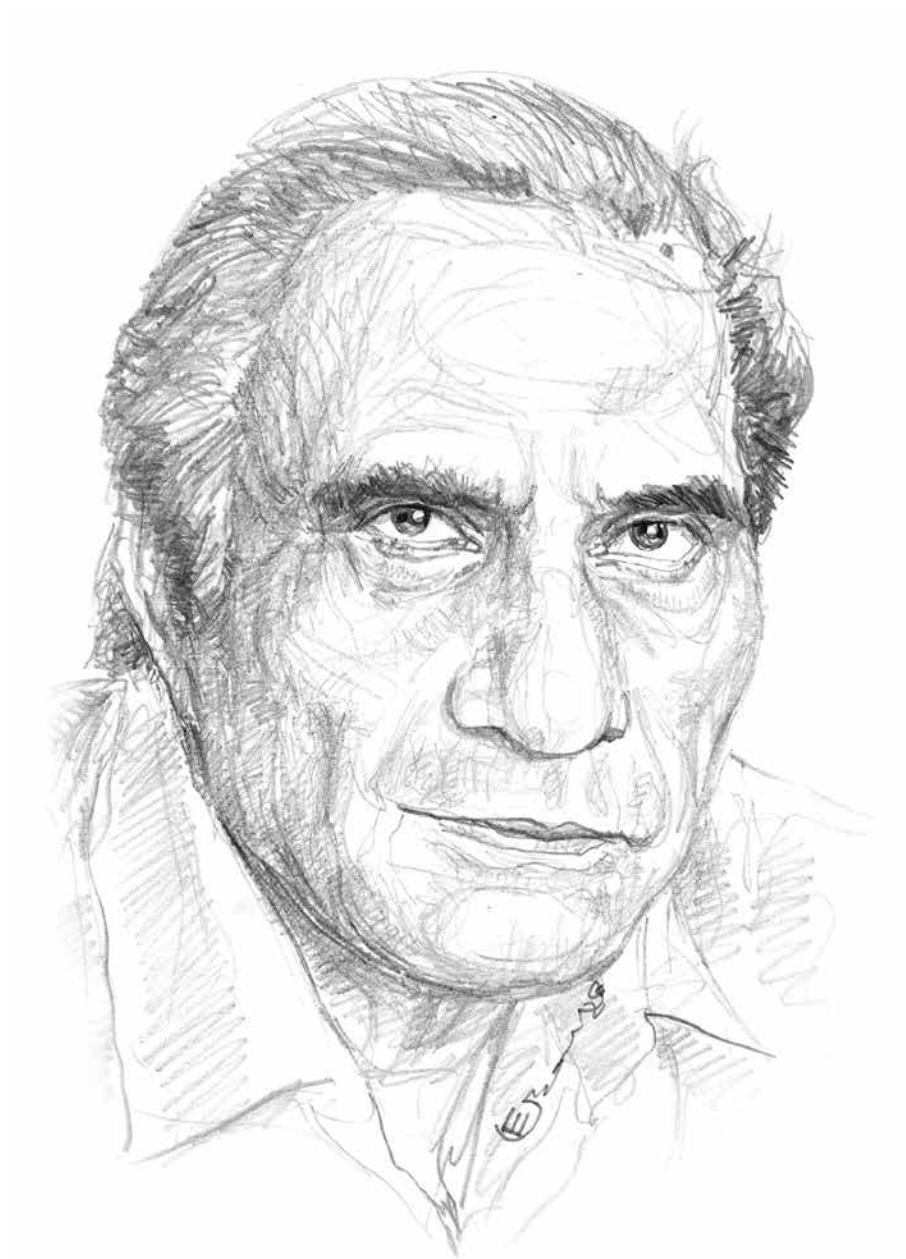
Balraj Sahni
(1913-1973)

He was a noted Indian film and stage actor, who is best known for *Dharti Ke Lal* (1946), *Do Bigha Zameen* (1953), *Kabuliwala* (1961) and *Garam Hawa* (1973). He completed his MA in English Literature from Government College Lahore.



Aziz Ahmad
(1914-1978)

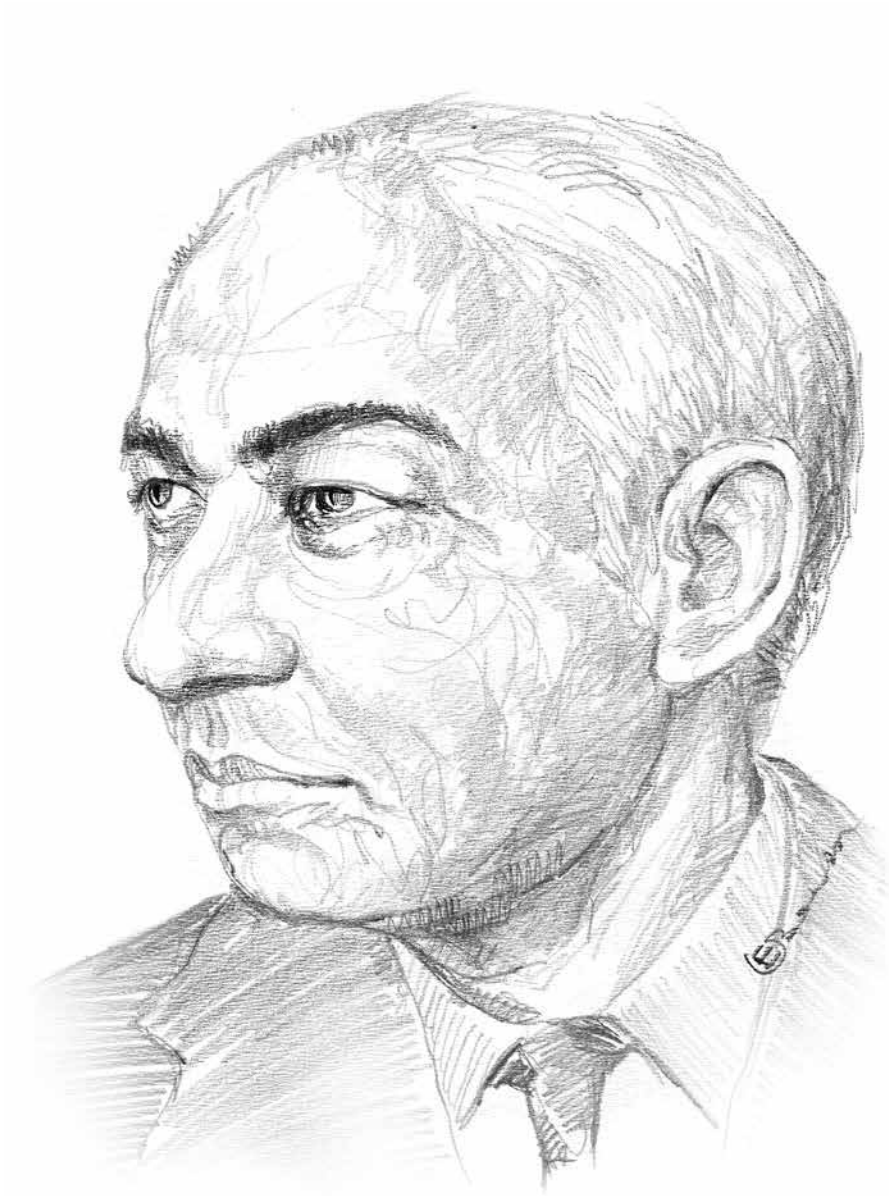
He was a noted Urdu poet, short story writer, novelist, translator, historian, research scholar, Iqbal scholar and critic from Pakistan. His work in Islamic history is considered significant. Baldev Raj Chopra

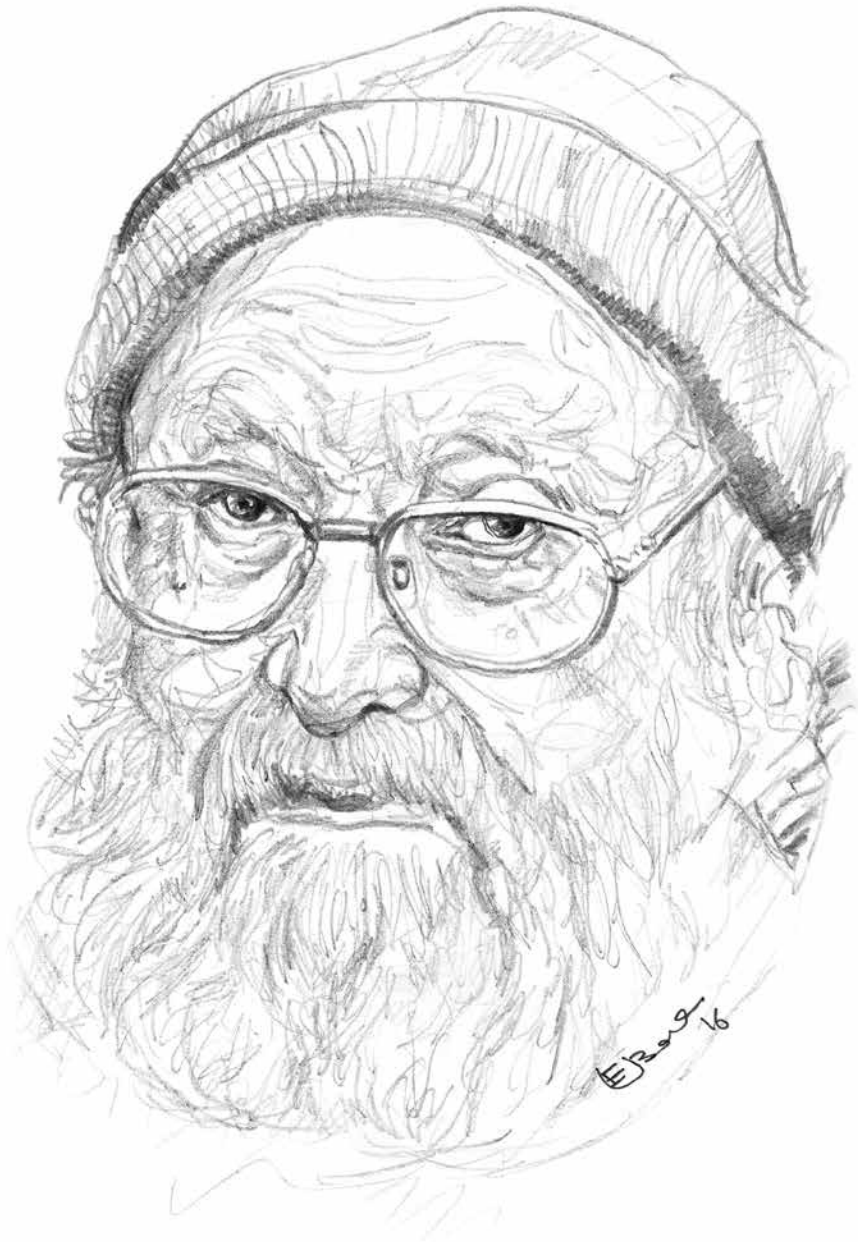
(1914-2008)

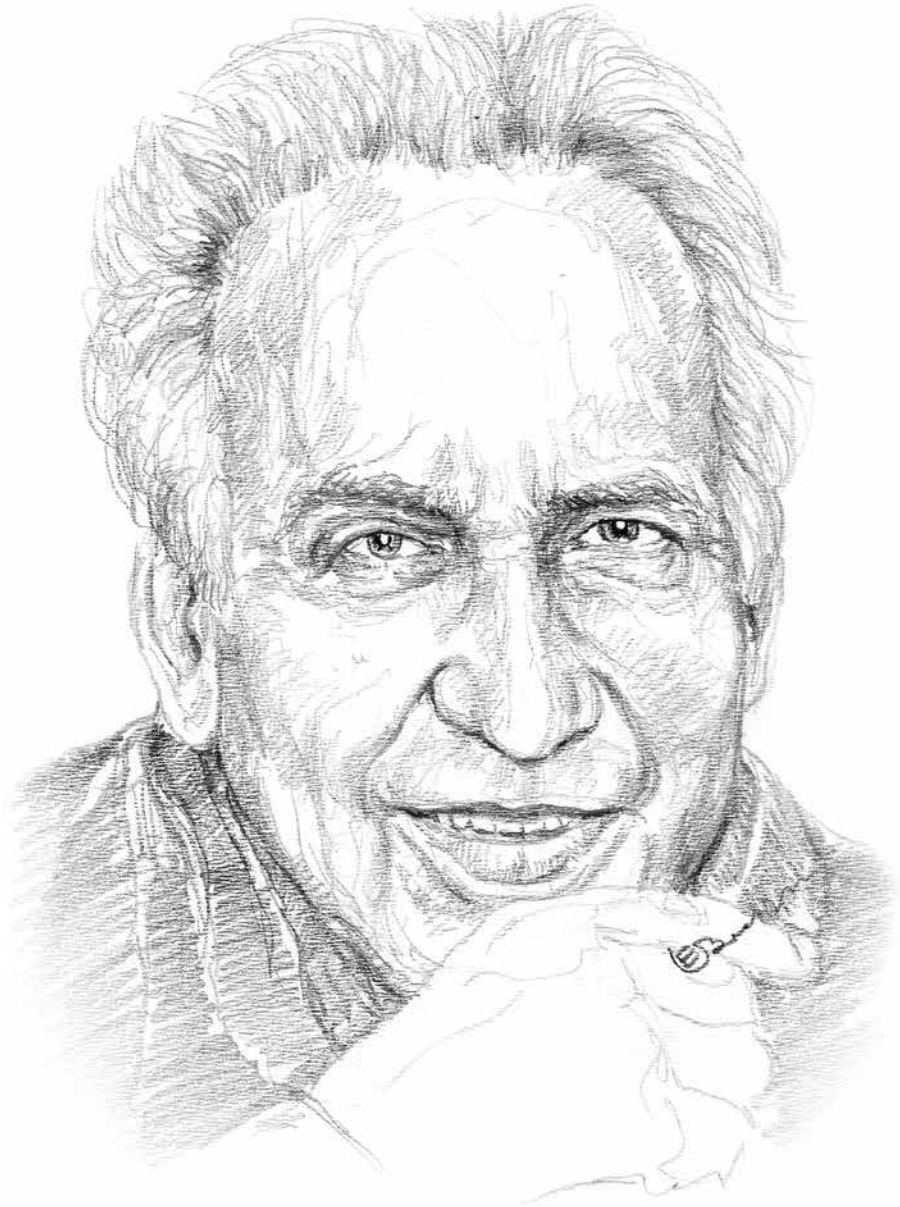
Syed Ali Abbas Jalalpuri

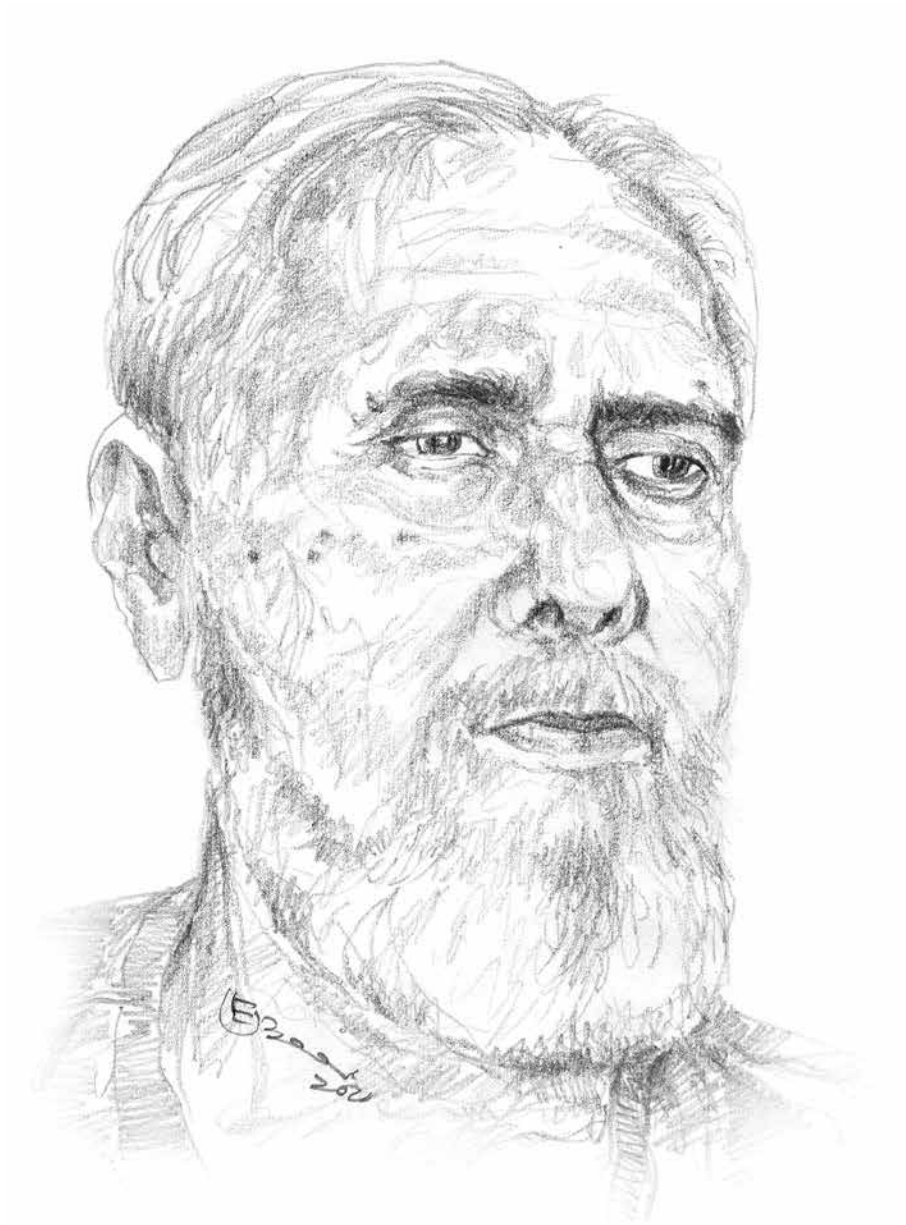
Khushwant Singh

(1916-2003)

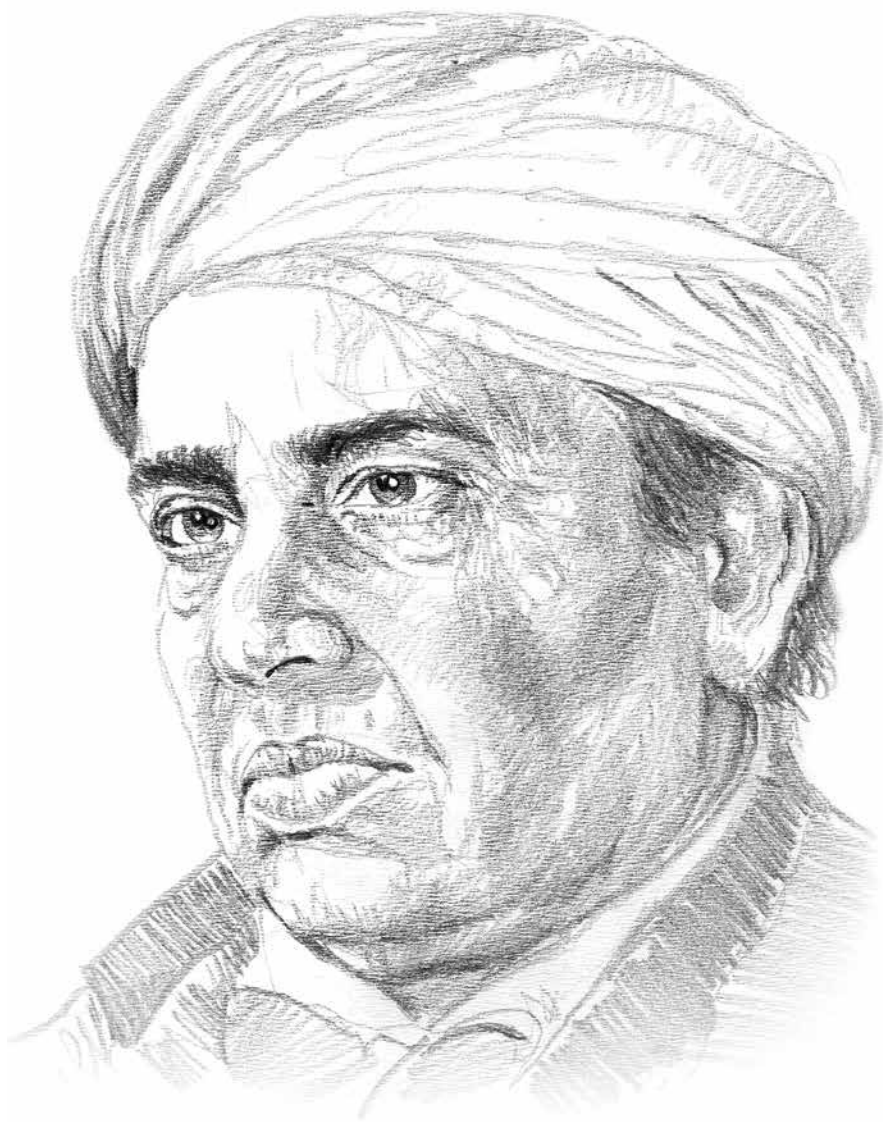

(1920-1986)

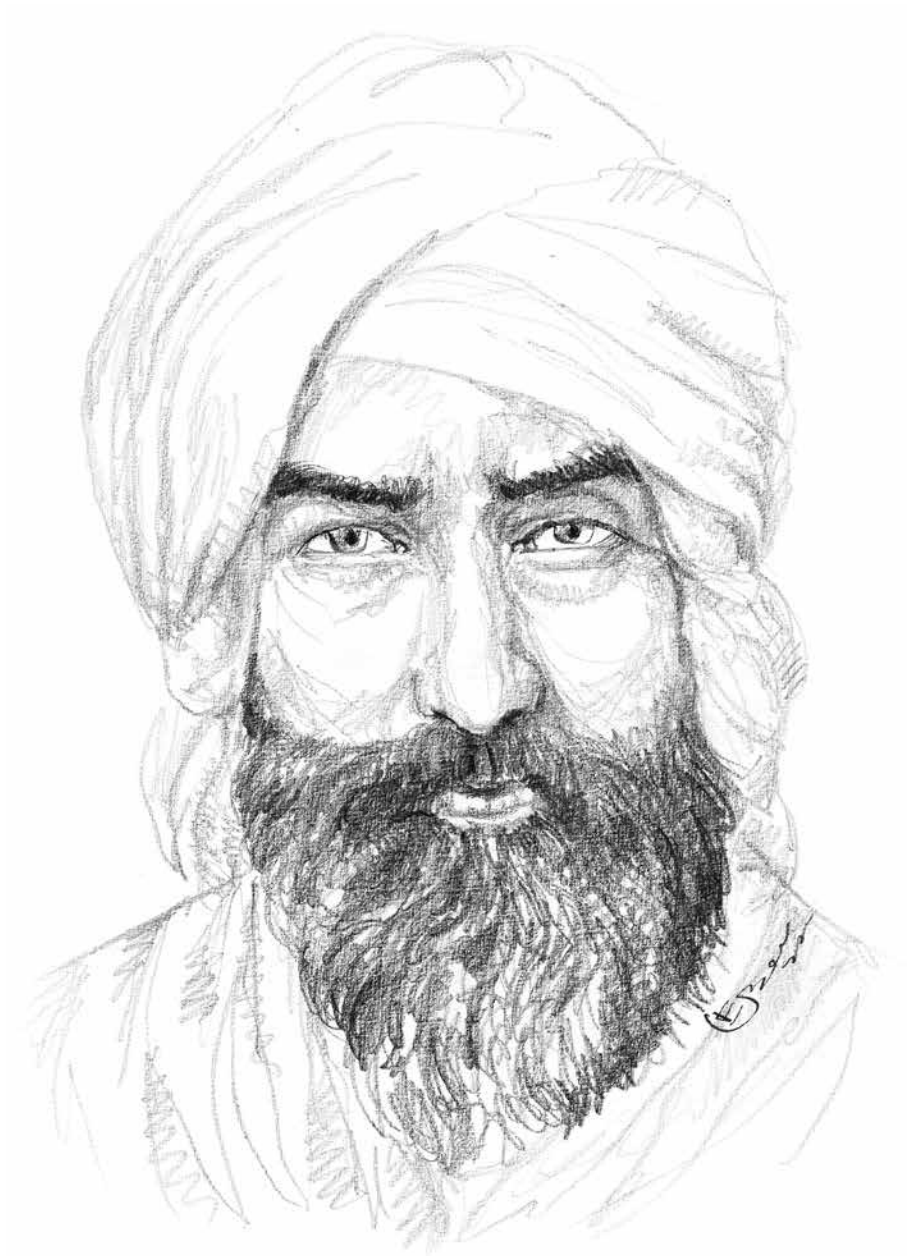

Inder Sen Johar

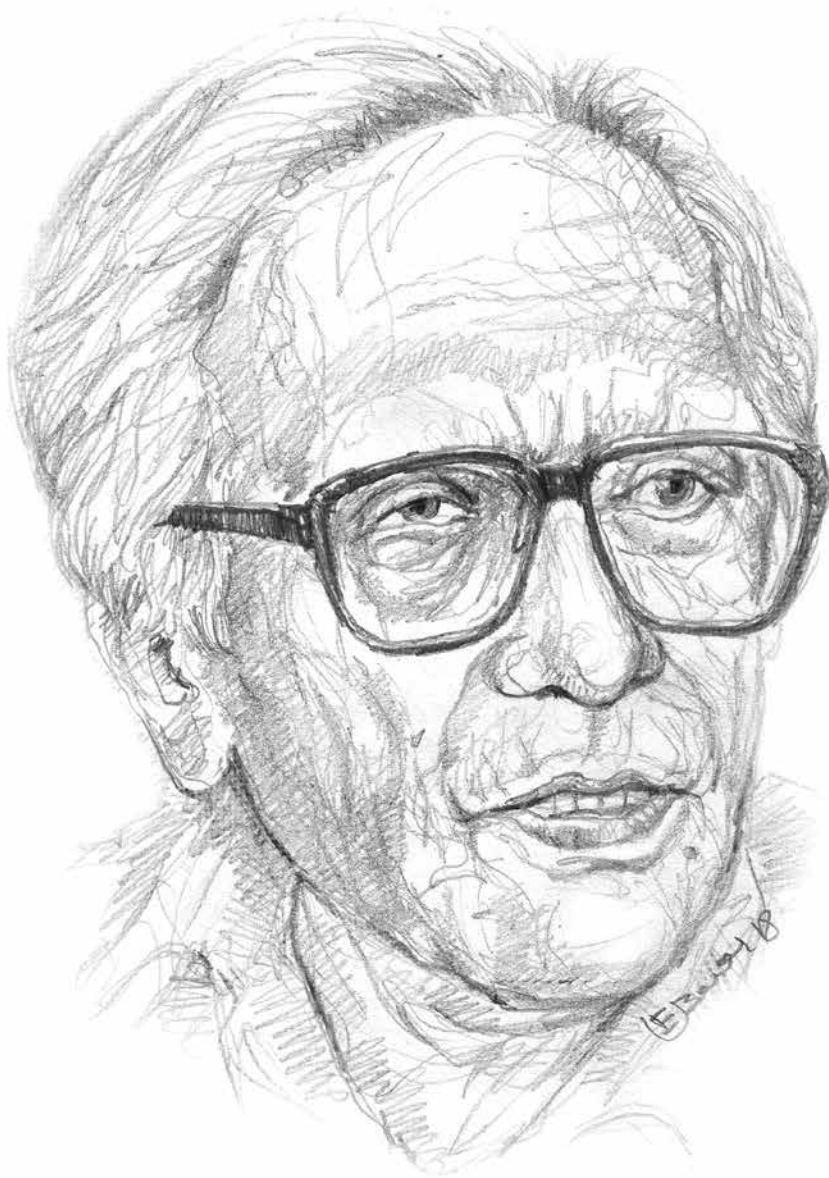
(1920-1984)

He was an Indian recipient of the Victoria Cross (VC), the highest and most prestigious award for gallantry in the face of the enemy that can be awarded to British and Commonwealth forces.



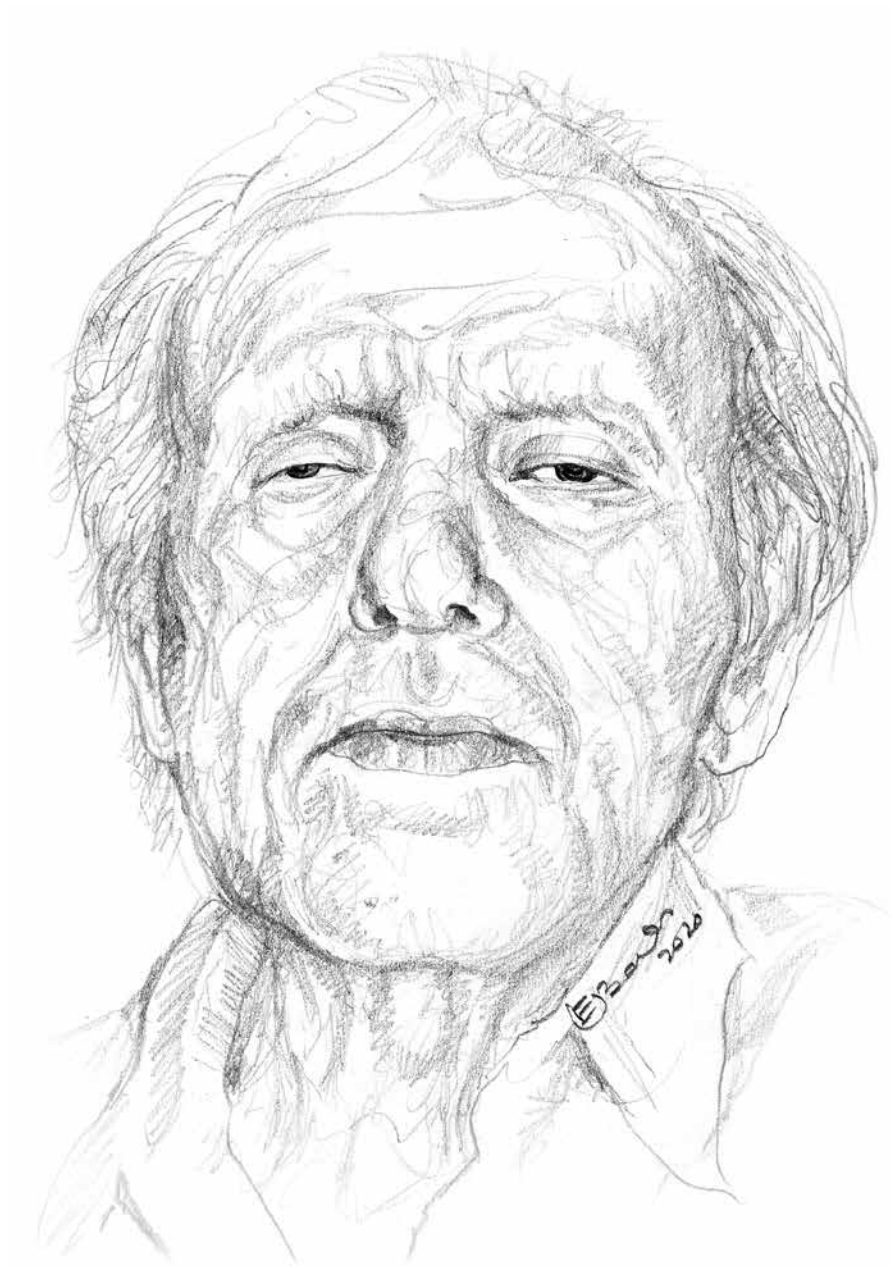
Chettan Annad

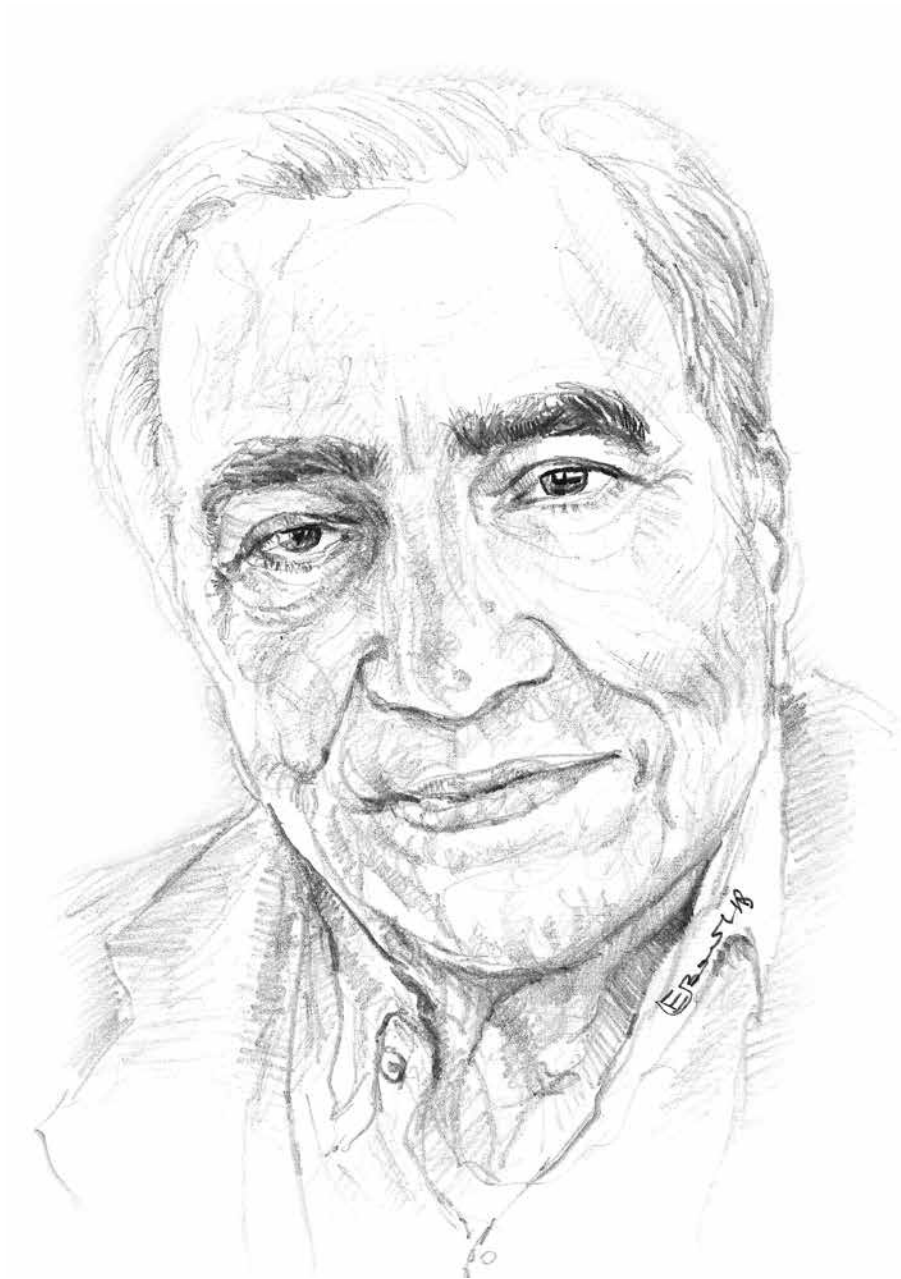
Har Gobind Khorana

Agha's poems have mostly an element of story. Agha has received Sitara-e-Imtiaz for his best contributions to Urdu literature.



Pran Neville
(1922-2018)

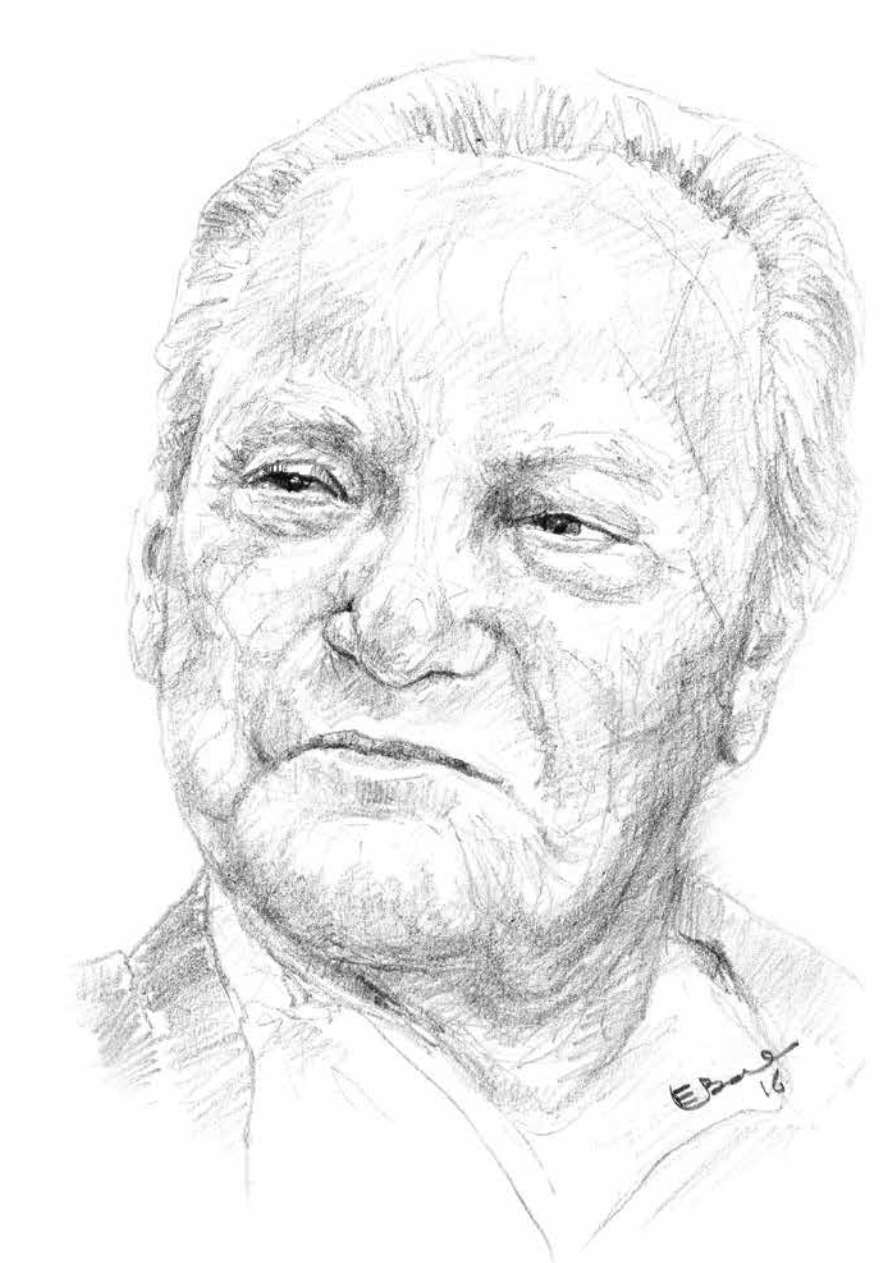
He was an Indian author of Indian Art, Indian Culture & Indian History best known for the 1992 book, *Lahore: A Sentimental Journey*. He was an authority on pre-1947 Lahore and Nautch. Neville was born in Lahore and took his post graduate degree from Government College. He had a distinguished career in the Indian Foreign Service and the United Nations. After retirement, he turned a freelance writer and specialized in the study of Indian art and culture.



Dharam Dev Anand

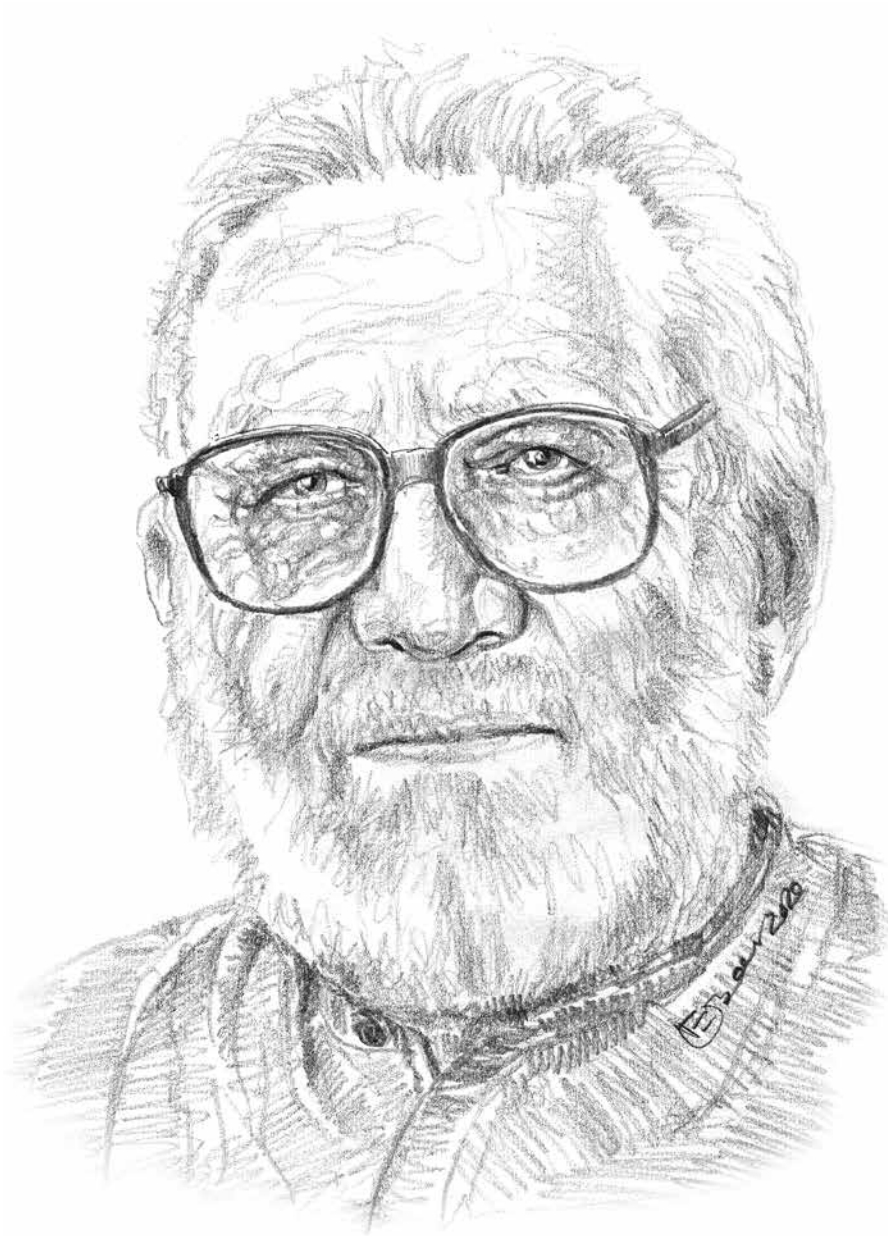
(1923-2011)

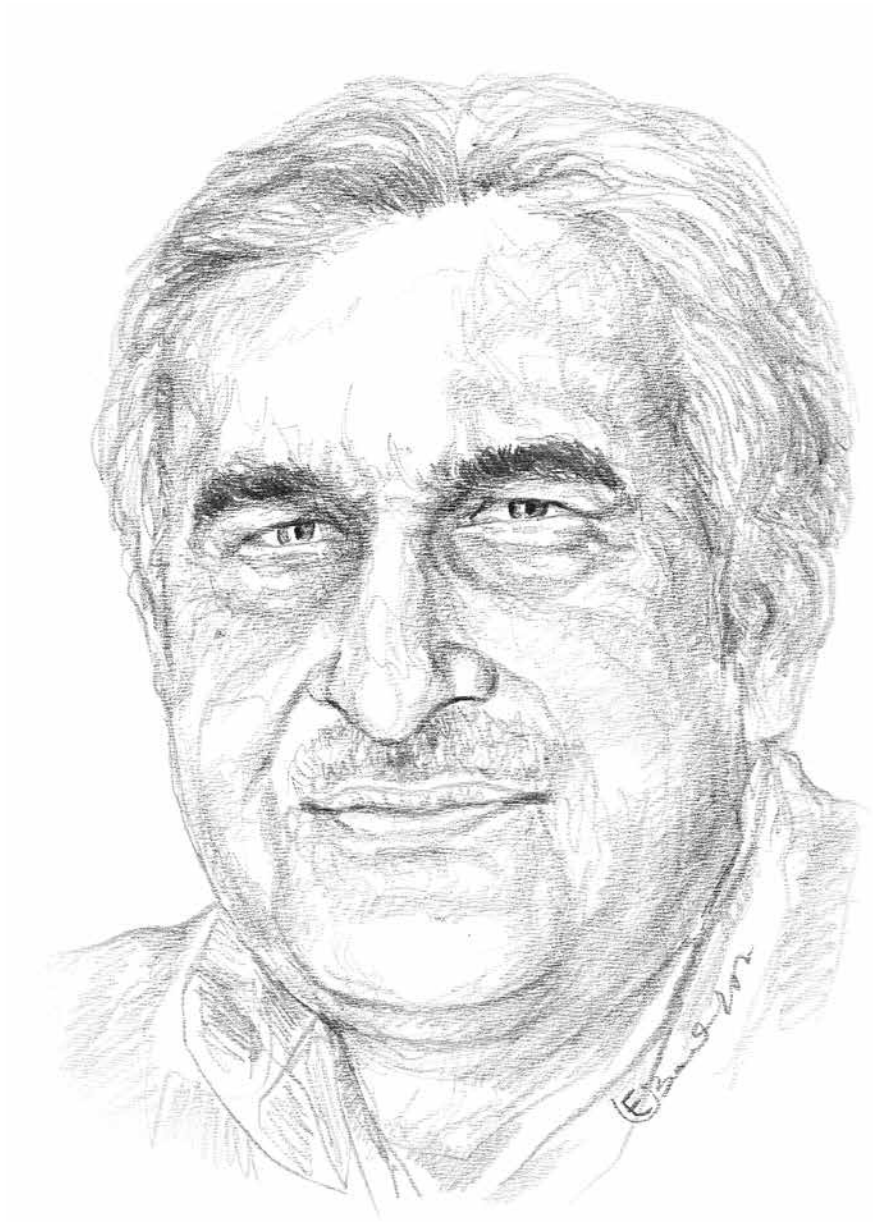
Justice Dr. Javed Iqbal

(1925-2009)

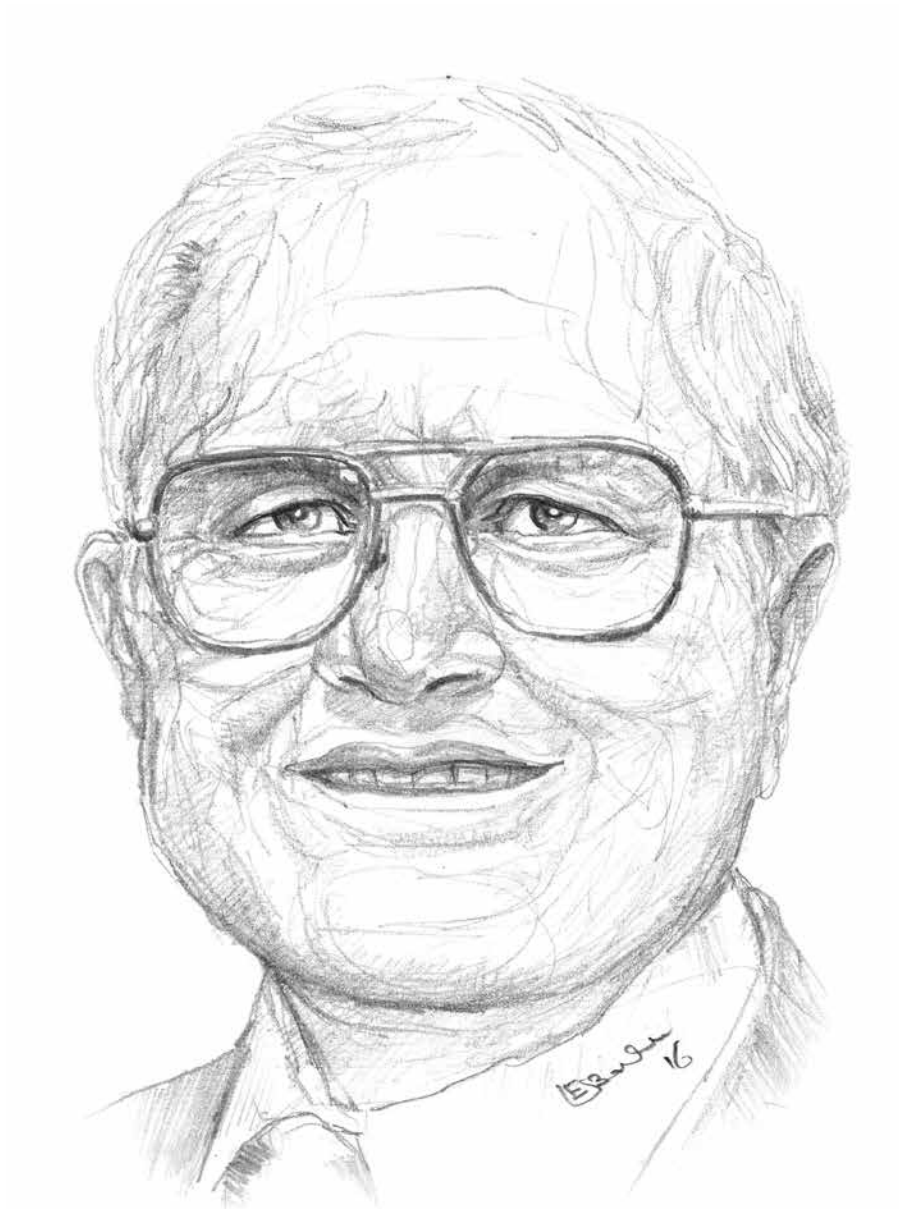
He was a noted linguist, literary critic, writer, researcher, educationalist and scholar of Urdu literature and oriental languages. Qureshi was one of the foremost scholars who helped shape the mood and colour of research on oriental languages and literature.



Dr. Mohammad Abdus Salam

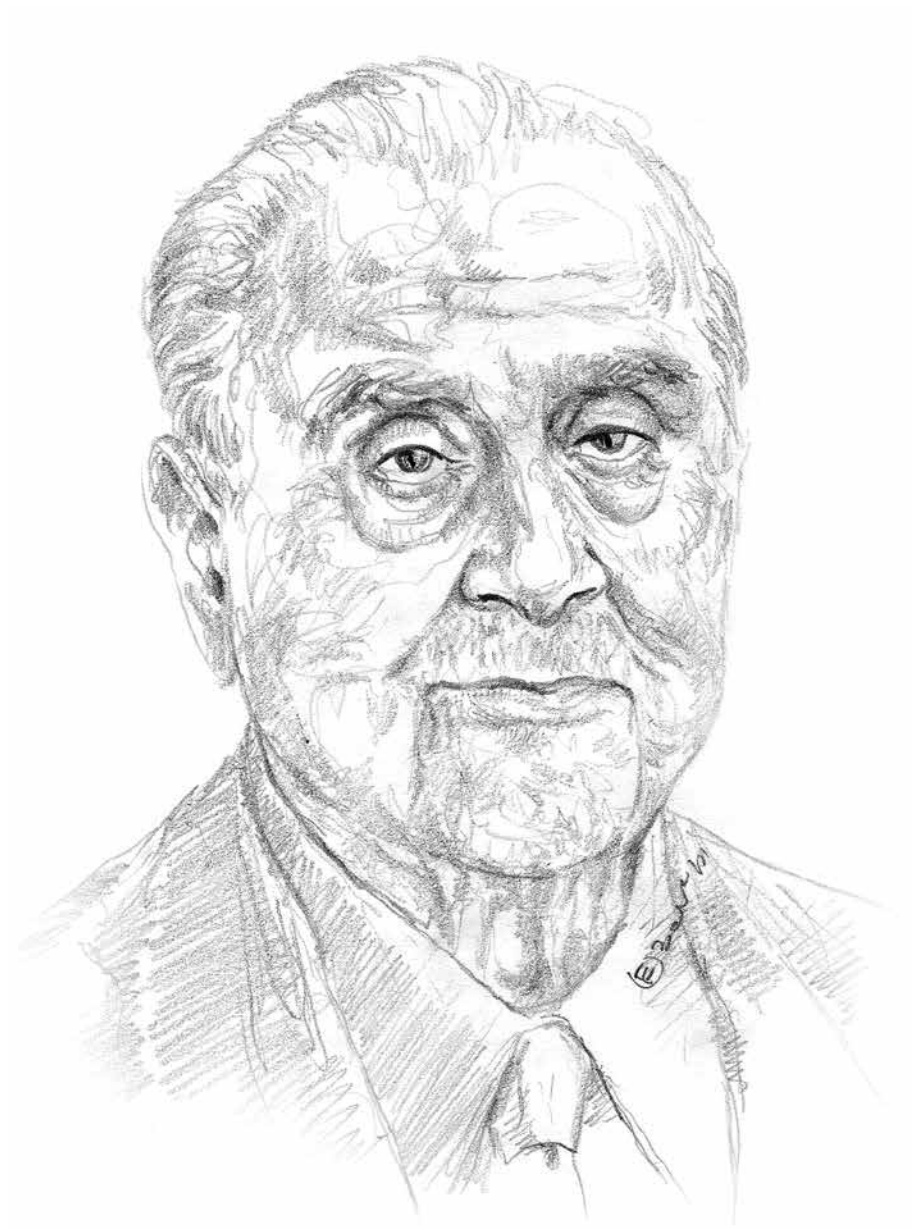
(1926-1996)

He was a renowned theoretical Physicist. A major figure in 20th century theoretical Physics, he shared the 1979 Nobel Prize in Physics with Sheldon Glashow and Steven Weinberg for his contribution to the electroweak unification theory. After receiving his doctorate in 1951, Salam returned to Lahore at the Government College University as a Professor of Mathematics where he remained till 1954. Salam went back to Cambridge and joined St John's College, and took a position as a Professor of Mathematics in 1954. In 1957, he was invited to take a chair at Imperial College, London, and he and Paul Matthews went on to set up the Theoretical Physics Department at Imperial College, London. He established the International Centre for Theoretical Physics in Trieste, Italy. He was its first director.



Munir Ahmad Khan
(1926-1999)

He was a Pakistani nuclear engineer and a nuclear physicist, who served as the chairman of the Pakistan Atomic Energy Commission (PAEC) from 1972 to 1991. He is credited among the persons who are called as "father of the Pakistan's atomic bomb project" for their role in Pakistan's integrated atomic bomb project.



Syed Babar Ali

(born 1926)

He is a notable businessman, philanthropist and former caretaker Finance Minister of Pakistan.

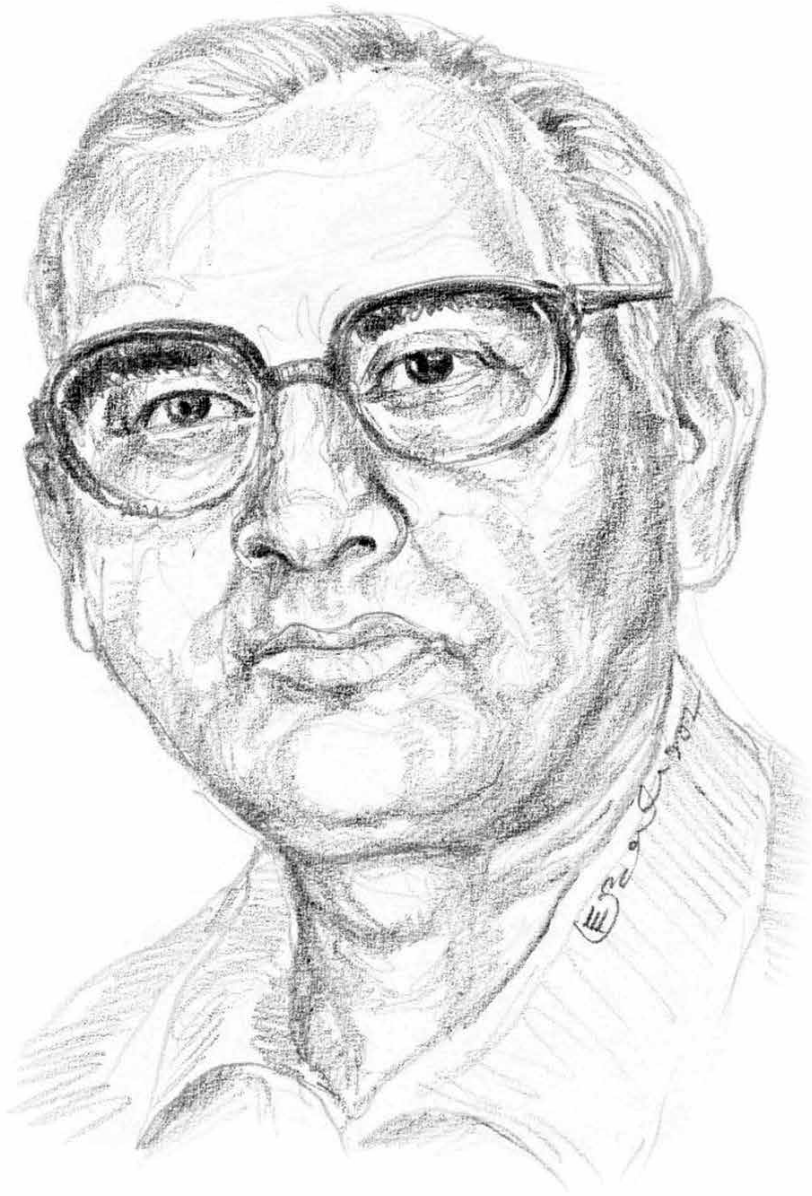
He is the founder of Packages Limited, Milkpak Limited—now Nestlé Pakistan and Lahore University of Management Sciences. Syed Babar Ali School of Science and Engineering is named after him. He promoted the cause of the World Wide Fund for Nature where he served in various positions, both in Pakistan and internationally as he served the International President of WWF from 1996 to 1999.



Gilani Kamran

(born 1926)

He was a leading critic, scholar and a poet of considerable merit. His literary work represent a special philosophy which he had developed by synthesizing Sufism and Existentialism. 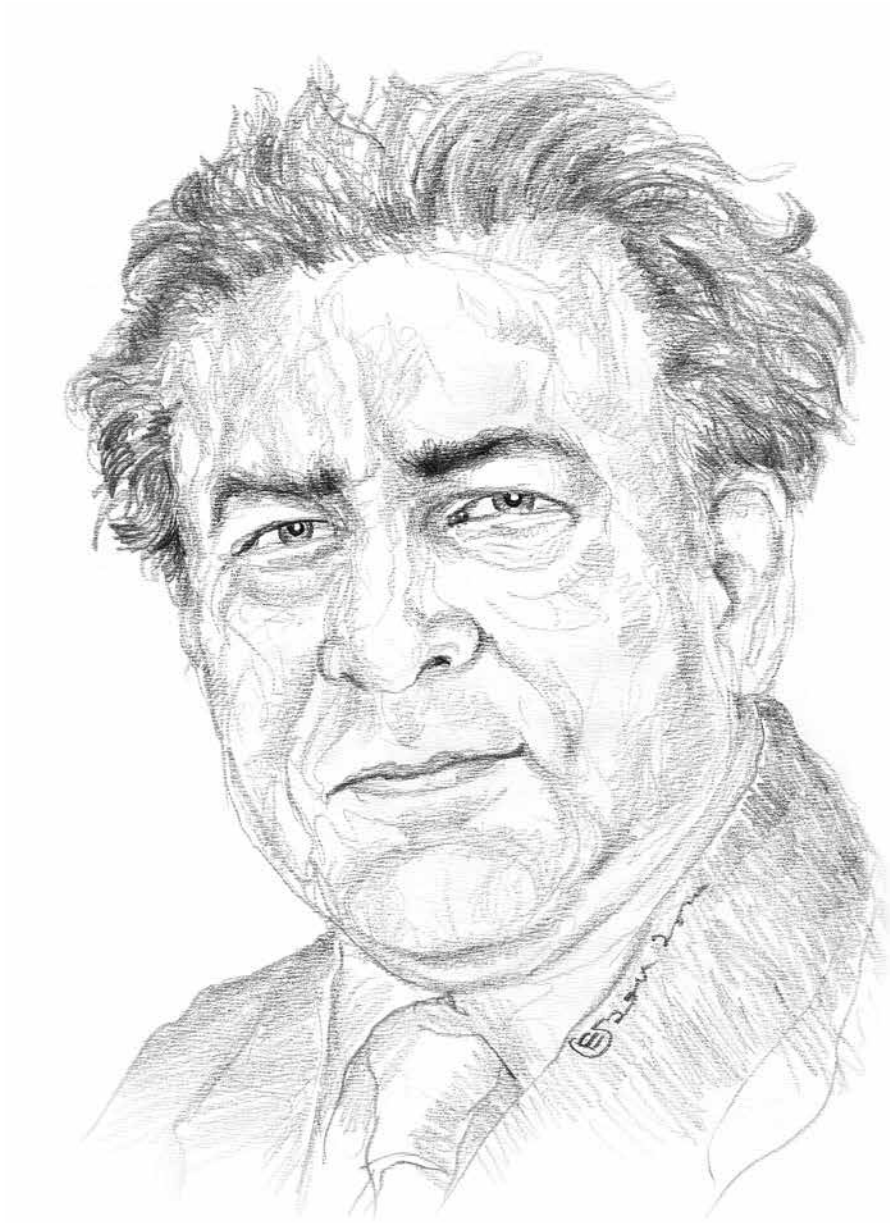
Khursheed Kamal Aziz

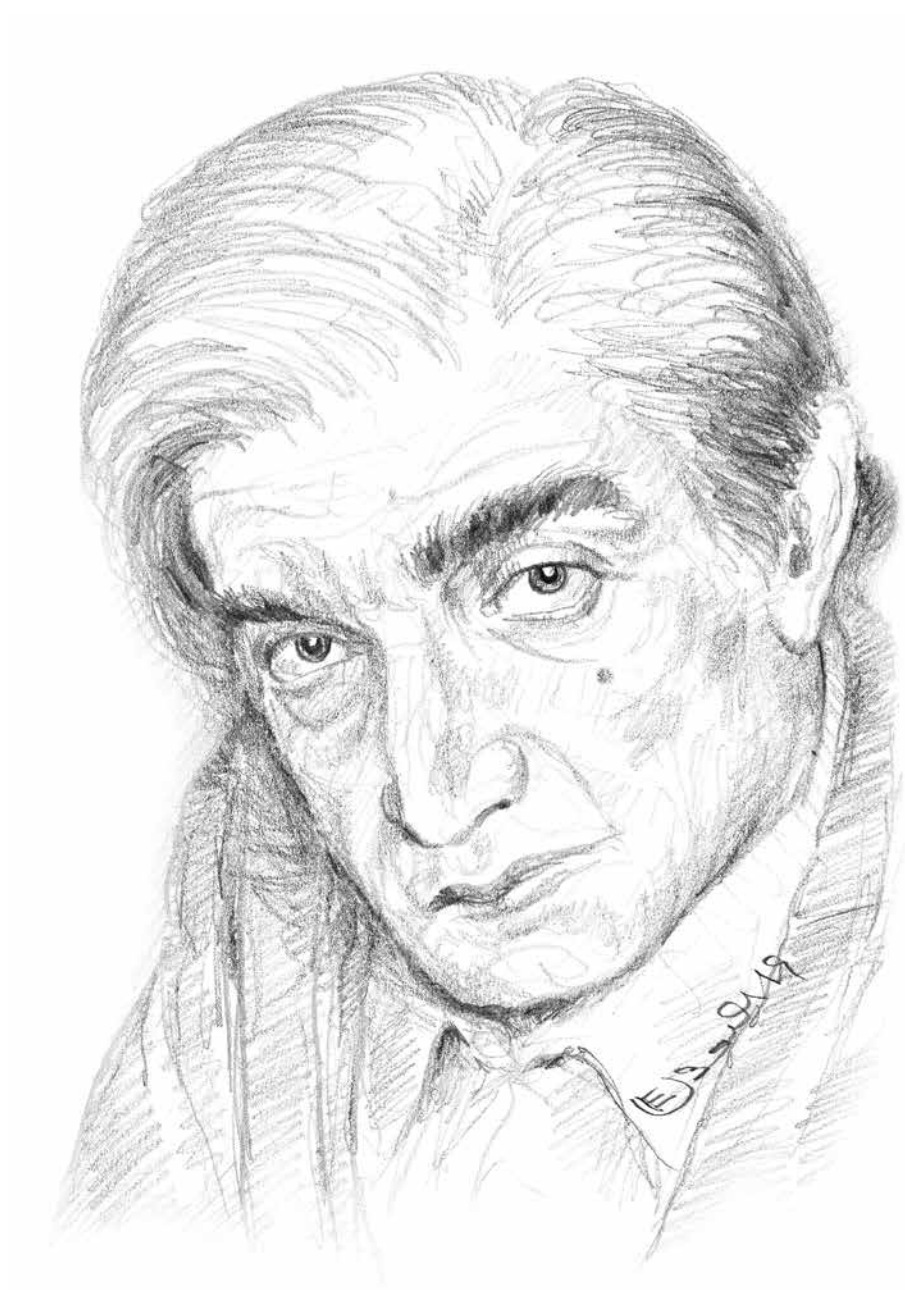
Om Praksh Bahl

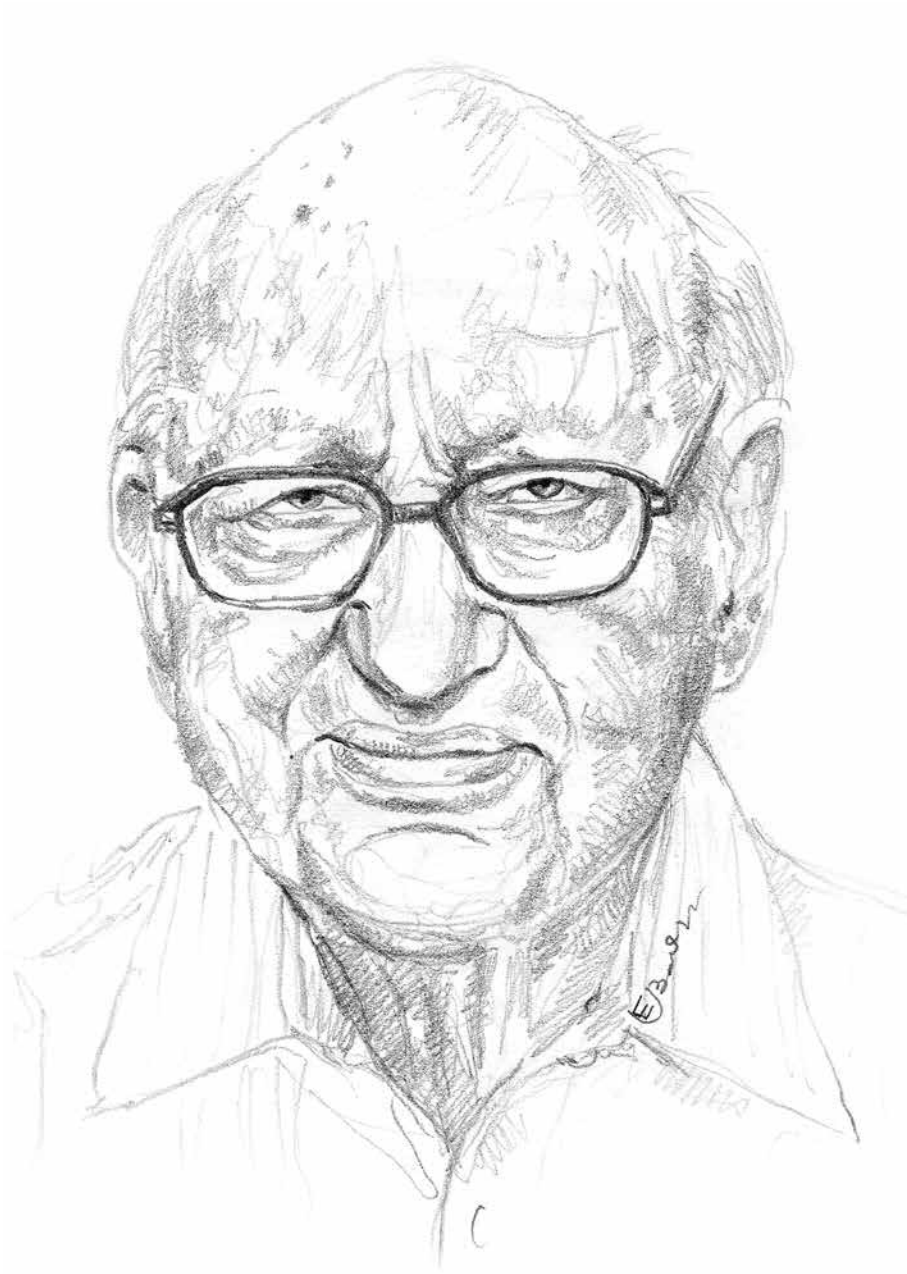
Wasif Ali Wasif

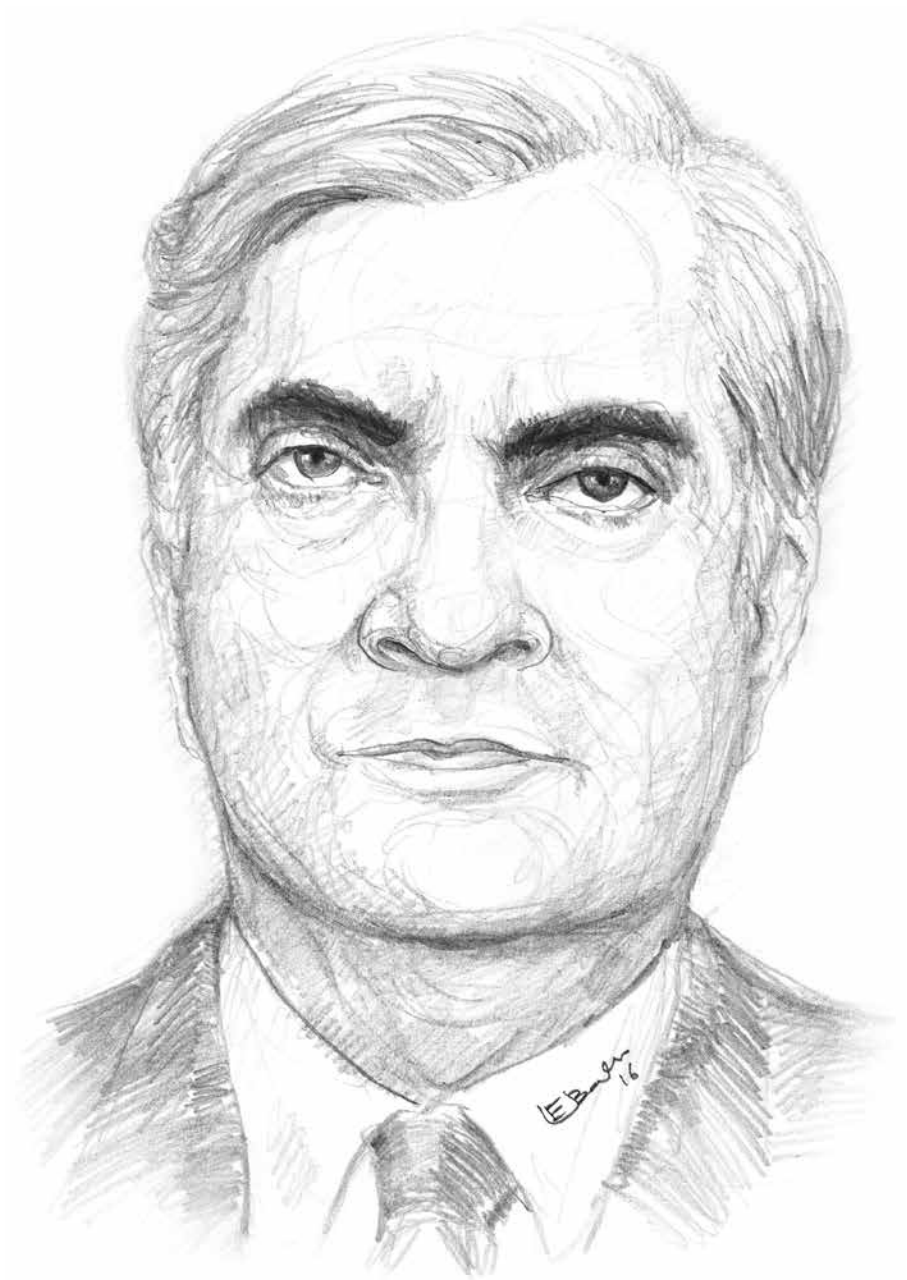
Aslam Minhas

(1930-2018)

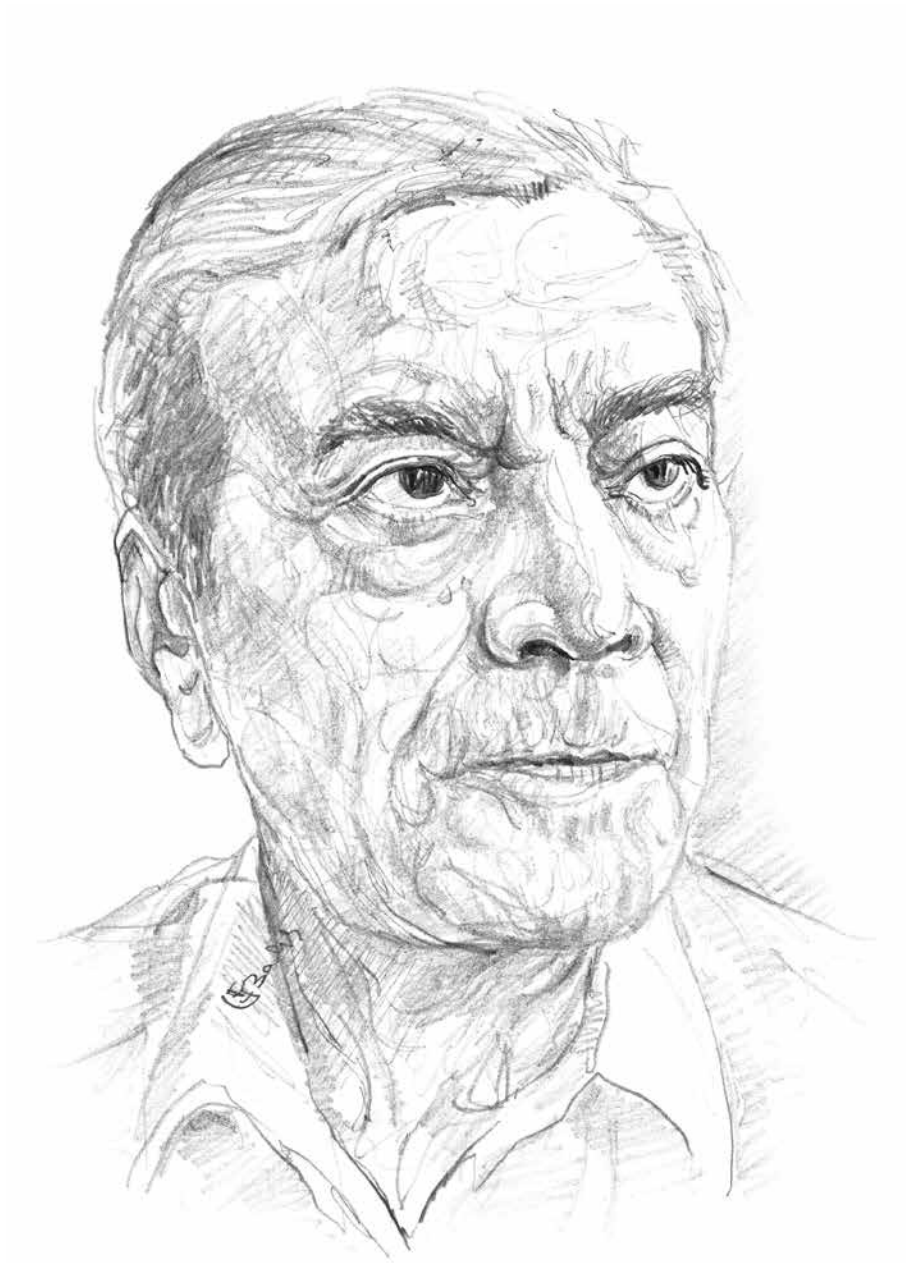
He was a Pakistani nuclear physicist, emeritus professor of high-energy physics at the National Center for Physics, and former science advisor to the Government of Pakistan.

Zia Mohyeddin

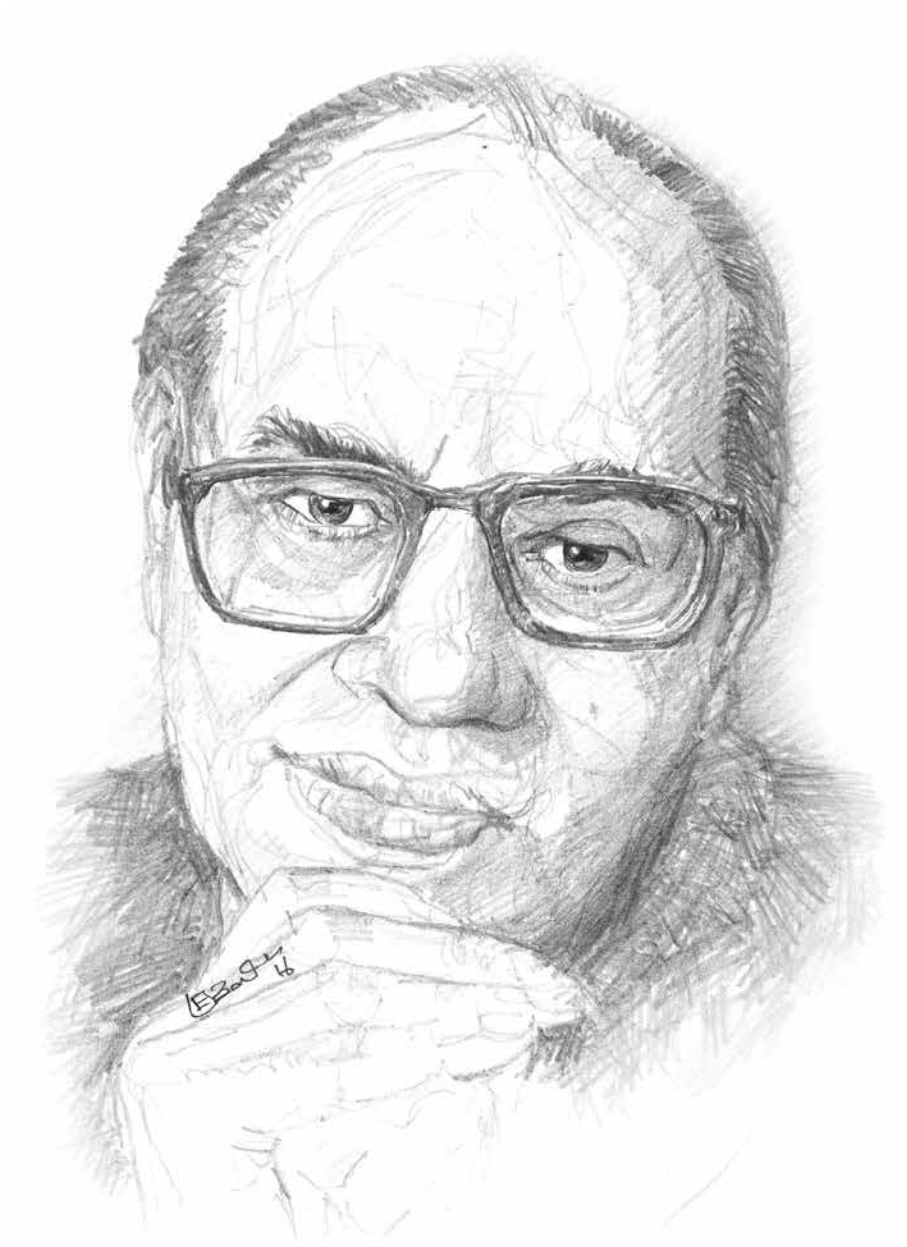
(born 1931)

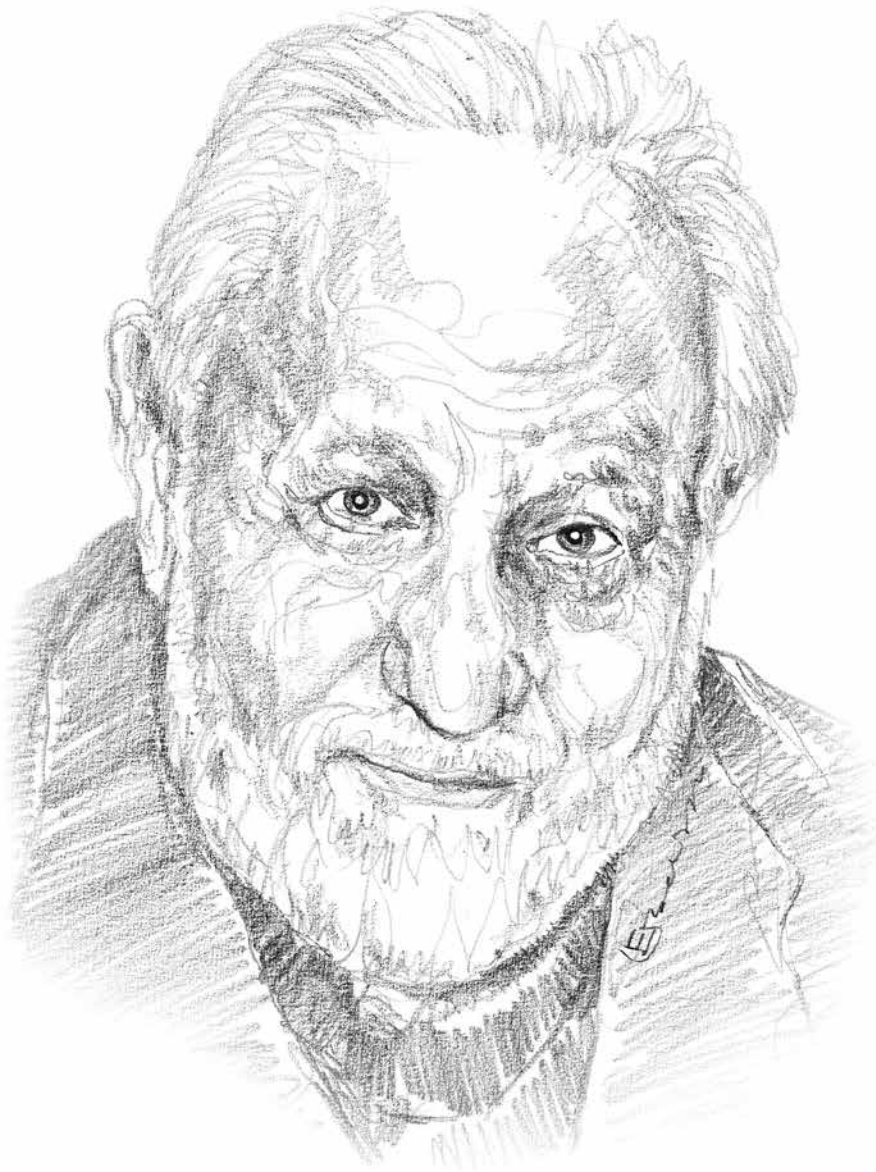
Waqar Hasan

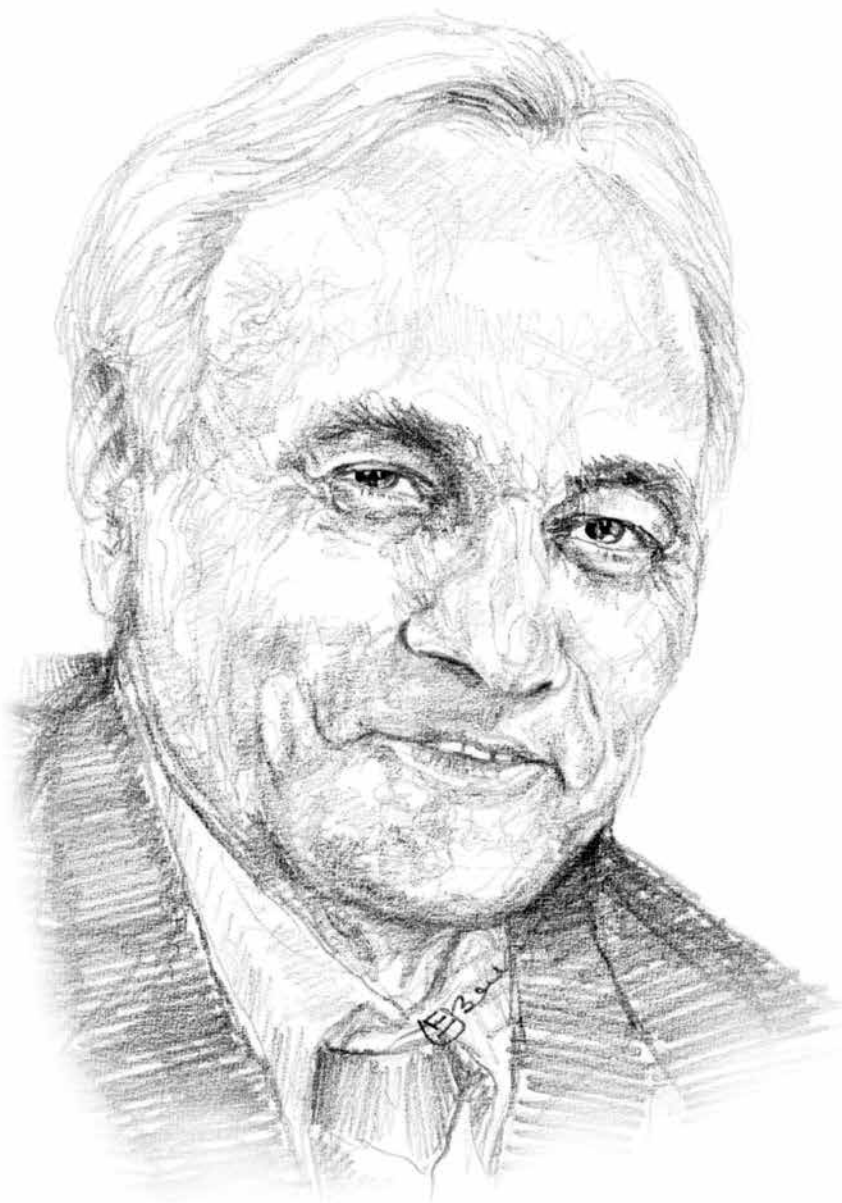
Mahbub ul Haq

(born 1936)

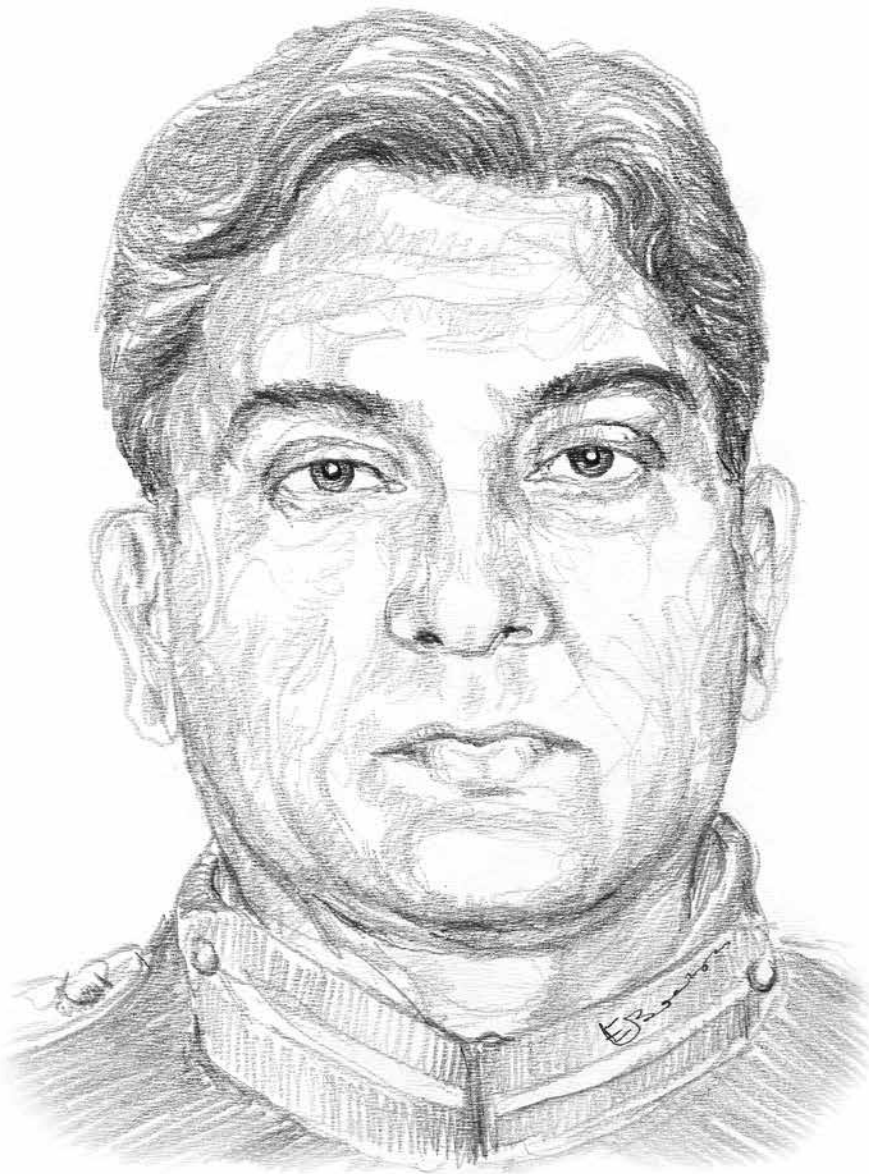

(*~2004)

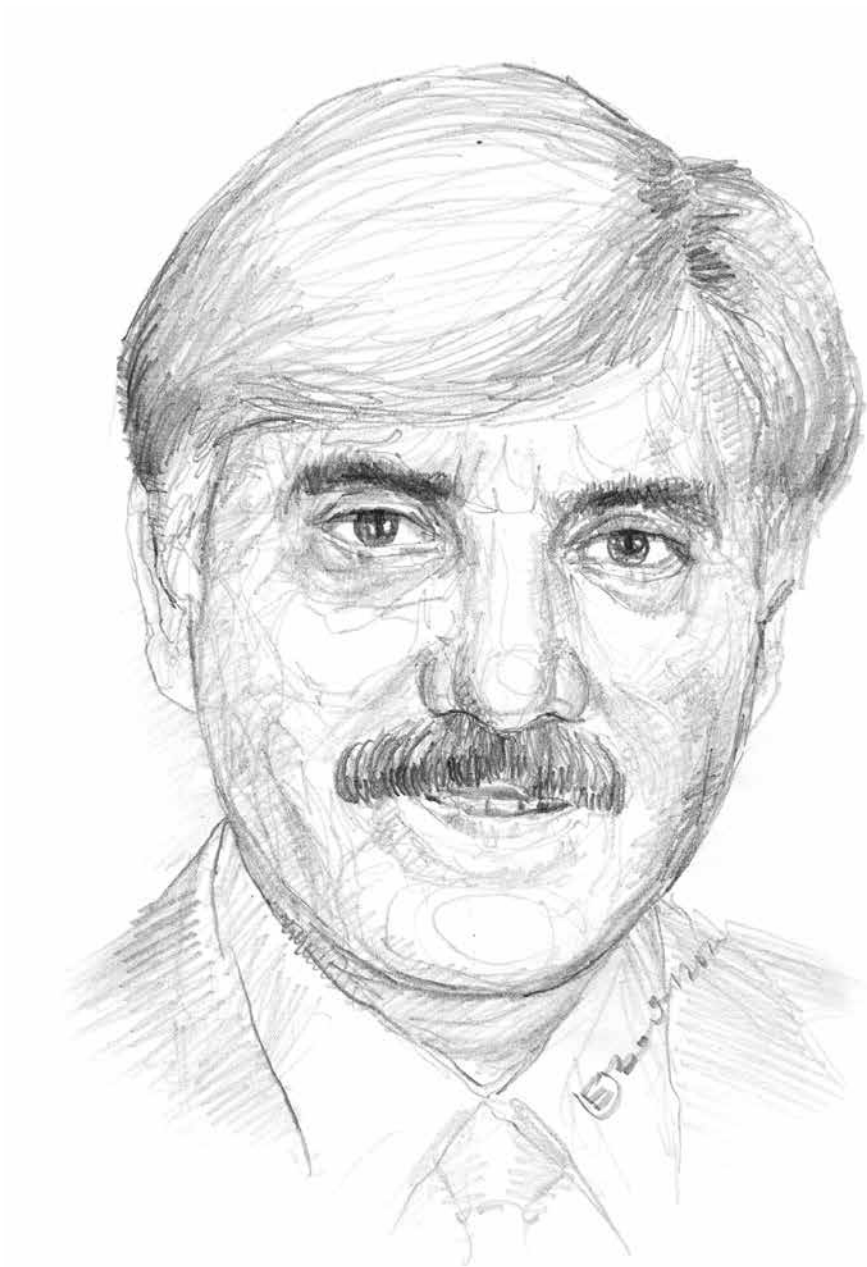

He was an influential statesman and a four-star air force general who served as the Chief of Air Staff of the Pakistan Air Force (PAF).



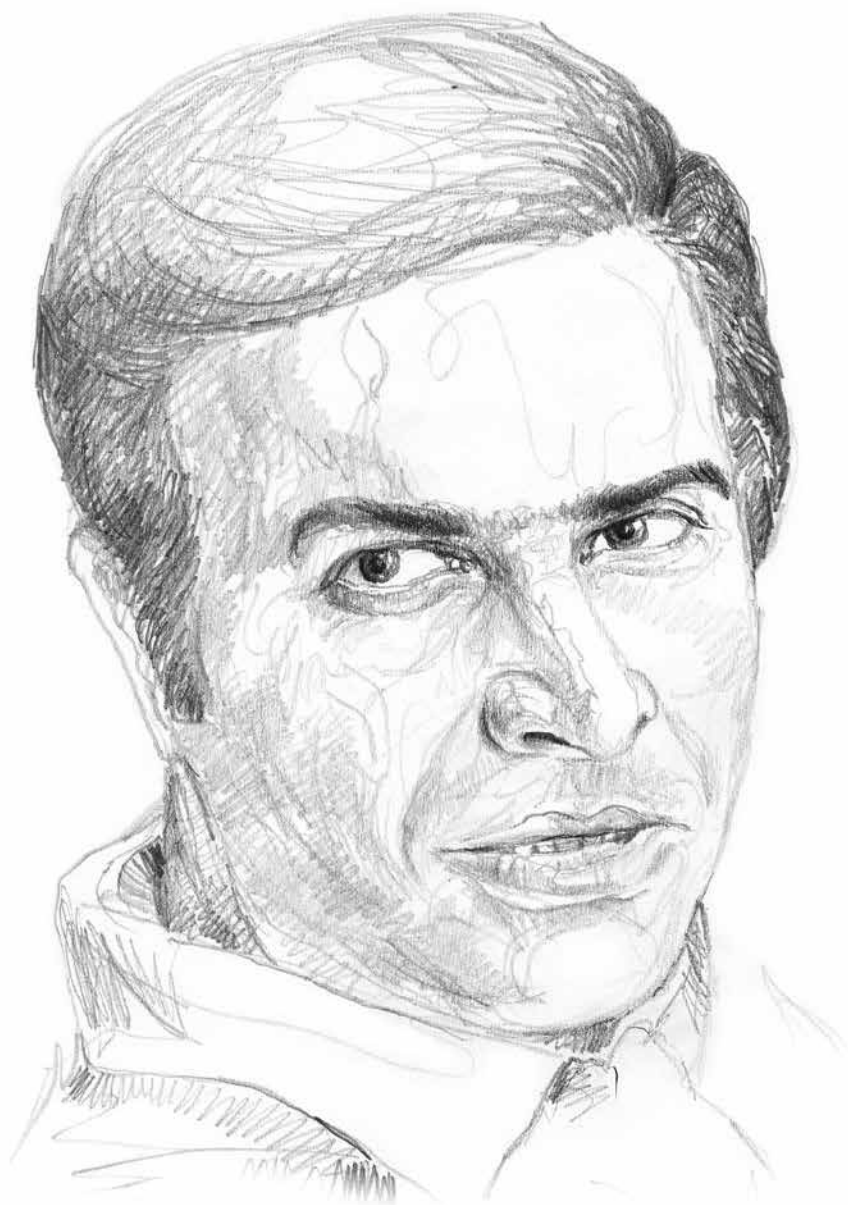
Mujaddid Ahmed Ijaz

Some of the isotopes he discovered enabled significant advances in medical research, particularly in the treatment of cancer, and further advanced the experimental understanding of nuclear structures Ijaz conducted his research work at Oak Ridge National Laboratories (ORNL). He and his ORNL colleagues published more than 60 papers in physics journals announcing isotope discoveries and other results of their accelerator experiments from 1968 until 1983.



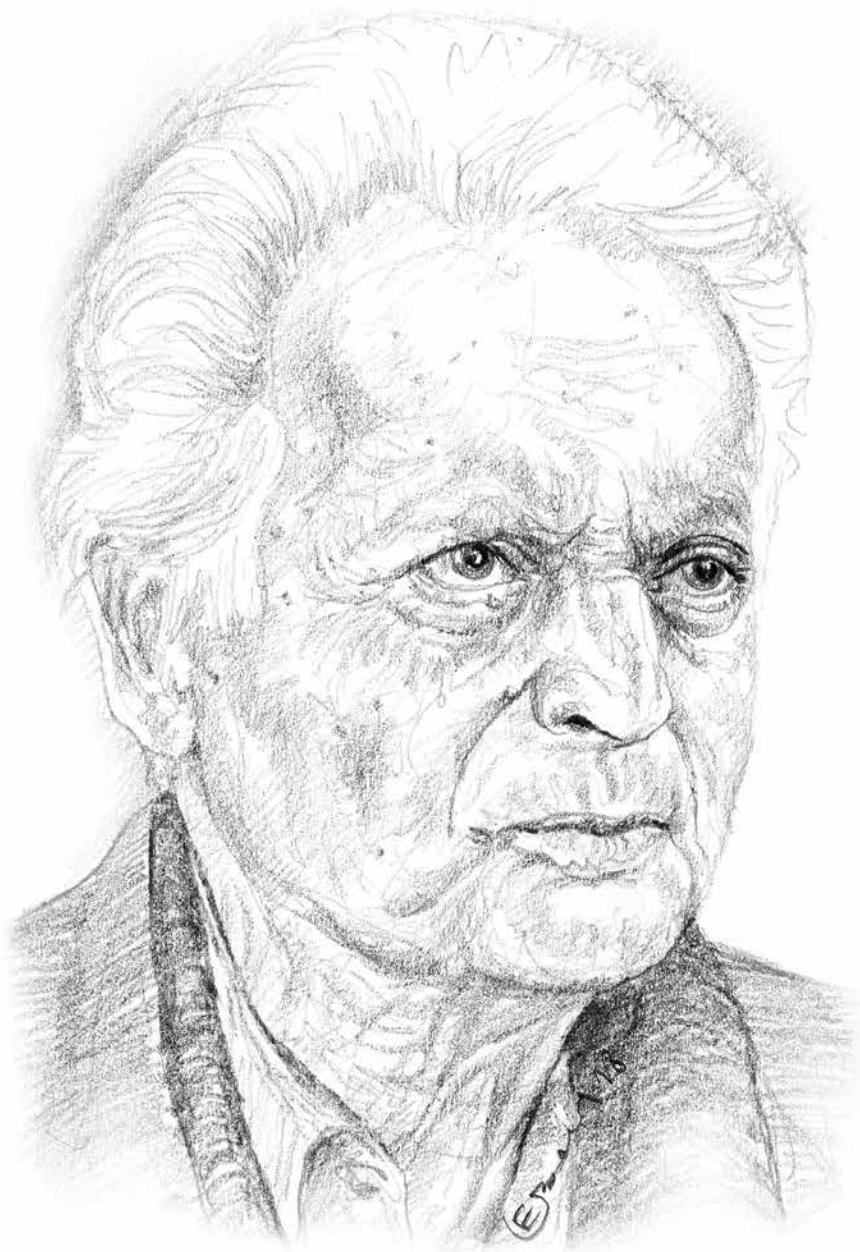
Colin David

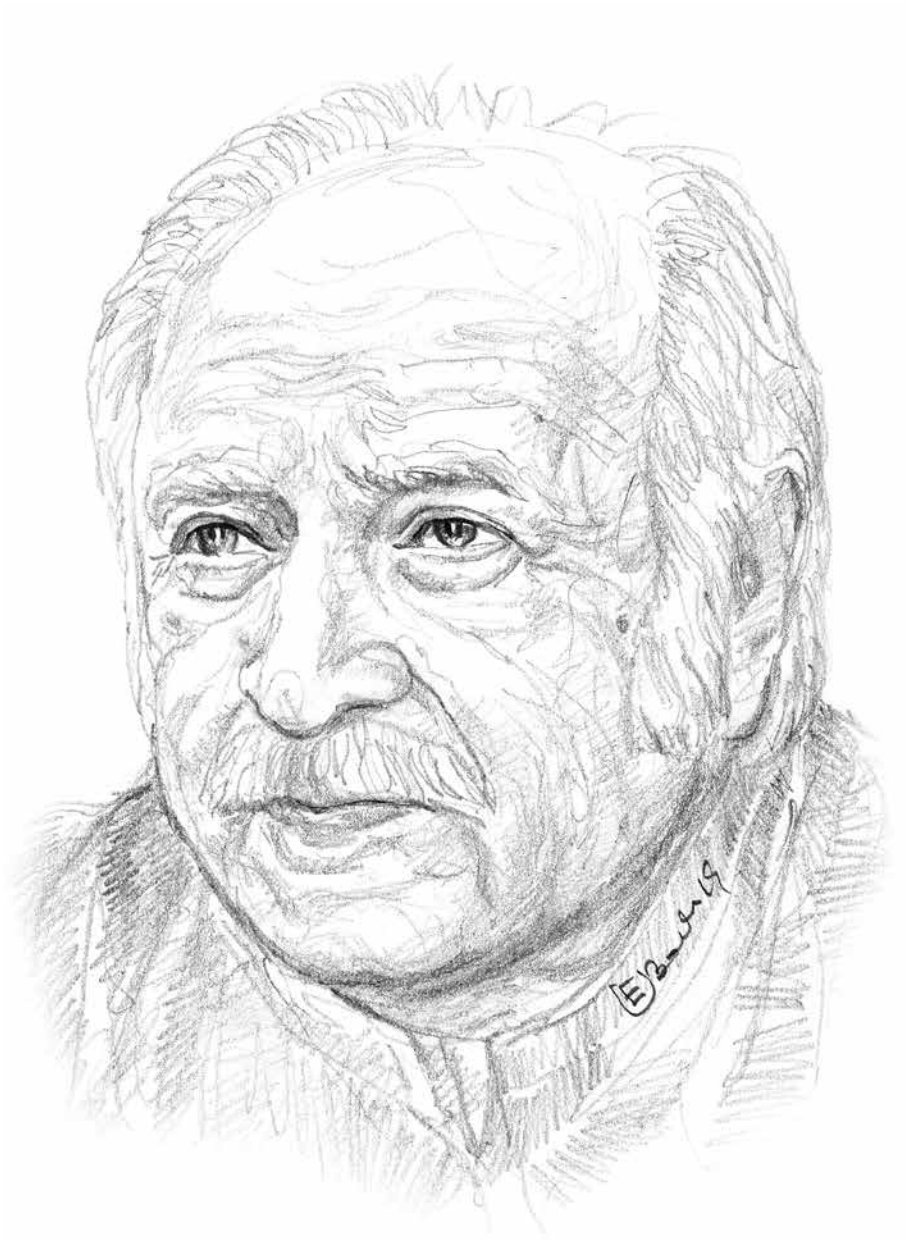

Arfa Sayeda Zehra

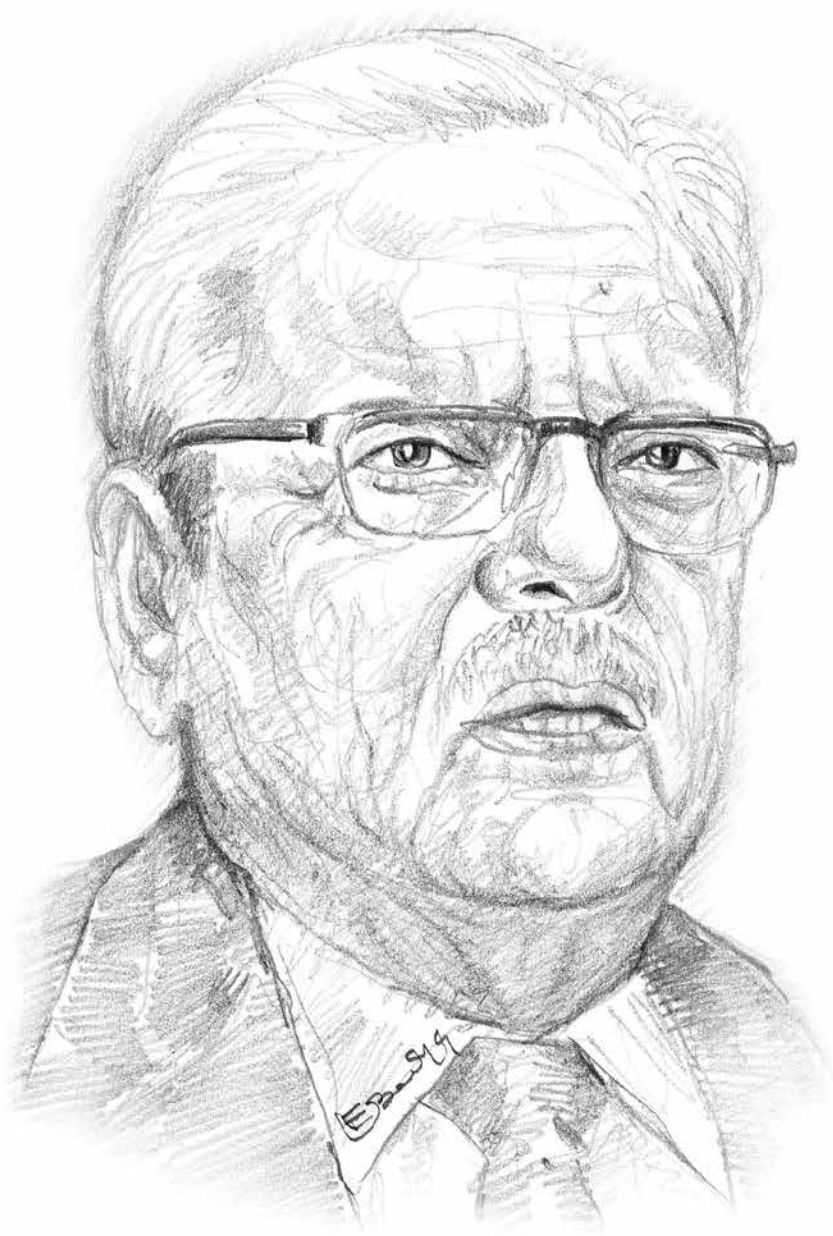

(born 1940)

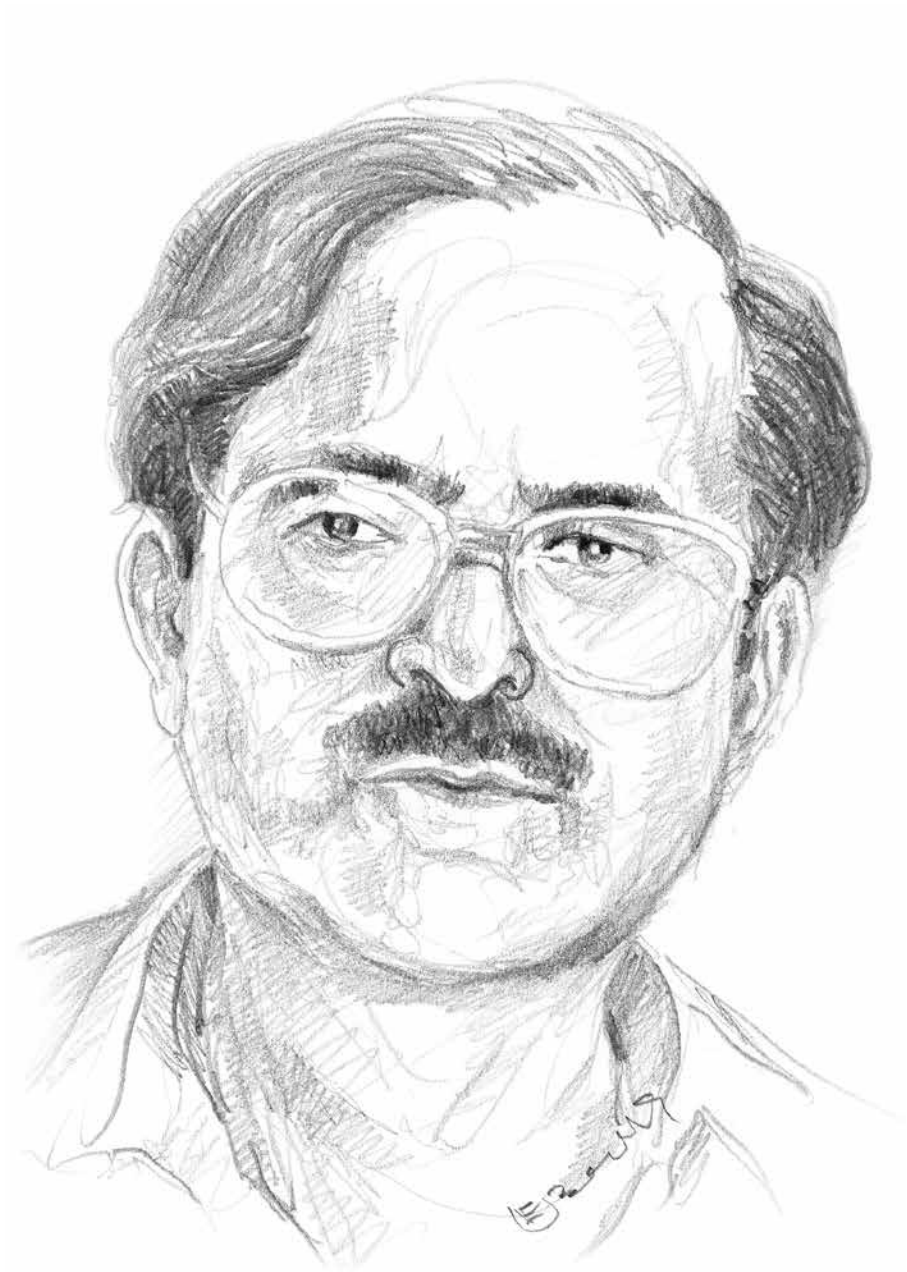

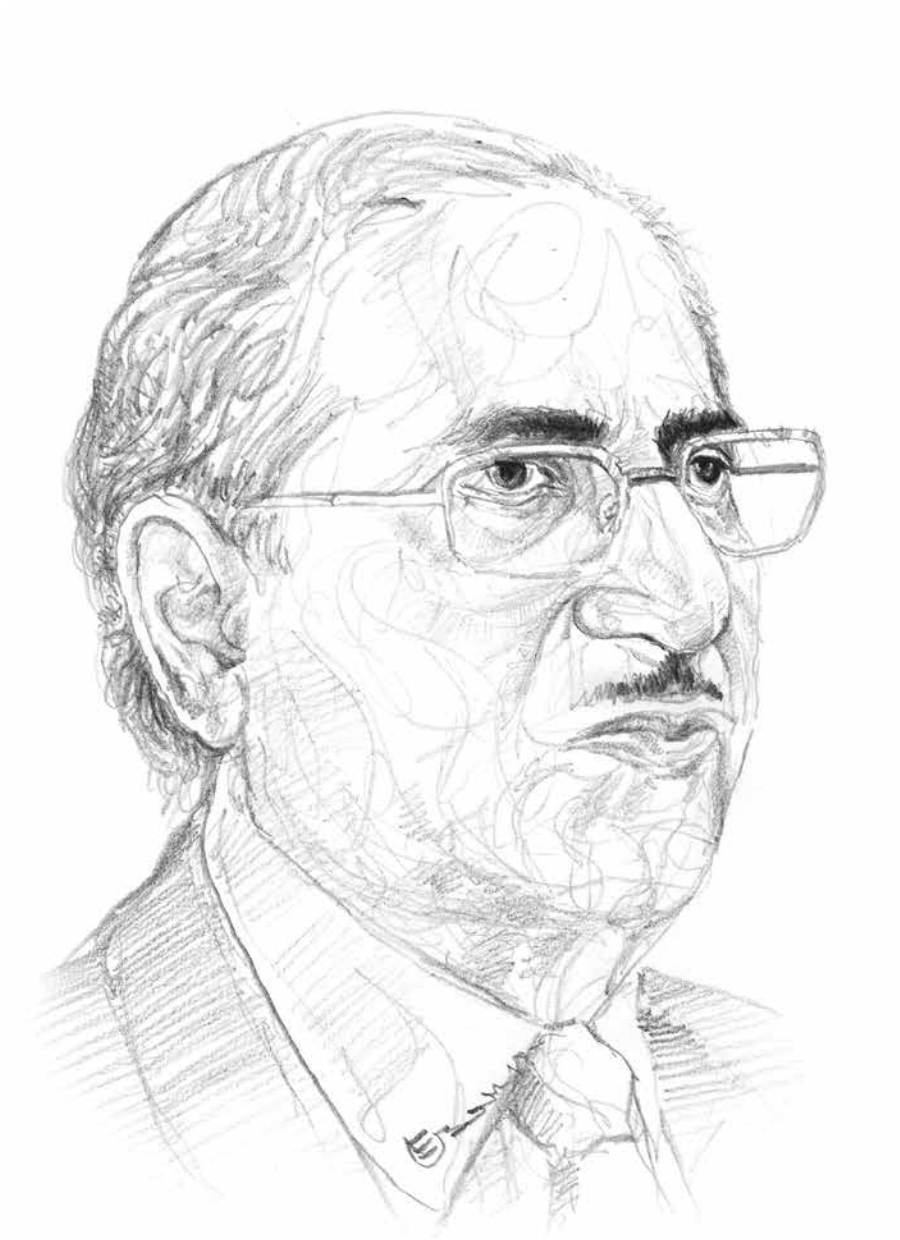
Ghanzanfir Ali

(1942-2009)

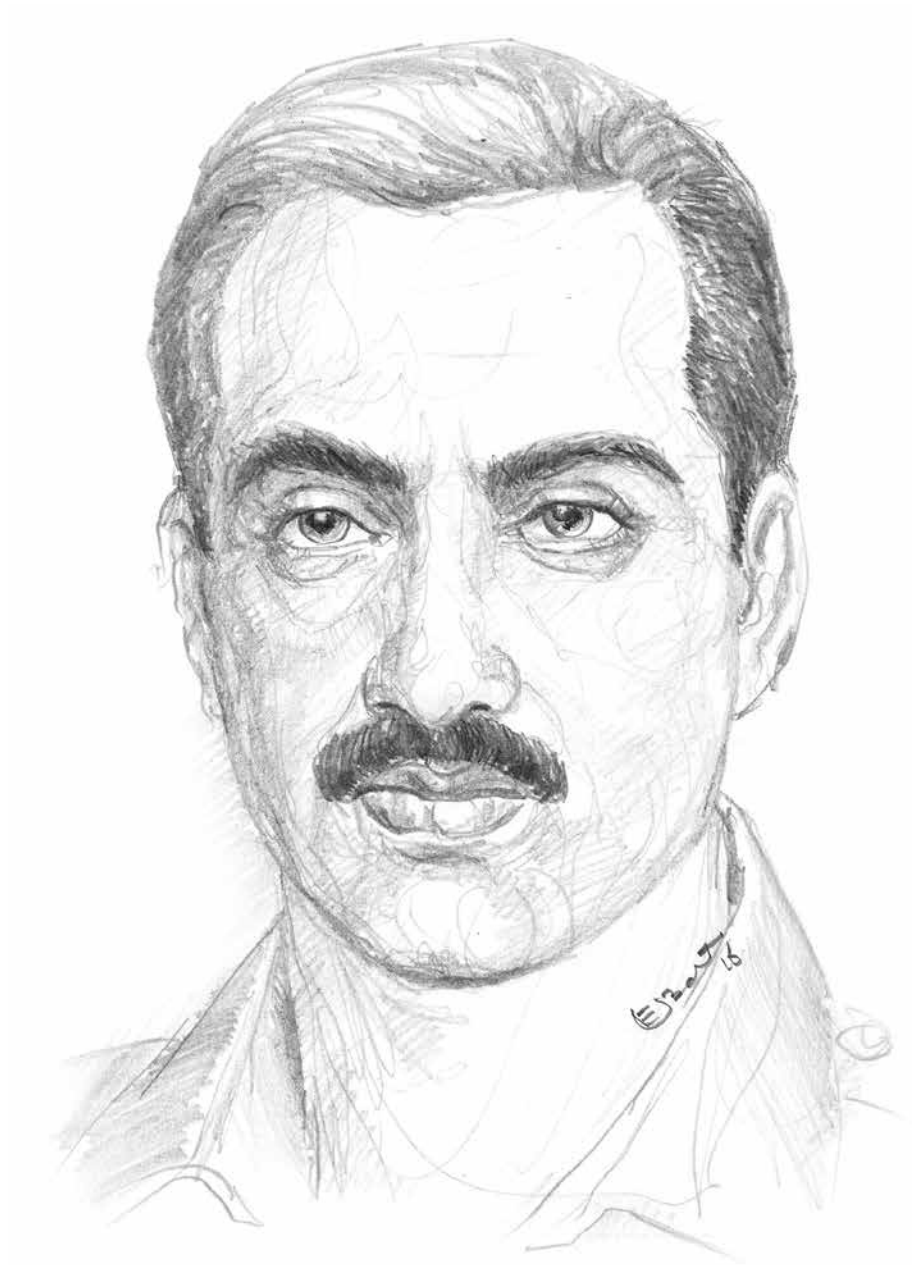

Dr. Samar Mubarakmand

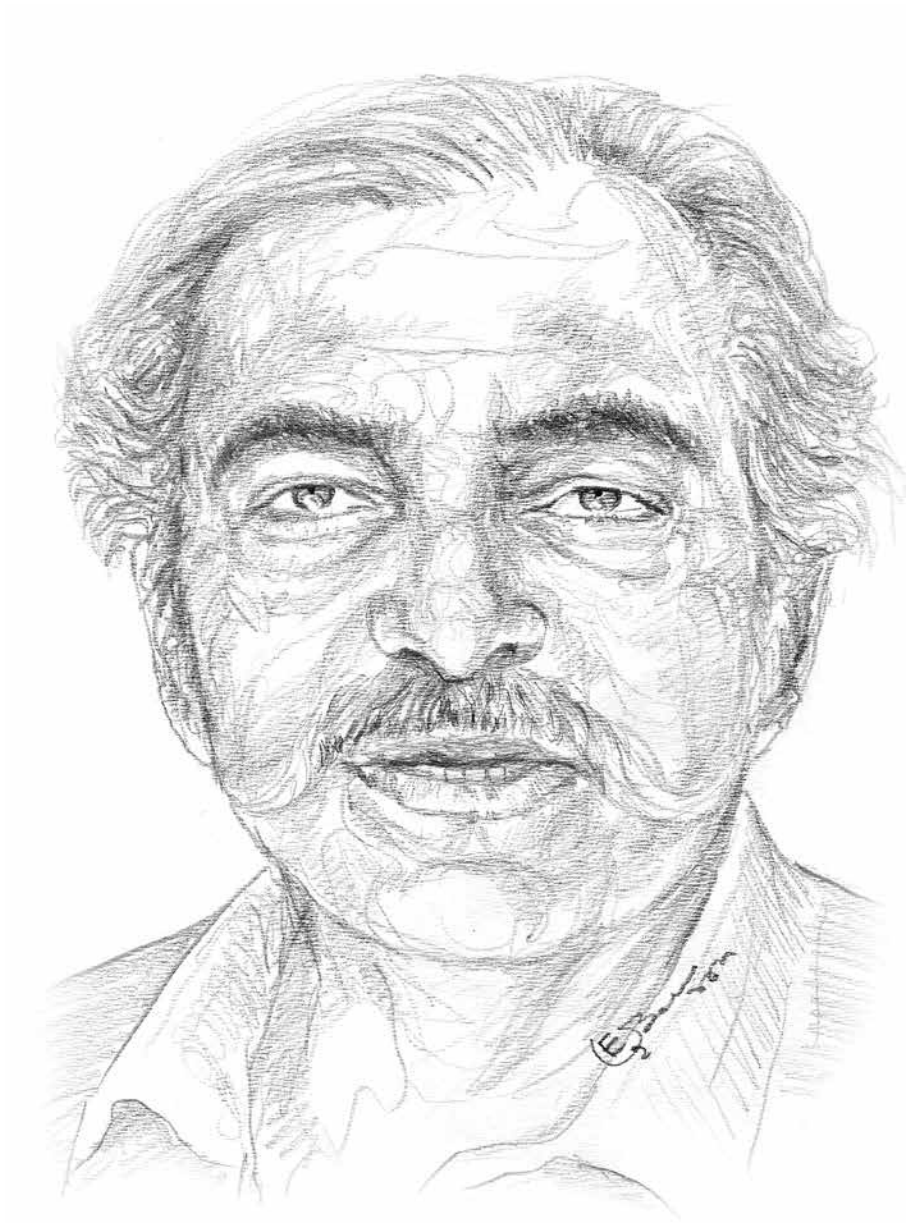
(born 1942)

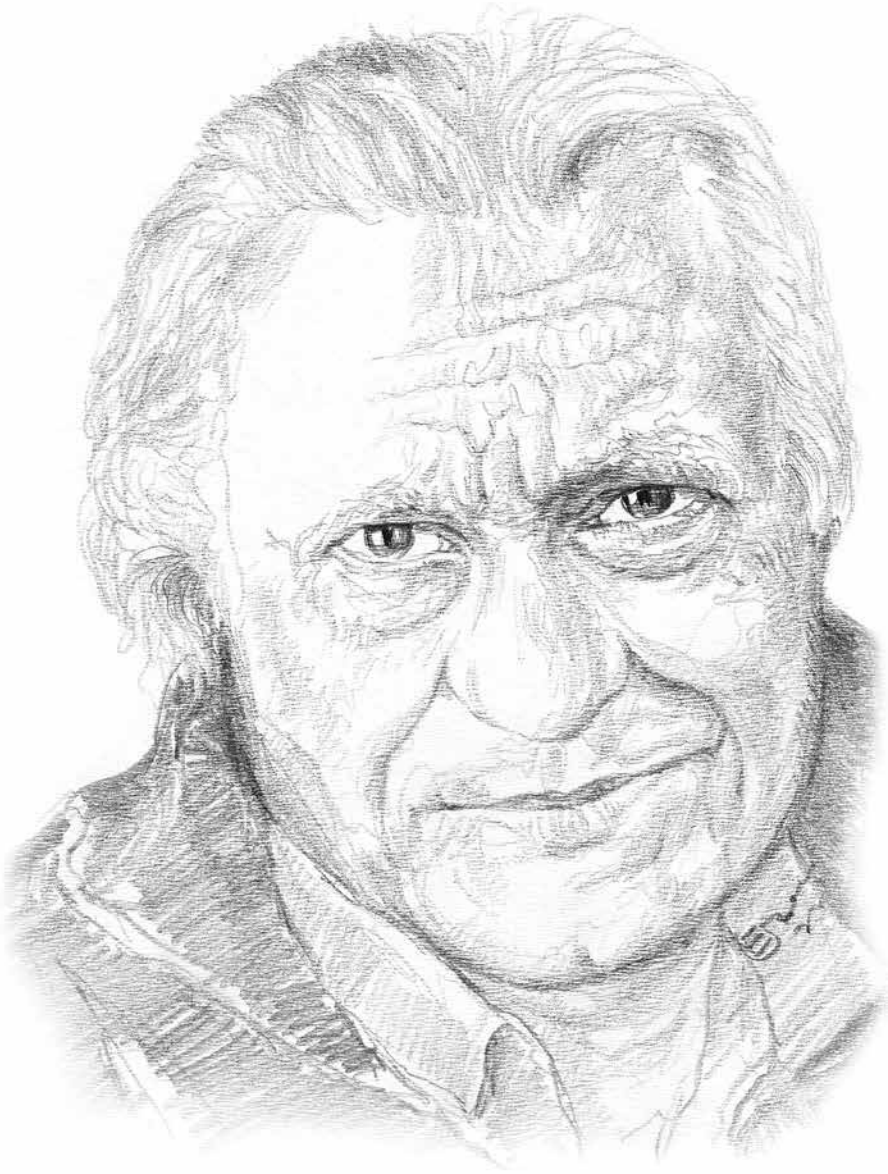
Major Shabbir Sharif

Shoaib Hashmi

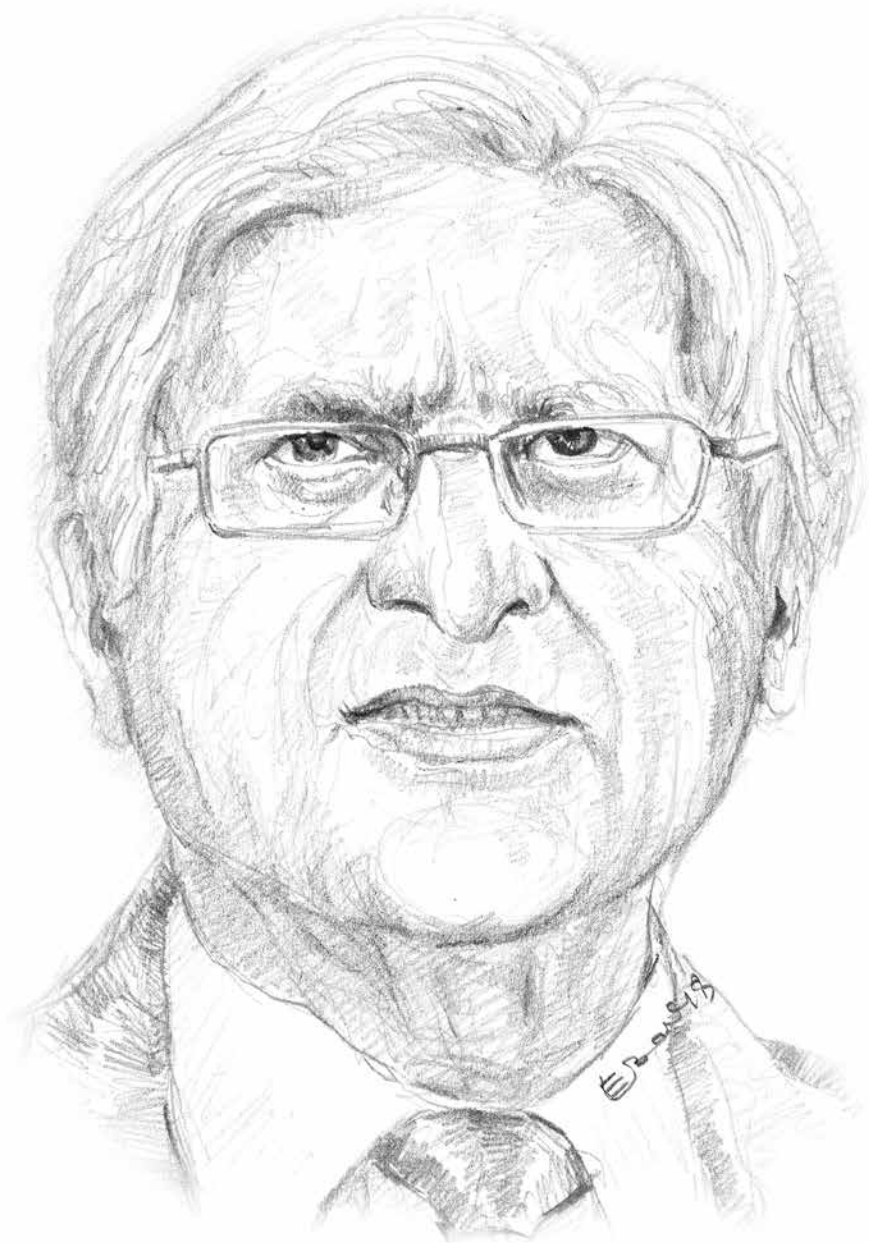

(born 1945)

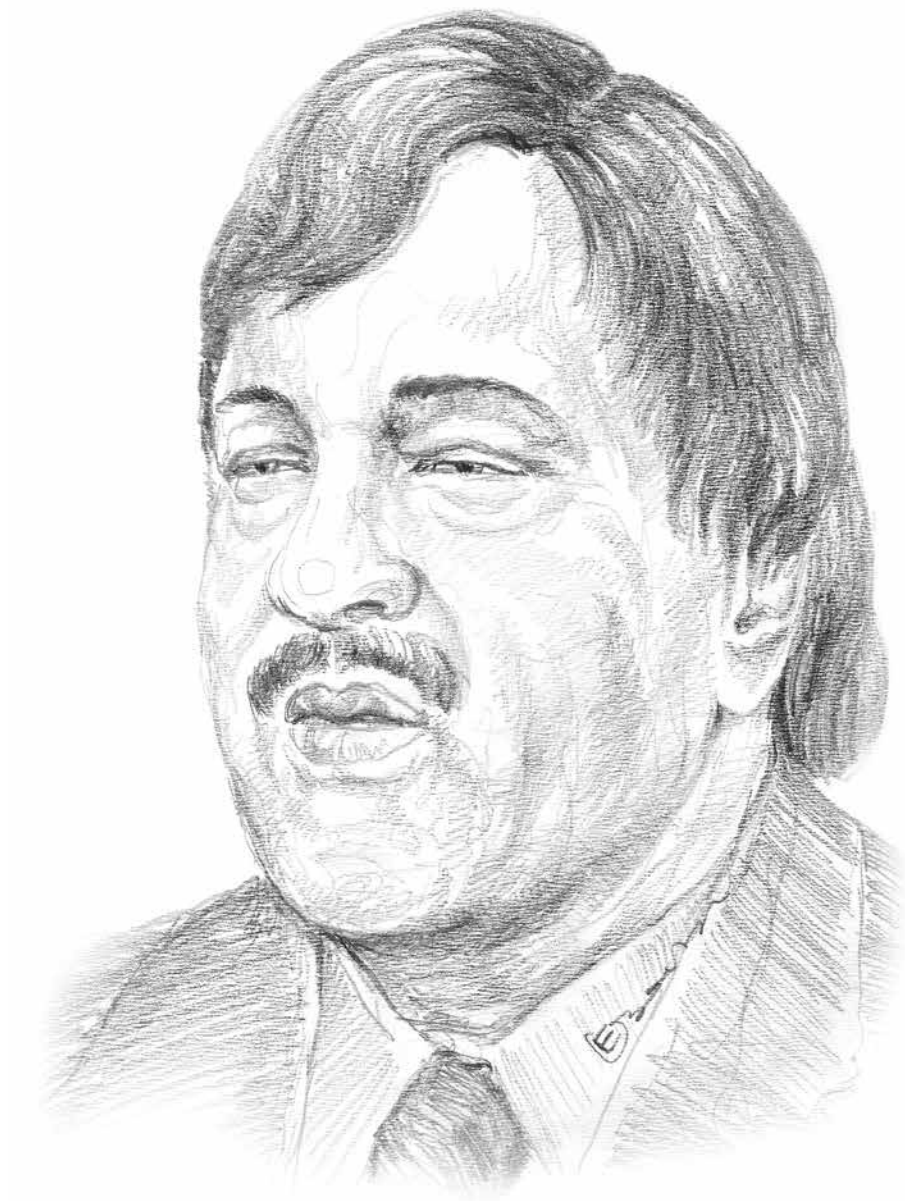

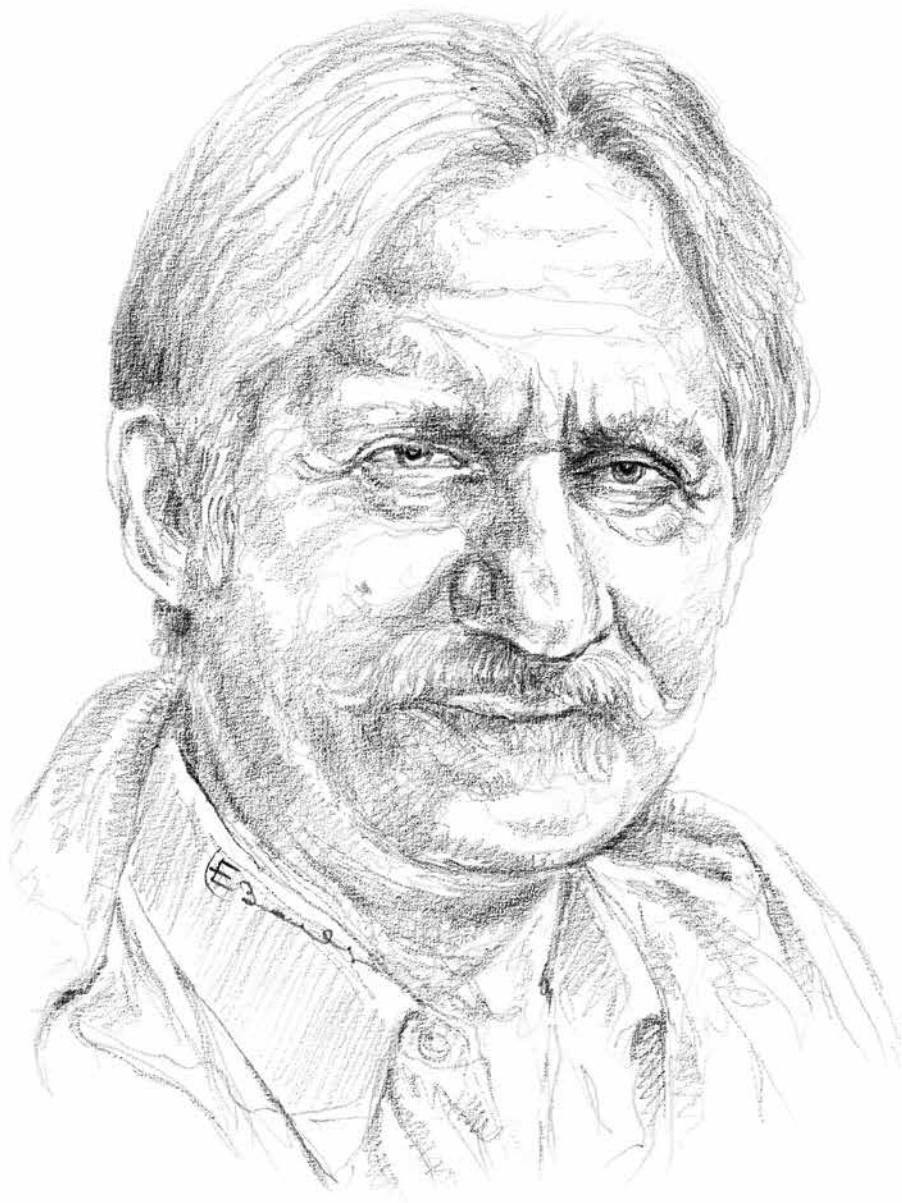


Amjad Parvez

He is a renowned singer, writer and professional engineer. He has served as chief engineer, general manager, vice president and managing director of Nespak. Pervaz grandfather Khwaja

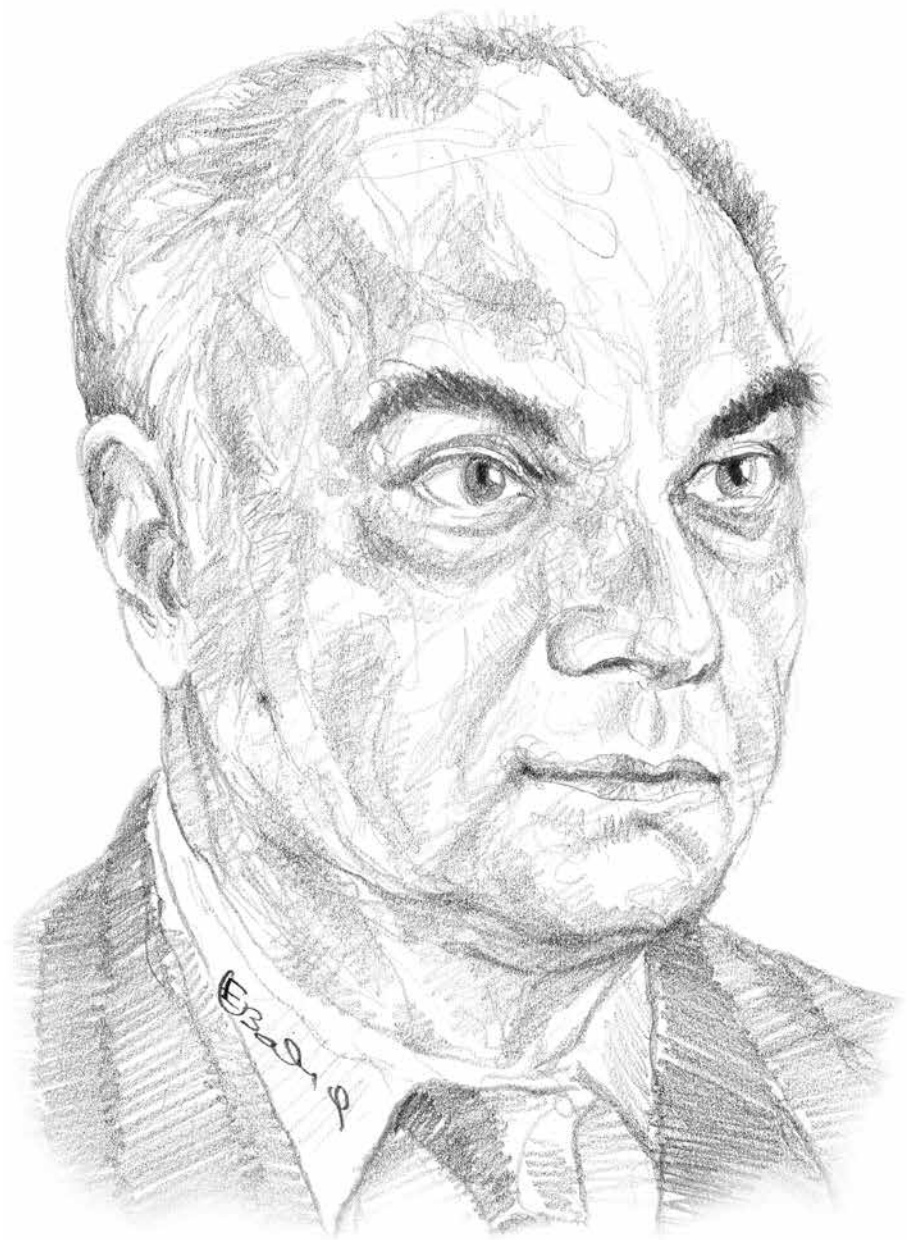

(born 1945)

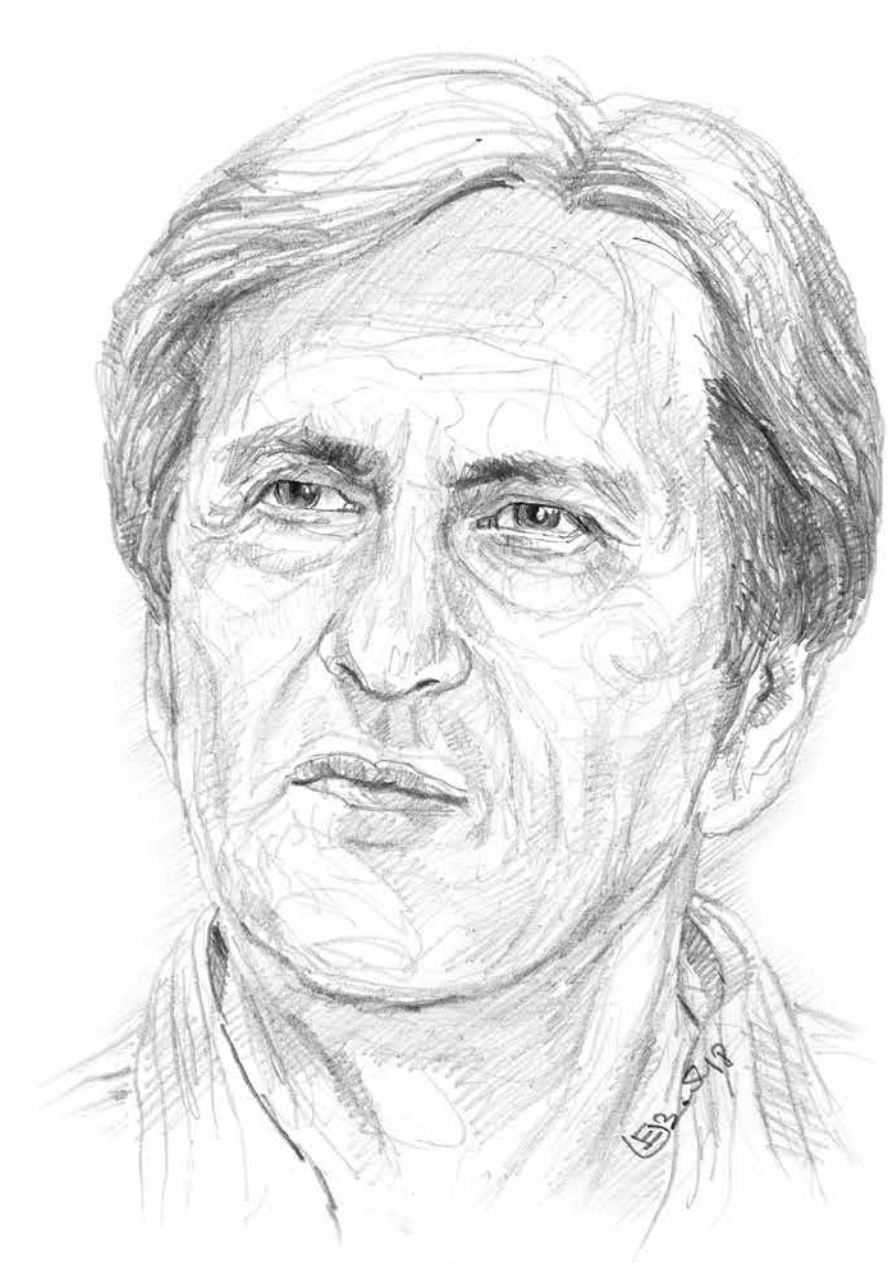

(born 1946)

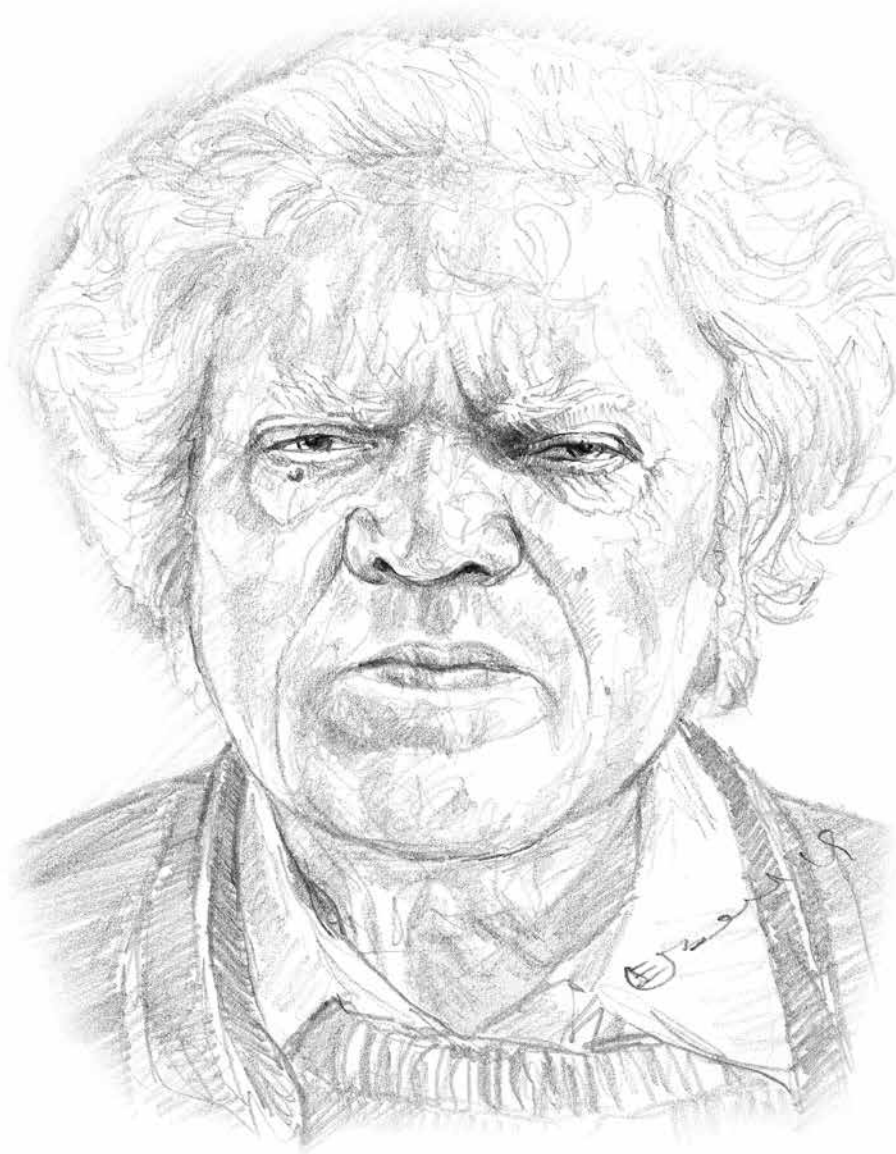

Majid Jahangir Khan

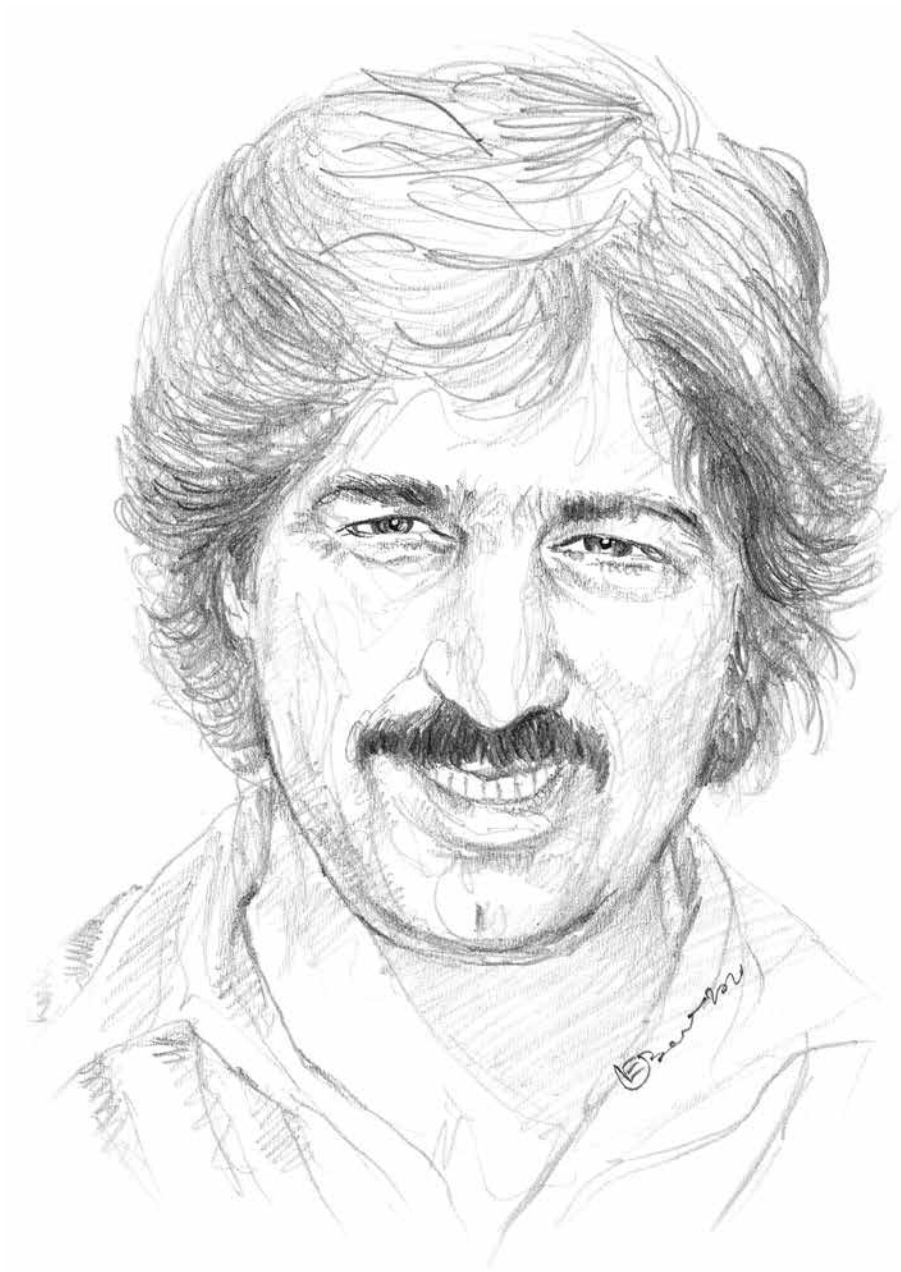
(born 1946)

(born 1946)

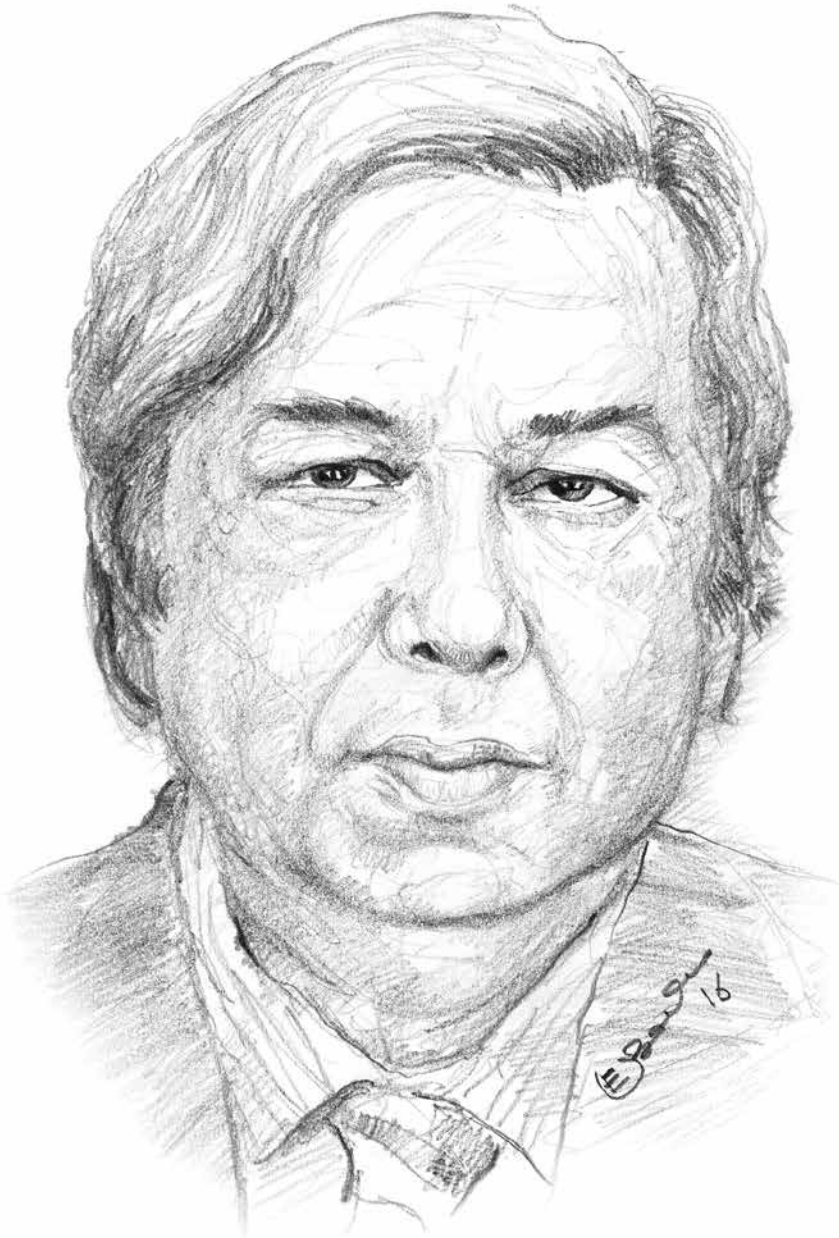

(born 1948)

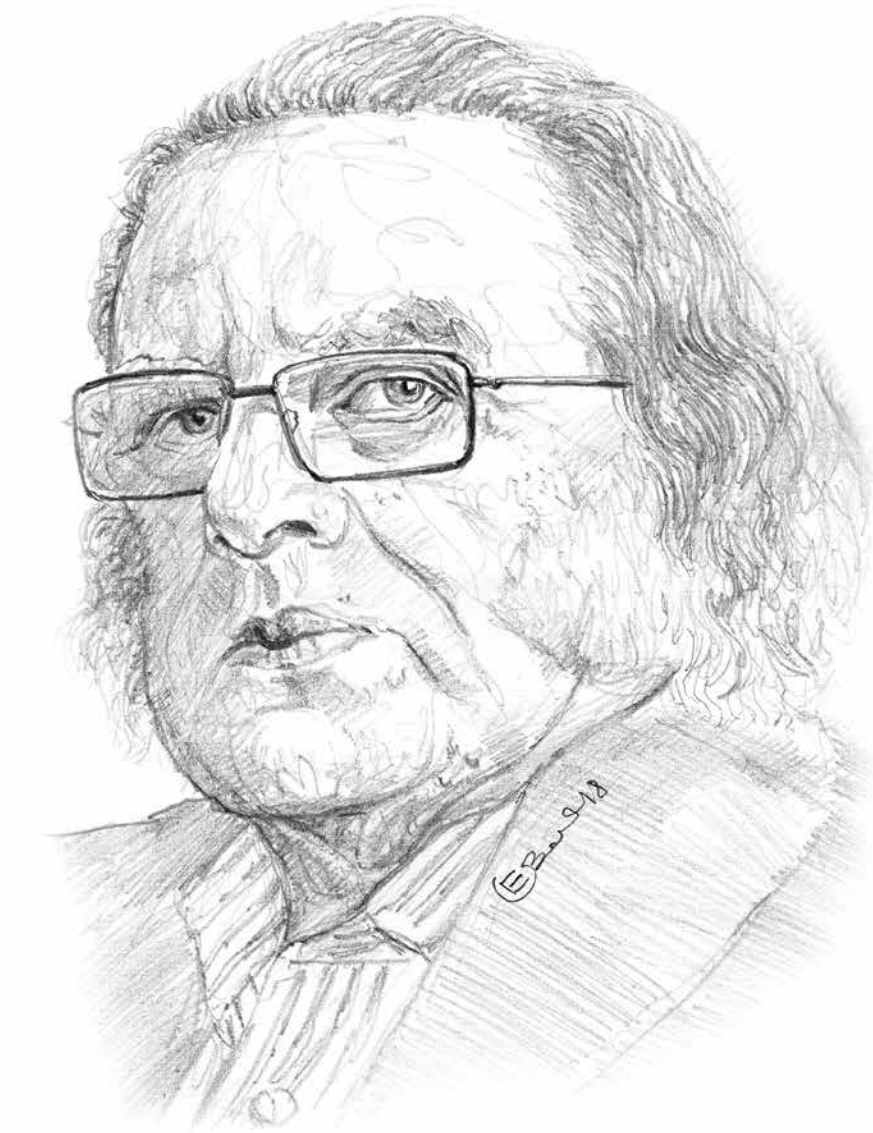

(born 1949)

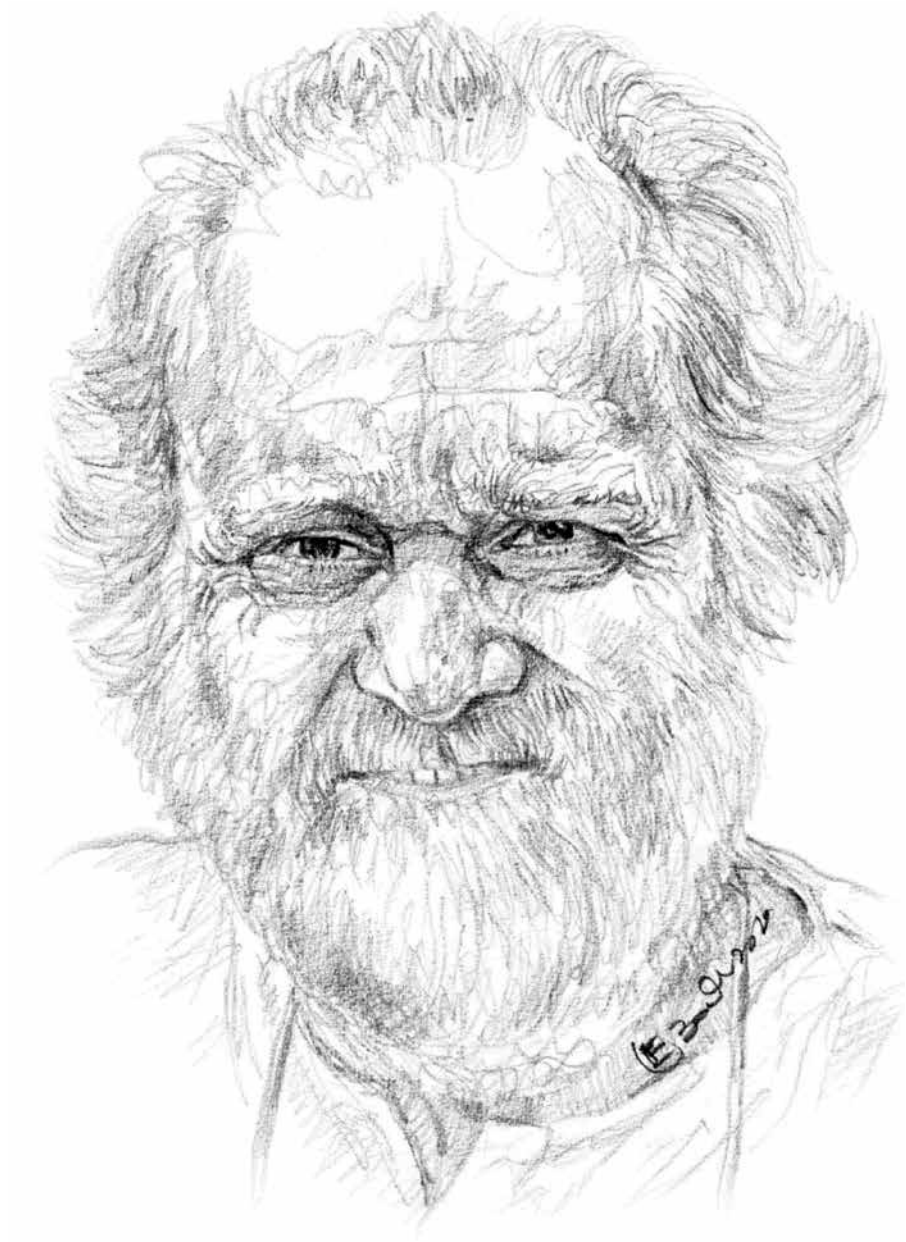

Manzar Sehbai

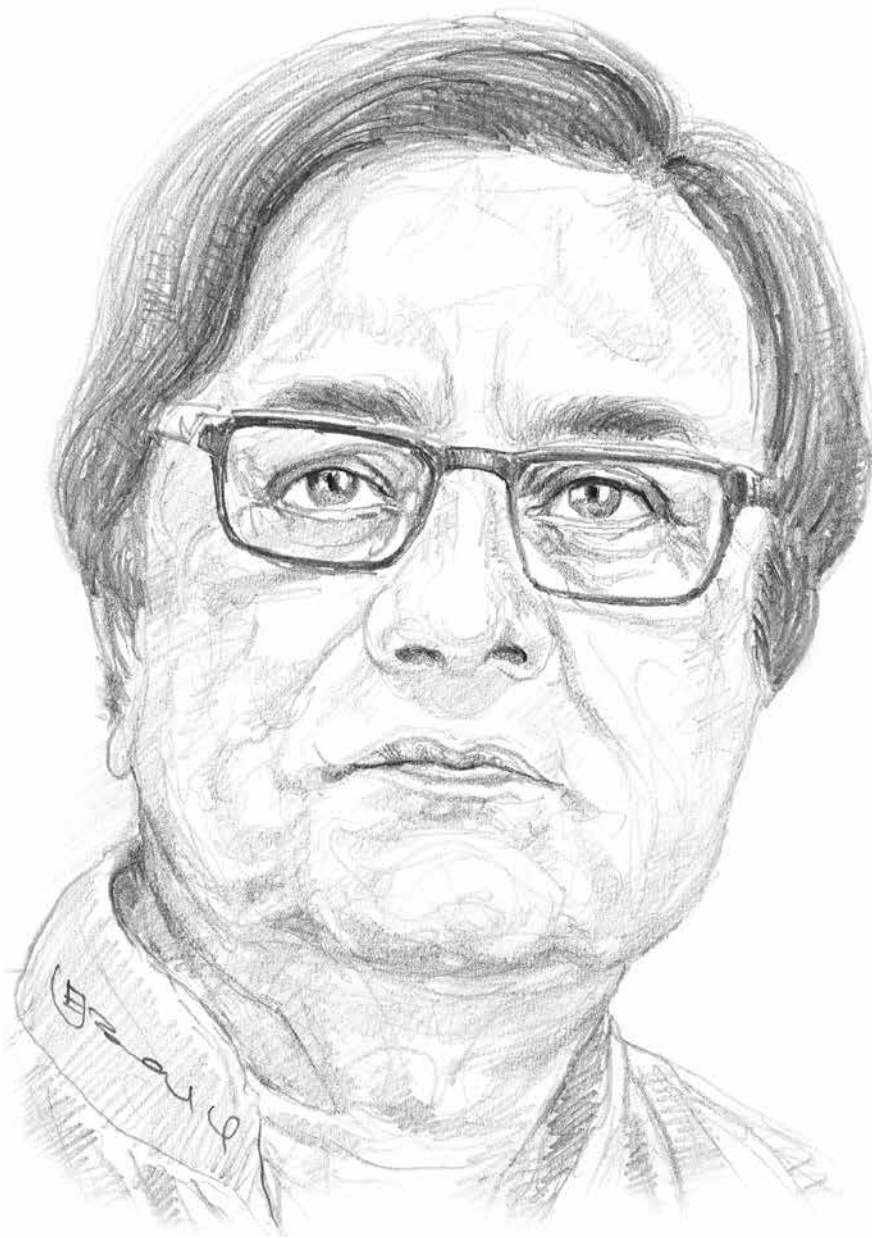
(born 1950)

She was conferred the Pride of Performance award by the President of Pakistan in 1981. She also earned many PTV awards, notably Nigar Award, Graduate Award and Lux Lifetime Achievement Award.



Wasim Hasan Raja
(1952-2006)

He was trendy cricketer, match referee, and cricket coach who played in 57 Tests and 54 ODIs for the Pakistani national cricket team from 1973 to 1985. He was captain of the Pakistan Under-19 side. Raja was known primarily as a dashing middle-order left-handed batsman, with a characteristically generous back lift and breathtaking stoke play. Raja also bowled flat wrist spin with his right hand that was good enough to take 51 wickets in Tests, he played in 250 first-class matches, scoring 11,434 runs at an average of 35.18, including 17 centuries, and taking 558 wickets at an average of 29.05.

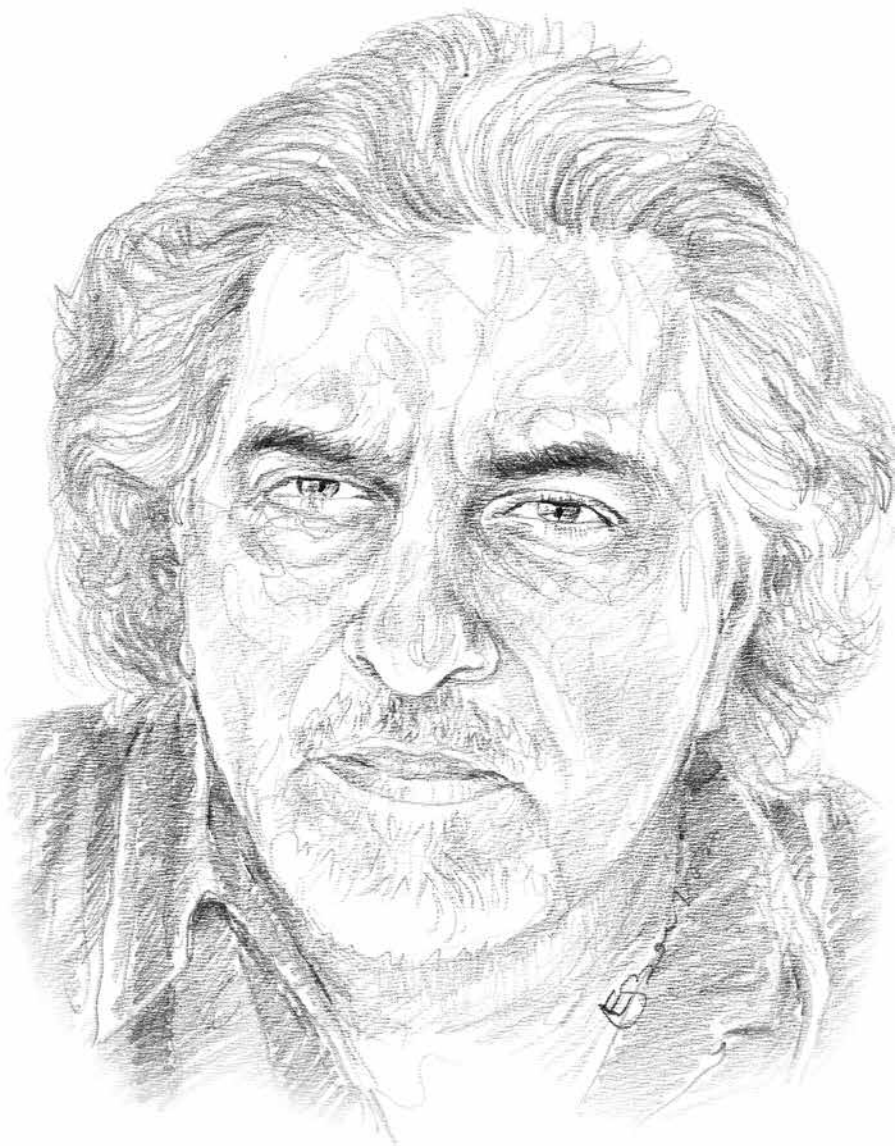


Mian Saqib Nisar

(born 1954)

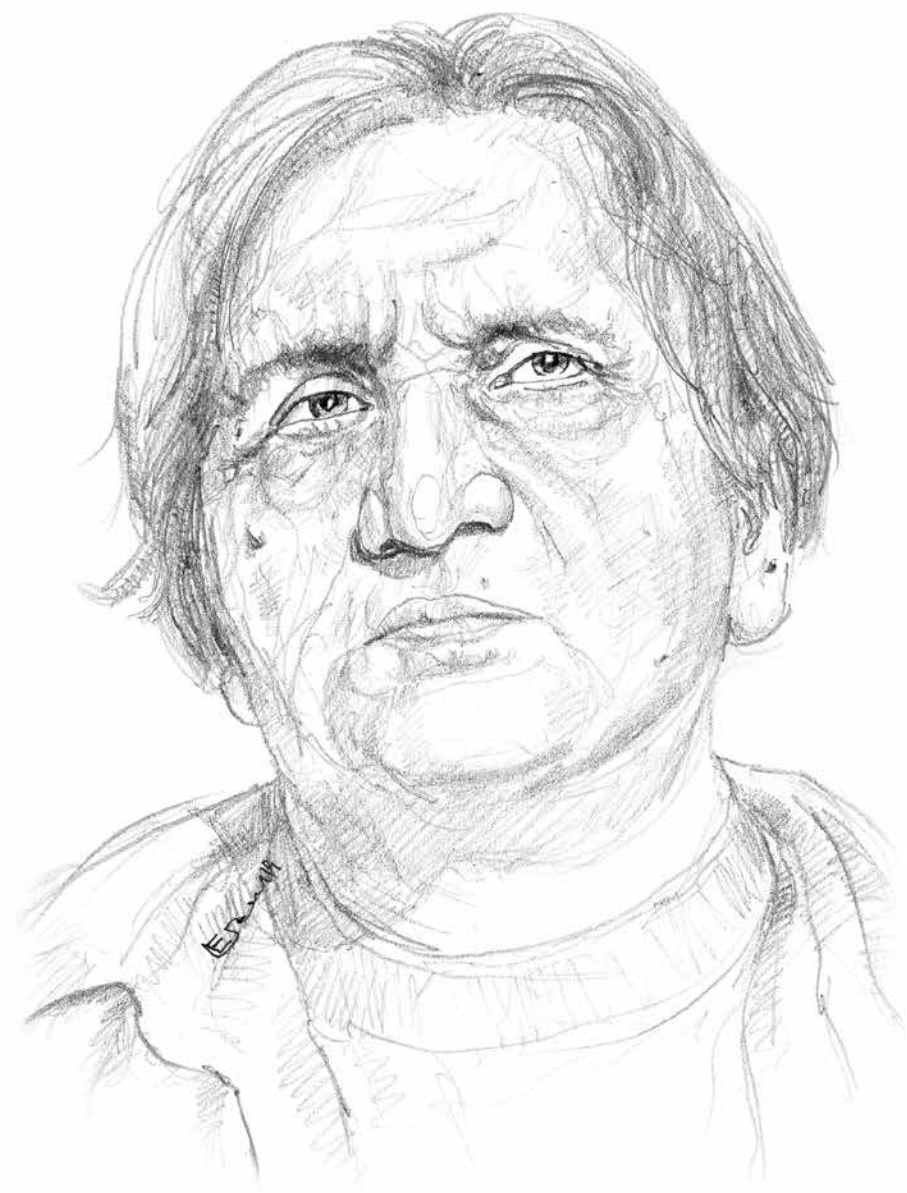
He was the 25th Chief Justice of Pakistan, in office from 31 December 2016 to 17 January 2019.

He has previously served as the Federal Secretary Law. He remains a visiting professor of law at the Punjab University where he provides instructions on constitutional law.



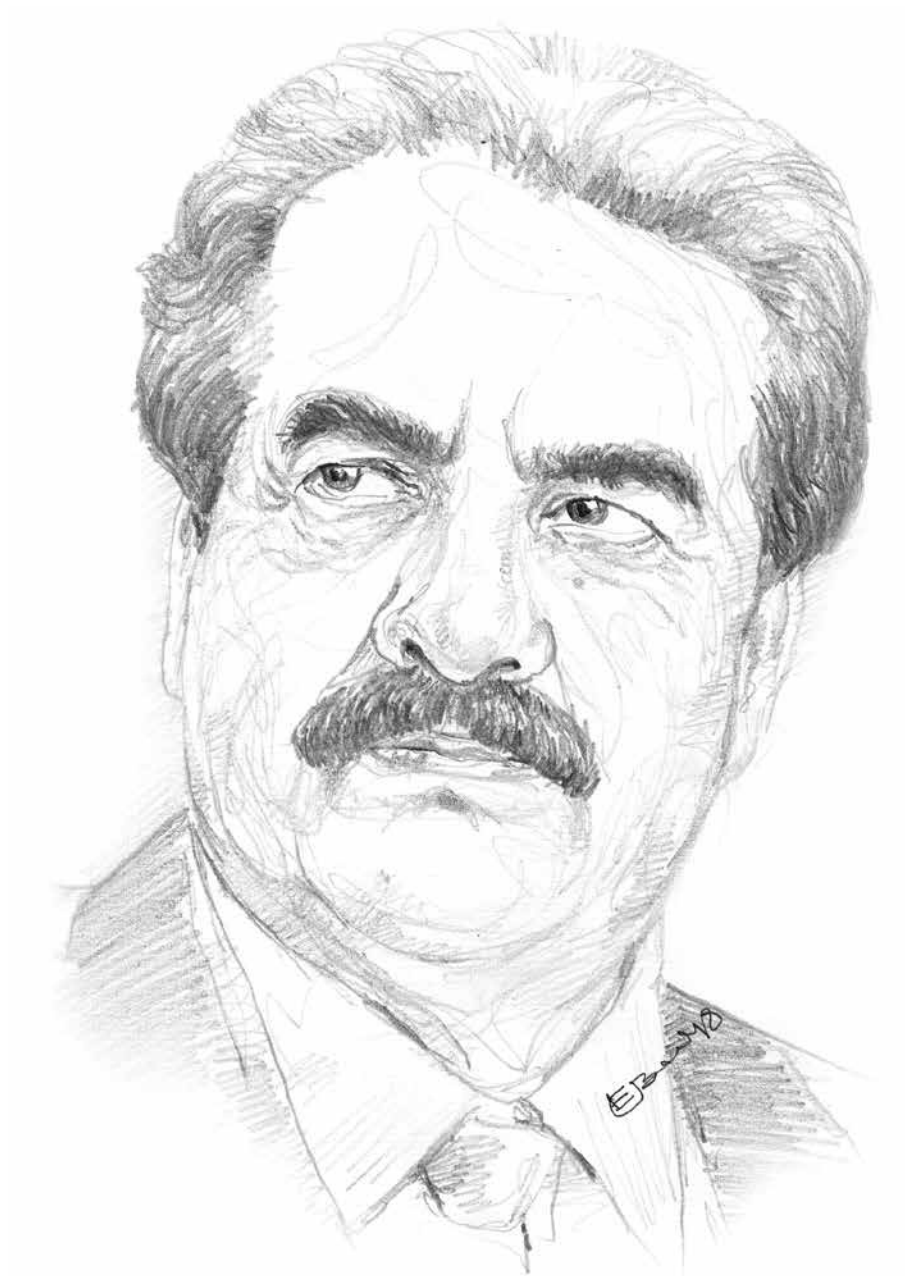
Usman Peerzada

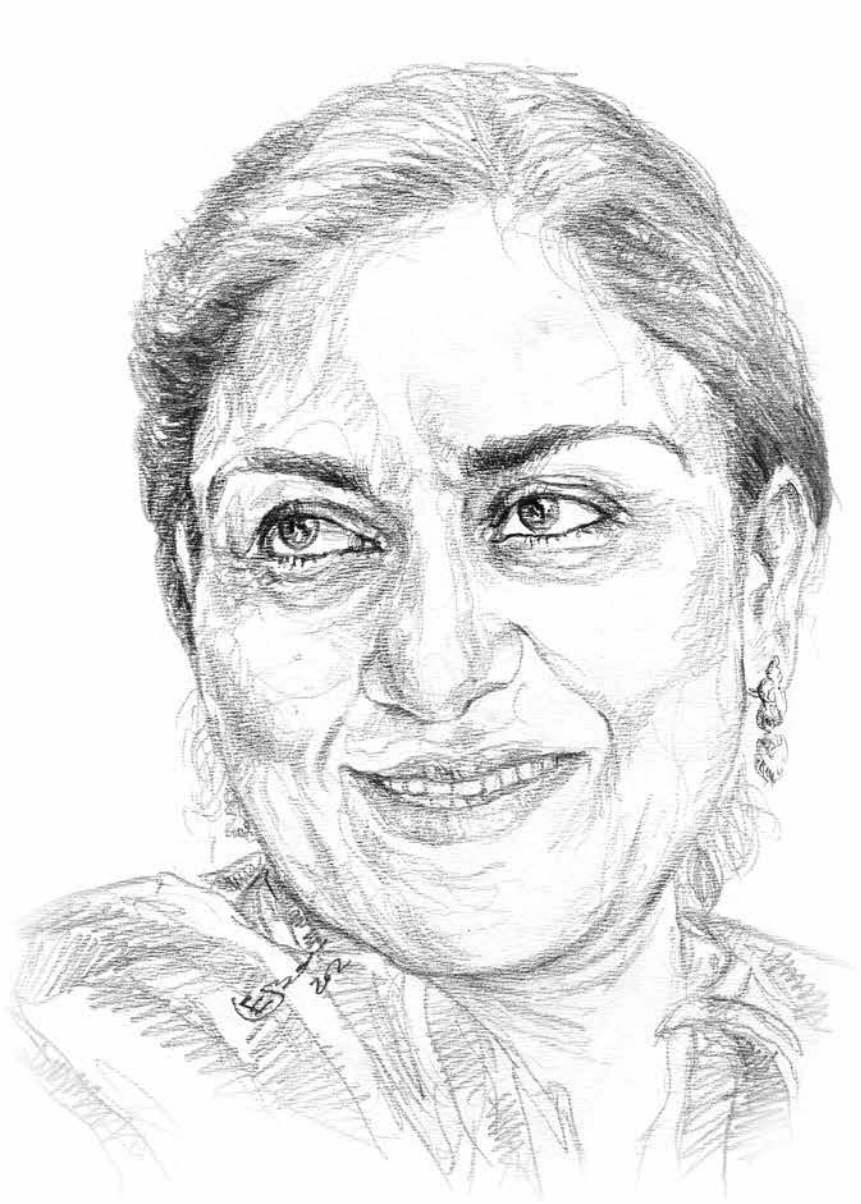
Abdul Qadir

(born 1956)

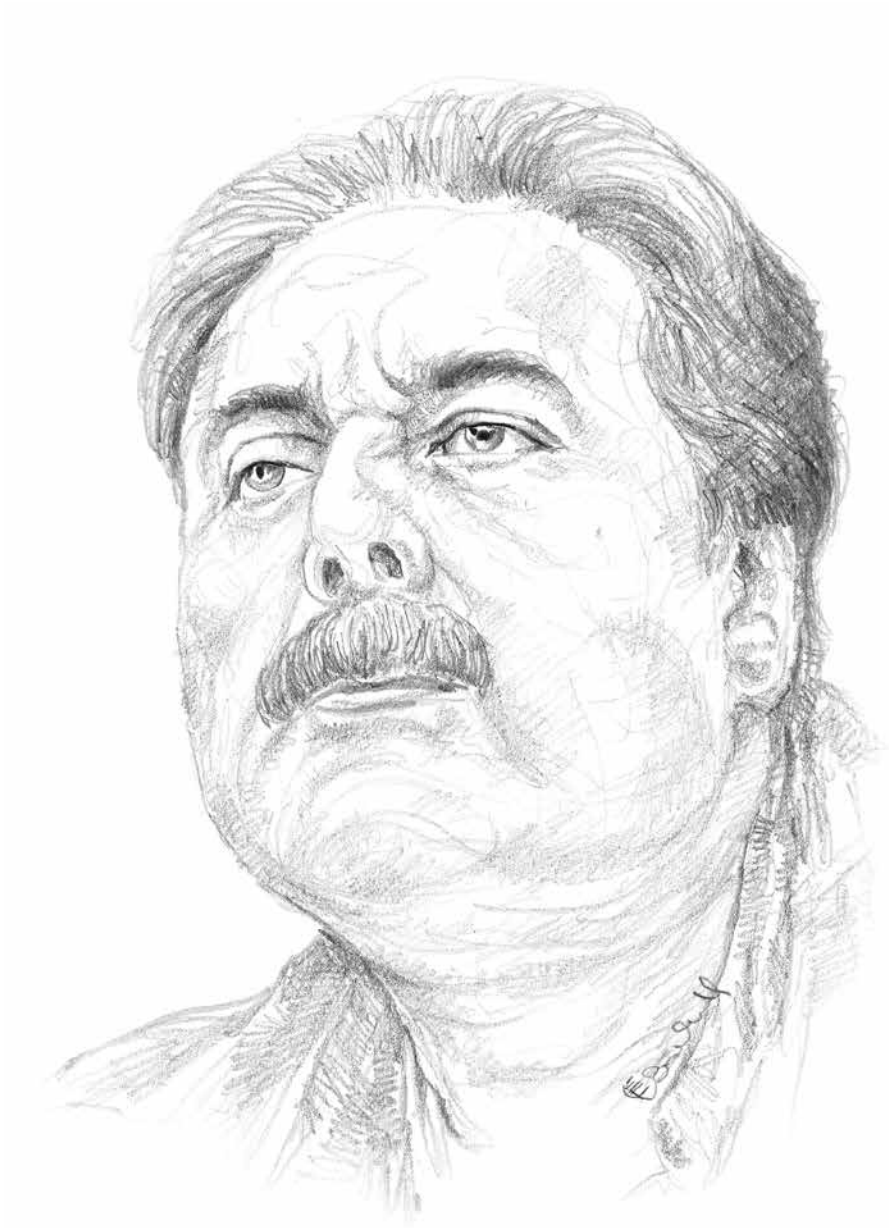

(born 1962)

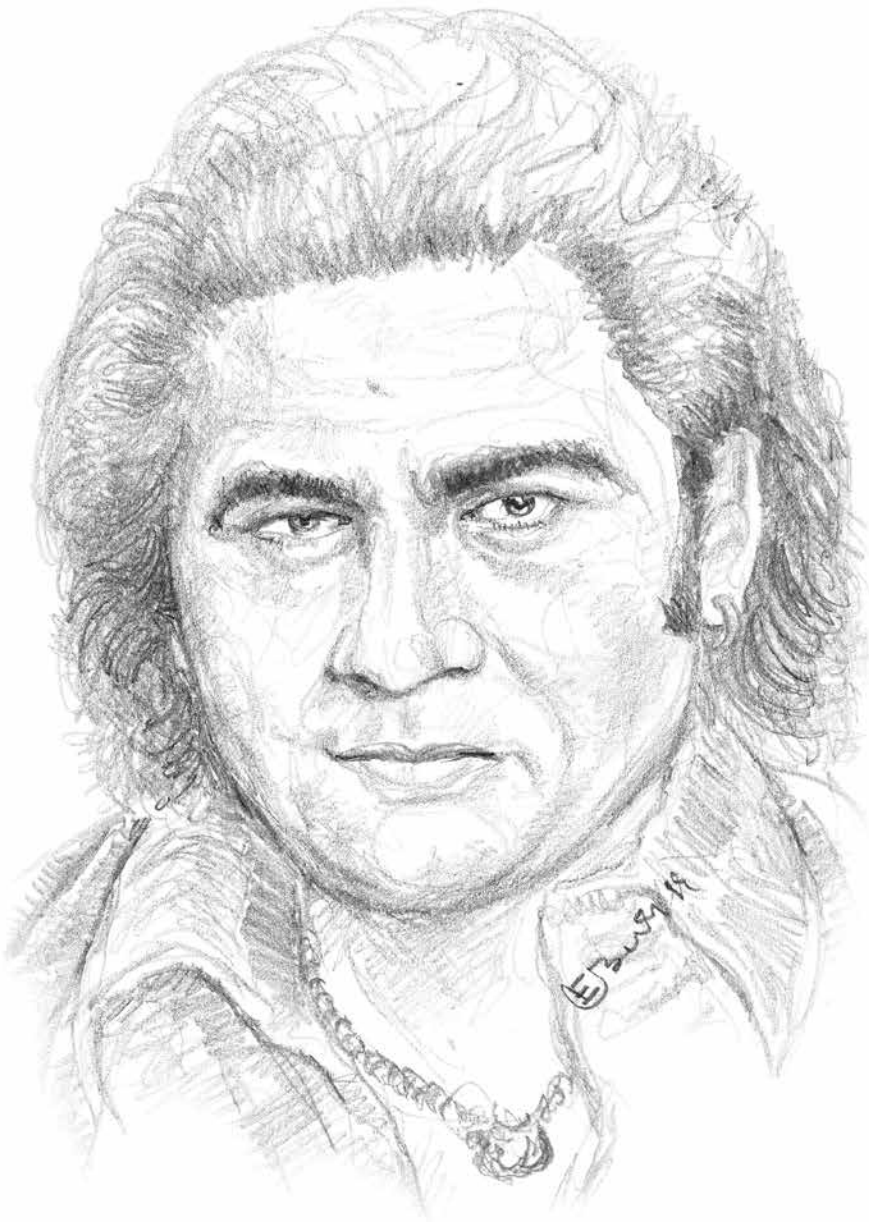

(born 1963)

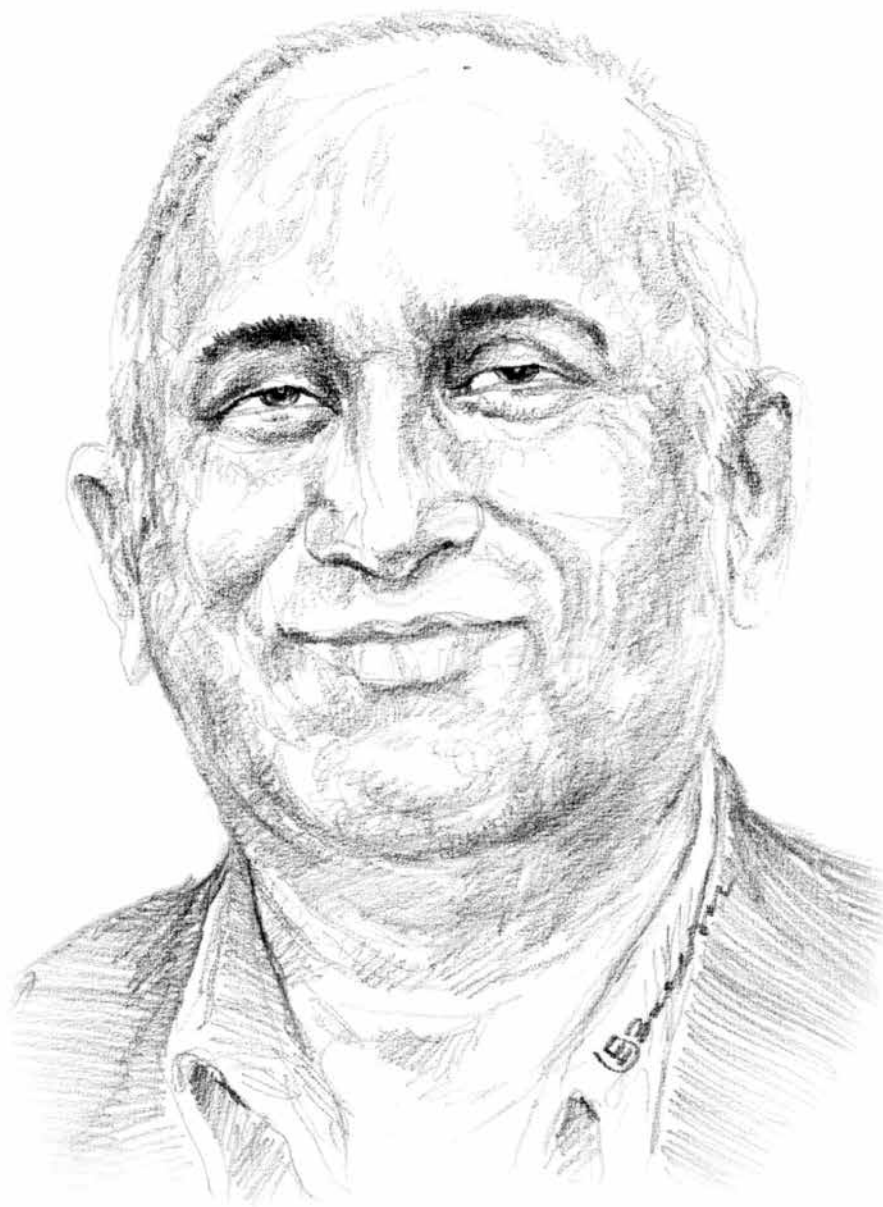

(born 1966)

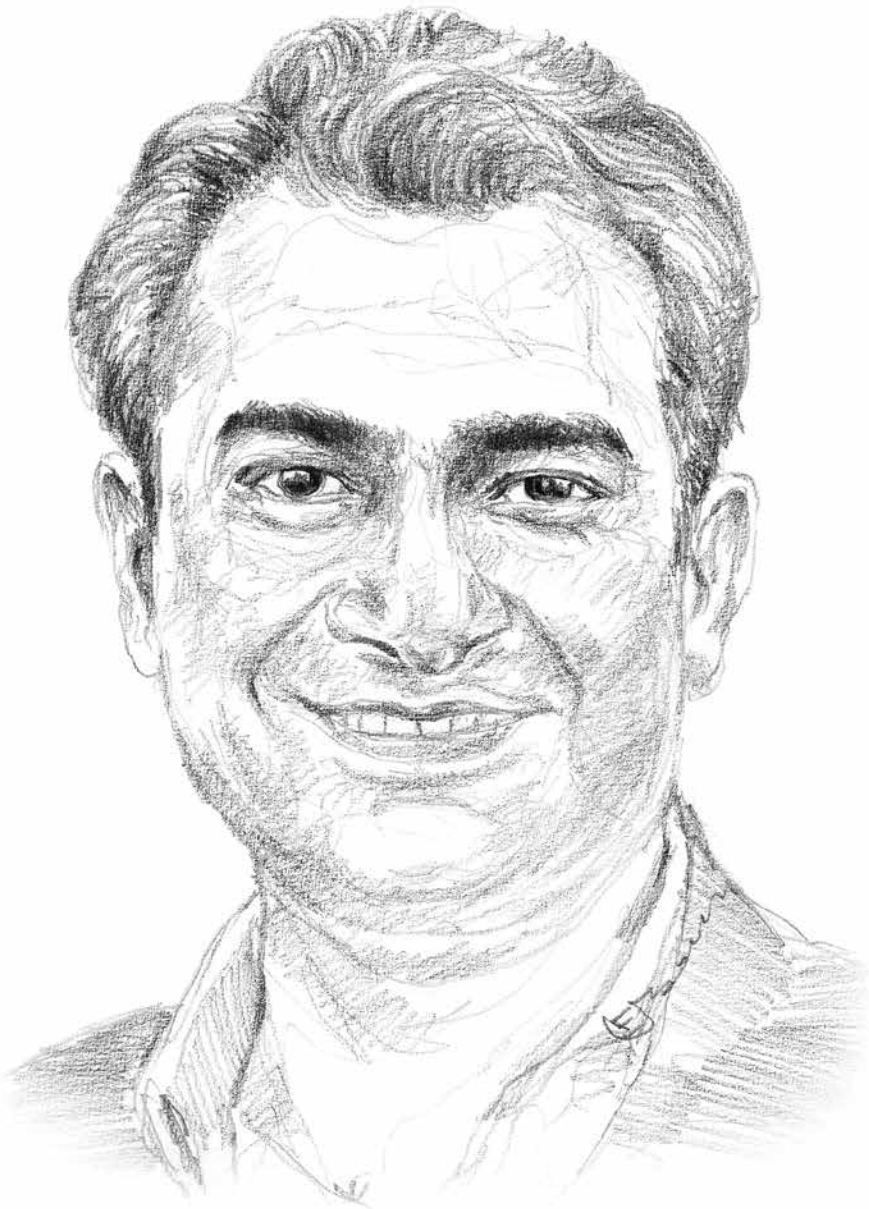

(born 1970)

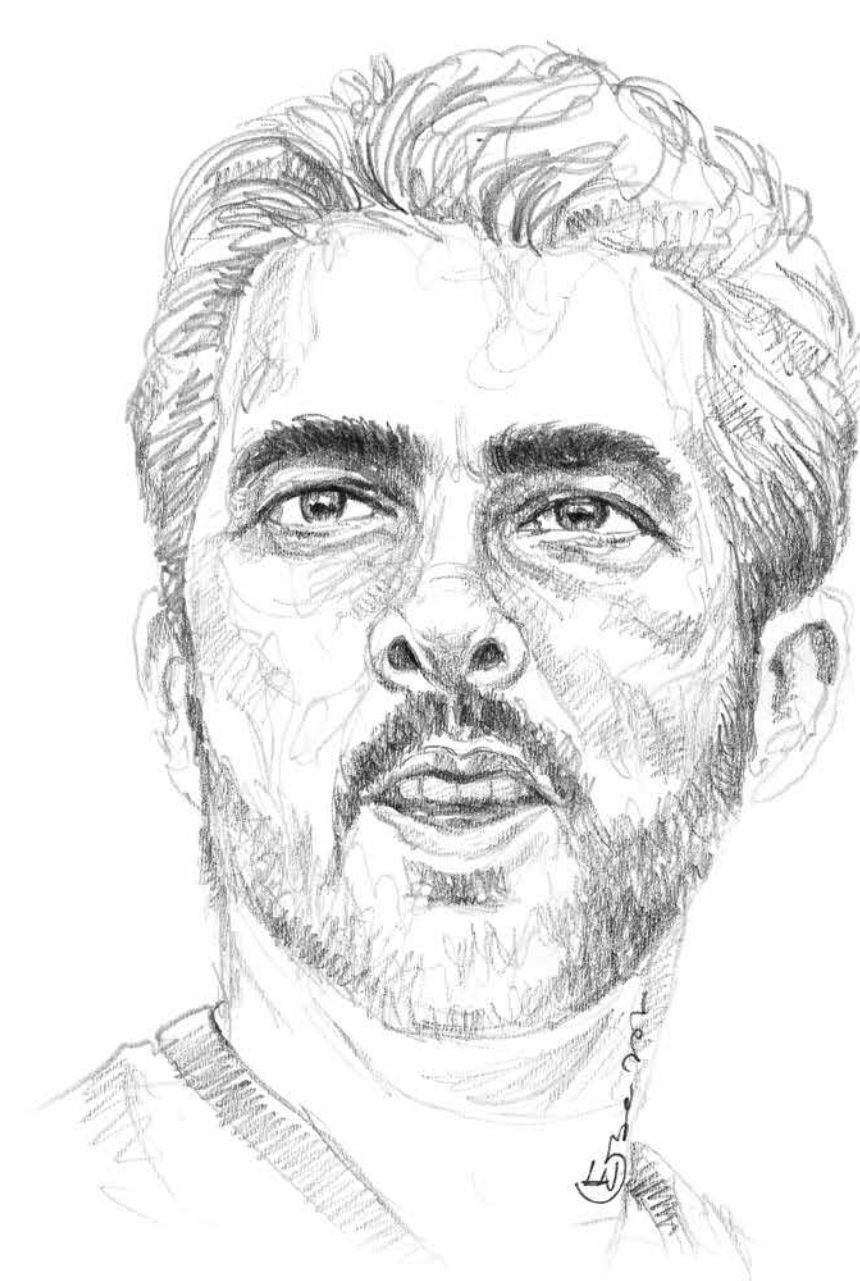

He is a renowned Pakistani actor, film/TV director, producer and screenwriter best known for directing the TV dramas Humsafar and Shehr-e-Zaat.



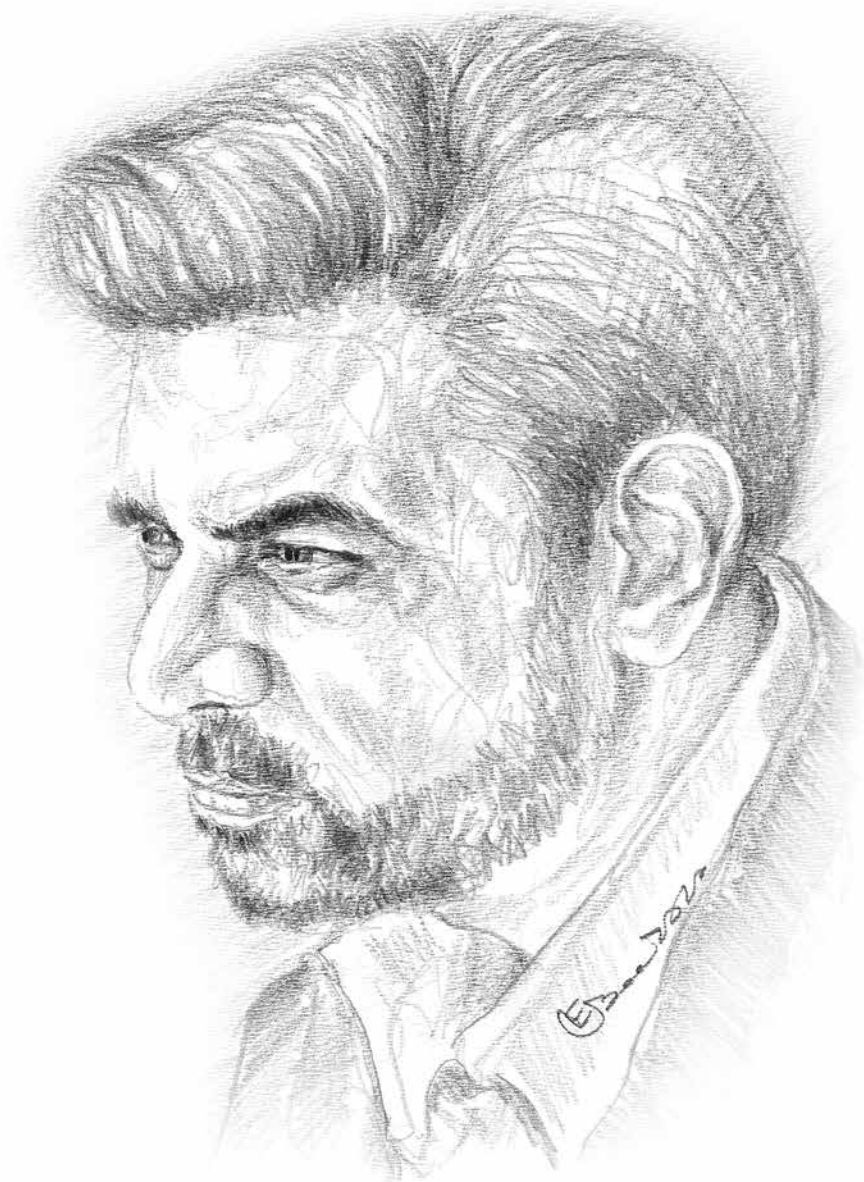
Aisam-ul-Haq

Vasay Chaudhry

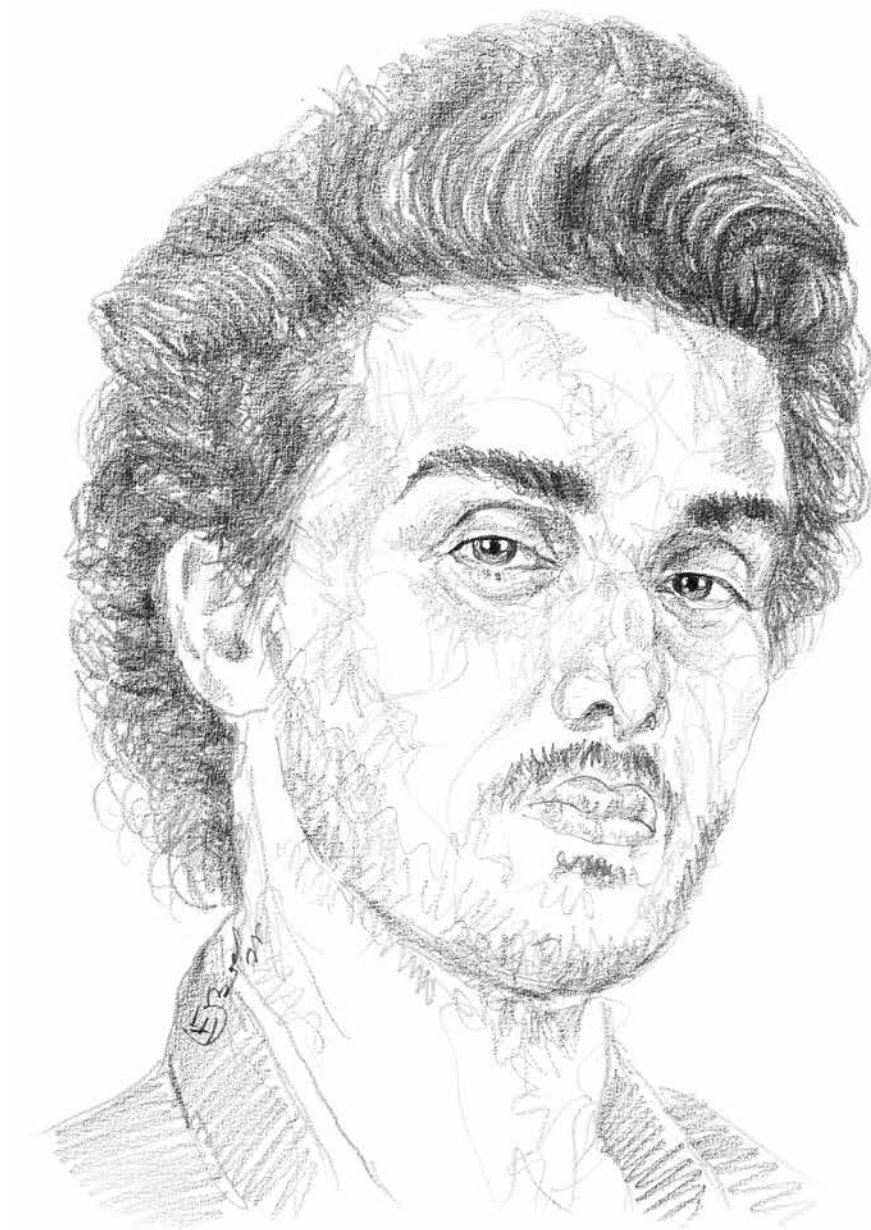
(born 1981)

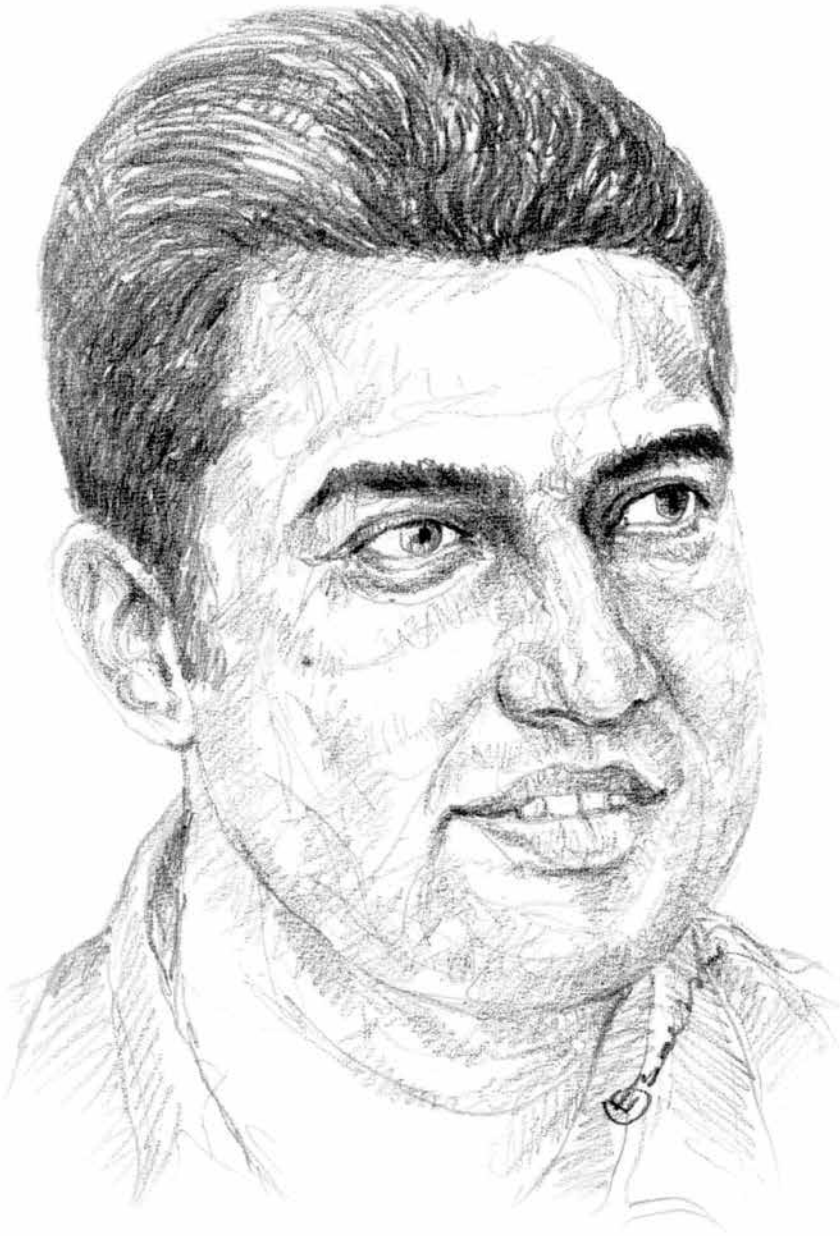
Ali Xeeshan
