

## Abstract

Technological investigation and scholarly research in the discipline of Artificial Intelligence is being carried out proficiently as the field of AI is interminably advancing, much like Darwin's phenomena of evolution. Artificial intelligence (AI) is the imitation of human intelligence in devices that have been designed to behave and think like humans. To examine the imprints of AI in the present domain of literary works, the Darwinian conviction of survival of the fittest has been synthesized for this dissertation.
