ABSTRACT

There has been variant in colonial experiences of different regions and the people who are residing in that particular region. Few experiences among all these are quite significant in terms of their production and merits. The village of Khan Garh is an exception with a unique experience of colonialism that has turned the course of history as people and the region had a more productive and healthy state of life during colonialism and the same goes on with its postcolonial experiences. From social to Political and from Religious to a more modernized society was thus the hallmark of Jacob's transforming struggle to the region under his suzerainty. It was the people who loved calling their transformed village after their sincerest, devoted and helpful leader and named it Jacobabad.
